The place we are "getting away to", "camping-out and singing-in" will be the Prince William Forest Park in Triangle, Va., 32 miles SW of Washington on Highway 95. The Society is reserving one of the park's cabin camp facilities for the weekend and since the accommodations are limited, the outing will necessarily have to be restricted to members of the Society ONLY, and reservations will have to be made in advance on a first-come, first-served basis.

FOLKLORE SOCIETY OF GREATER WASHINGTON

Purpose

The Folklore Society of Greater Washington was formed in October, 1964. We wish to promote both the study and enjoyment of the folk music and folklore of the American people as part of the everyday life in our community.

We hope to

- Serve as a focal point for individuals in the greater Washington area who are interested in the broad area of American folklore.
- Carry on a program of activities which will spread folk materials and information about them. Although we are primarily concerned with American folklore, we are also interested in the folklore of other countries, particularly that of other English-speaking countries.
- Stimulate the interest of the community in folk materials by means of active participation as well as passive appreciation.
- Stimulate interest in the study of materials relating to the folklore of America.

Benefits to Members

Members are admitted free of charge to the programs which are part of the regular monthly meetings. A substantial discount rate is offered to members at frequent special events. Members also receive discounts at a number of local stores on musical instruments and related items.

As a service to members, the Society publishes a monthly Newsletter, which features news of the Society, a calendar of local and national events, as well as possible record and book reviews, folk-lore texts, and articles.

Membership in the FSGW affords people the opportunity to become acquainted with others with similar academic and/or performance interests in folk materials.

Members of the FSGW are invited to attend all membership and Executive Board meetings of the organization and to take part in the discussions, serve on various committees, and vote at meetings.

Meetings

Monthly membership meetings, which include planned programs of performers, films, or speakers, are scheduled throughout the year from October through June. Executive Board meetings, where most of the Society's business is conducted, are also open to members.

Programs

Some of the programs and special events which have been presented by the FSGW during its first year-and-a-half have been a lecture-demonstration on the Appalachian dulcimer, a gospel and blues program, a showing of films, folksings, a lecture on American Folklife Research, concerts by Elizabeth Cotton and the McPeake Family, folk music on commercial "Race" and "Hillbilly" records, Jewish folksongs performed by Tossi and Lee Aaron, and the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem.

The Society plans to continue this variety of programming. In time, we hope to sponsor a folk festival, promote local collecting, and publish a folklore journal. What we do will depend on the developing interests of the membership.

Membership

Membership in the Folklore Society is open to anyone interested in various aspects of folklore and folk music. Dues for family membership are \$7.50 per year, individual membership, \$5.00
