CANADIAN FOLKSINGER BARRY O'NEIL TO PERFORM JUNE 13

Canadian folksinger Barry O'Neil will perform for the first time in the Washington, D.C., area for the Society's last regular monthly meeting of the season at 8:30 p.m., Friday, June 13, in the Washington Ethical Society auditorium, 7750 - 16th Street NW., Washington, D.C.

O'Neil specializes in Canadian song. In addition to Canadian ballads, his programs usually include a sampling of ballads from England. He accompanies himself on the concertina and, variously, on the crwth. The latter is a bowed lyre somewhat similar to a violin.

Living now in Ann Arbor, Michigan, O'Neil originally came from the Laurentian Mountains area near Montreal, Canada.

Admission will be free to Society members, one dollar for the general public, and fifty cents for children.
