FIELDS WARD AND DUANE THORPE TO BE FEATURED IN MARCH PROGRAM

On Friday, March 14 at 8:30 PM at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750-16th St. NW, the Society will present two guitar playing, singing performers from two very different backgrounds:

FIELDS WARD is not a folk music boom revivalist--he's the real thing. Born in 1911 in Independence, Virginia, Fields came into this world and a musical family at the same time. His father, Crockett Ward, recorded for Okeh Records in 1927. Fields, who was only sixteen at the time. played with his father's band. Since the family moved to Ballard Branch, Virginia in 1921, Fields grew up in an area rich in traditional music. In 1937 he recorded with the Bog Trotters Band (his uncle. Wade Ward, also played in this band). Fields is a man of great charm and dignity. His musical style shows the influence of Riley Puckett and Eck Dunford, but he is not a copy of anyone.

DUANE THORPE was born in 1939 in Kinsley. Kansas, and grew up in the company of a singing mother and grandmother, plus a guitar playing uncle. He makes the point that he was raised in Dodge City, but says he has difficulty persuading people that this is true. He doesn't know why, but there seems to be universal denial of the fact that (1) he was born in Dodge City or (2) that Dodge City even exists. In any event, Duane claims to have gotten interested in folk music when he was in college; after a while it struck him that he was relearning songs he'd grown up with, so he began concentrating on bringing back songs he had taken for granted--heard in his grandmother's church, from his mother, or from people in his community. He emerged a singer of folk songs which include hymns, cowboy songs, blues and railroad songs. He has sung in concert with Doc Watson. with Pete Seeger on the Clearwater, and in coffeehouses all over hither and yon.

Here's the March schedule of "Folk Festival USA" programs, produced by National Public Radio, to be aired on Mary Cliff's show on WETA-FM (90.9), Saturdays from 6 to 8:00 PM:

March 1 - The West Virginia Bluegrass Festival in Capon Bridge features nationally known recording artists playing a variety of contemporary music styles. Performers include Doug Kershaw, Vasser Clements, John Prine, Roy Acuff and John Hartford.

March 8 - On this second of three programs from the National Folk Festival at Wolf Trap Farm Park are featured Kilby Snow, Kyle Creed and Fred Cockerham, John Wright and Catherine Perrier.

March 15 - The Kerrville Bluegrass and Country Music Festival offered three days of concerts, contests and demonstrations to Texas audiences. Performers included in this program are Byron Berliner's Country Gazette, Norman Blake and Kenny Cantrell.
