

RICK AND LORRAINE LEE WILL BE FEATURED AT THE JANUARY PROGRAM

Rick and Lorraine Lee will be in town to help us begin the New Year by highlighting the regular monthly program for January. As usual, the concert will be held on the second Friday (January 14) at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th Street N.W. Starting time is 8:30 PM and the program is free to FSGW members (non-members \$2).

Both Rick and Lorraine are accomplished musicians with Rick exercising his talents on the keyboard and banjo while Lorraine provides the best dulcimer playing that you are ever likely to hear. In addition to their instrumental talents, Rick and Lorraine are fine singers and perform a wide variety of traditional, original, and country-western material.

THE FSGW MINI-FESTIVAL IS SET FOR JANUARY 29

The 1977 version of the Folklore Society's "Mini-festival" will take place from 12:30 PM to midnight on January 29th at the Sidwell Friends School. See the map inside for directions. Featured will be a multitude of workshops, concerts, and lots of dancing. The basic schedule will be: A) 12:30 - 1:30 Concert of workshop leaders. B) 1:30 - 6:30 five hours of workshops. C) 6:30 - 8:30 Break for dinner. D) 8:30 - Midnight Dancing-called by Bob Dalsemer. Admission is \$3 for the whole day (\$2 for either the workshops or the dance) and children under 14 are half-price. The entrance to the Middle School is on 37th St. (see map) and the doors will open at noon. Beginning at 1:30, you may also enter and pay at the front of the gym where the dance workshops will be held. Both buildings will be cleared and locked between 6:30 and 8:30.

This year's workshop topics include Banjo styles, Sea Songs, Pocket instruments, plucked dulcimer, Carter family songs, piano styles, and contra-dance band. There will also be several workshops of special interest to children and their parents including dancing for children. Adult dance workshops will be held in the gym (see note about shoes) and mini-concerts will be held in the drama room.



BREAD BAKING WORKSHOP

At a leisurly 3 in the afternoon on Sun. Jan 16, you'll have a chance to take part in a new offering from the FSGW and loaf around at the same time. In what promises to be the first of several "folk food" affairs, Ames Perry and Caroline Hoover will conduct a workshop in the crusty craft of baking bread. You'll find out about different breads from different traditions, learn how to tell Tip-Top vinyl from homemade reality--and most importantly, you can play too! Everything will be provided, from expertise to ingredients to ovens. It costs a mere \$2, and it will be held in the Hoover's much cooked in Bethesda kitchen. It's limited to 10 people, so call the Hoovers at 656-7634 to reserve a spot and get directions.
