## FEBRUARY PROGRAM WILL FEATURE ERIC SHOENBERG AND MAGPIE

Eric Shoenberg is a ragtime guitarist who arranges a wide variety of traditional and contemporary material for guitar. He has been playing for many years and has made an album with Dave Laibman and others entitled "Modern Ragtime Guitar." He has played extensively in the Boston and New York areas and has toured nationally.

Magpie consists of Greg, who plays concertina and guitar and sings anything from ballads to sea shanties, and Terry, who plays harmonica, guitar, and sings the blues with a voice reminiscent of Bessie Smith, and sings a wide variety of other material with equal style and taste.

As usual, the concert will be held at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th Street N.W. Starting time is 8:30 PM and the program is free to FSGW members and \$2 for non-members.
