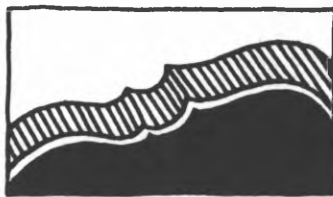

**APRIL'S PROGRAM WILL FEATURE BILL CLIFTON & RED RECTOR AND THE LITTLE WONDERS**

Bill Clifton has a host of impressive credentials as a promoter of Bluegrass Festivals including the first Bluegrass Festival in the US at Luray, VA in 1961. He has also been a consultant on the Cambridge Folk Festival in England, their finest celebration of the English Folk heritage. Even more impressive is his reputation as a musician and performer. He has over 15 albums to his credit on such labels as Starday, London, and Mercury. Bill is a premier banjo picker and has performed with Hedy West and other well-known folk performers. Lately he has been making yearly forays to the US from England, where he has been living for the past 14 years, to play folk festivals with Red Rector.

Red is a pioneer mandolin player who has been a member of the network radio show Old Chisolm Trail that was produced in New York by Alan Lomax and which featured such greats as Woodie Guthrie, Lee Hayes, Cisco Houston, Sonny Terry, Burl Ives and many others. Known as "Mr. Taste of the mandolin", Red has a great sense of humor which was frequently taxed by Frank Smith who used to introduce him as the world's largest midget.

Together they will be performing Ballads and songs in the style of the old "brother" acts. Bill and Red will be doing the first part of the program from 8 PM to about 9:30, so remember to come early. As usual, the program will be held at the Washington Ethical Society 7750 16th St. NW. Admission is free to FSGW members, \$2 to others.

The second half of the program will feature the Little Wonders - one of the finest traditional black gospel groups still singing. First formed in 1941, the Little Wonders have been singing together for 36 years and are better than ever. Although they reside in Havre de Grace, Md., their popularity has taken them far afield for over 2000 performances during their storied career, including 3 performances at the Kennedy Center in 1975 as part of the kickoff activities for the nation's bicentennial celebrations. "Come and get religion" with one of the finest groups singing traditional music anywhere.

## SPRING SAMPLER--APRIL 15

The sampler concerts were started in the earliest years of the FSGW to showcase the remarkable variety of remarkable musicians within the Society's own ranks, and this spring's offering sure proves the point.

\* F.F.V. - A five-piece band representing about a dozen instruments and a chorus of voices, with old-time country music, Irish dance tunes, and a few originals. Jesse and Terry Winch, Alan Oresky, Joe Stork and Ric Sweeny bring the usual assortment of tools plus such others as tenor guitar and banjo, Irish button accordion, dobro and bodhran.

\* The Ancient Orphic Mystery Band - The Washington area seems to be blessed with a lot of the best unaccompanied singers around, and the Orphics will help prove it. Karen Seim, Elise Kress and C.B. Heineman may call to mind the Young Tradition and other visions in their music of the British Isles, with a few instruments rung in as well.

\* Jeff Deitchman - He brings in so many people to sing at the Berwyn Cafe that you may never have heard his own gentle renditions of country songs, new tunes--and a beautiful surprise for your eyes and hands as well as your ears.

\* Ted Strader - One of the absolutely best--and least heard--performers I know. Warm, crisp, and satisfying, everything he touches turns to toe tapping, whether it's a Woody Guthrie song, a Brownie McGhee-style blues or even a rare unaccompanied tune such as "Charles Guiteau."

All in all, quite a mixture of music. It all happens on Friday, April 15, at 8:30 PM in the Washington Ethical Society auditorium (7750 16th St NW at Kalmia). It's only \$2 for FSGW members and \$3 for others. The performers are all giving themselves gratis, because the other aim of the samplers is to help the FSGW go right on doing what it's been doing so well for a dozen years. So bring every friend and relative you can find, help keep the FSGW tree watered, and bring a smile to your ears. (A song to your nose?)

An article in the recent issue of "Tradition", the newsletter of the National Council for Traditional Arts, includes this definition of an "April Fool" from *A Classical Dictionary of the Vulgar Tongue*, published in London in 1785 by Captain Frances Grose:

Anyone imposed on, or sent on a bootless errand, on the first of April; which day it is the custom among the lower people, children, and servants, by dropping empty papers carefully doubled up, sending persons on absurd messages, and such like contrivances, to impose on every one they can, and then to salute them with the title of April Fool.

Since the Open Sing falls on April Fool's Day, I've (Nan Goland) chosen "Jokes, tricks, and such like contrivances" for the theme. So impose on everyone you can during the day, then come out to join the other low people, children, and (cilil) servants who make the sing such fun. It's Friday, April 1 at 9 PM at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750-16th St. NW (at Kalmia Rd.). The donation of \$1 at the door includes refreshments.
