LEWIS LAMB TO BE FEATURED AT THE DECEMBER 9th FSGW PROGRAM



Lewis Lamb picked up Fiddling as a young man in his home-town of Paint Lick, Kentucky. He worked for neighbors, pulling corn to earn money to buy his first fiddle. Lewis taught his daughter, Donna, to play the guitar while she was still in highschool, and the two of them have been playing together, both home and abroad, eversince. Donna Lamb is the only person who can fully accompany her father's incredible fiddling.

Lewis Lamb has been the champion of many fiddling contests. He was on the staff of the Country Song and Dance Society's summer course on American Song and Dance in 1977 and the Kentucky representative at the Canadian Expo. in 1975.

In Berea, Kentucky, Lewis and Donna are currently the musicians for the Berea College Country Dancers, who recently toured the South-

East United States and England & Scotland. They are the musicians for "Wild-erness Road," an outdoor drama, and for Project D.A.N.C.E., which stands for Dance Actvity for New Community Encounter, a project partially funded by the Kentucky Arts Commission. Lewis is also on the staff of the Christmas Country Dance School. How lucky we are that they will be at our program to share their music with us!

The program will be on December 9th, Friday, at 8:30 P.M. at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th St.(at Kalmia Rd.); Admission is free to FSGW members, \$2.00 for non-members. This program is made possible by a grant from The National Endowment of the Arts. Do come and hear some fantastic fiddling a bit of story-telling, and perhaps at the end of the concert there may be a brief square dance!

MORE FOLK ON THE AIR

For everyone who still feels hungry for folk after listening to the everdecreasing time allotted folk programming on WETA-FM, good news. There is more available.

"Summer Solstice" is a program broadcast every Sunday afternoon from noon to 3 p.m. over Georgetown University's WGTB-FM (90.1). Host for the show is Myron Bretholz, whose personal interest in British Isles music dictates the shape of the program. If you crave Planxty, Lou Killen, Archie or Rae Fisher, Maddy Prior, or David Jones, you're bound to hear from them on the show. Also from American singers and players of British Isles folk (How to Change a Flat Tire, Priscilla Herdman, Malcolm Dalglish & Grey Larsen) with a few Jean Ritchie numbers thrown in. The show makes good listening. "Playlists" are available if you hear a record you need to rush out and buy. And announcements of upcoming events, again with an English/Irish emphasis, are made.

Also on the air is "Folk Music With John Dildine," for anyone who by reason of necessity or temporary insanity is up at the ungodly hour of 7 a.m. Saturdays. This is a series of rebroadcasts from the 60's, with John Dildine (formerly of FSGW and Accokeek) as host, aired over WAMU-FM (88+). 
