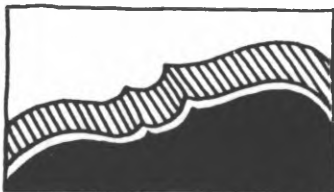

**HIGH LEVEL RANTERS**

**AUGUST 19 - 8 P.M.**

Mark your calendar now! The HIGH LEVEL RANTERS will perform a concert-dance on Sunday, August 19 in the Spanish Ballroom of the Glen Echo Park, Glen Echo, Md. This is their first U.S. tour since 1971. Their music is primarily from Northumberland, in northeast England, on the Scottish border. ALISTAIR ANDERSON is best known in this country for his recordings on concertina and Northumbrian smallpipes. In addition to his work with the Ranters, he has recorded four solo albums. He will call the dance. TOM GILFELLON is vocalist and guitarist, singing border balladry to music hall songs. His guitar work is featured on Kicking Mule's "Contemporary Ragtime Guitar" collection. He has two solo albums as well. JOHNNY HANDLE, vocal and accordion, was 14 years a coal miner, and brings the mining tradition to Ranters' songs. A songwriter himself, he also has two solo LPs. COLIN ROSS is the Ranters' fiddler,

plays jews harp and whistle, and has been a leader in the revival of the gentle Northumbrian smallpipes. He makes the pipes fulltime, teaching that craft as well. He and Alistair have produced an album of 18th century Northumbrian pipe music.

These four have made music together more than 15 years, taking their name from the High Level Bridge next to the folk club where they first gathered. (The Rant is a Northumbrian dance step) As a group they have produced eight albums, toured around the world. So expect to learn a few new steps -- or just come to listen to the fine music. SUNDAY, AUGUST 19, at 8 p.m. in the SPANISH BALLROOM of GLEN ECHO PARK, off MacArthur Boulevard, outside the D.C. line, in Glen Echo, Md. ADMISSION, a bargain \$3.00.

CONCERT AT THE TROLLEY CAR MUSEUM

In 1962 one hundred years of streetcar transportation ended in Washington D.C. The trolley era that began with horse cars during Abraham Lincoln's presidency ended with the final run of an electric streetcar during the term of John F. Kennedy. However, at the National Capitol Trolley Museum the streetcars still run and historic American trolleys share the rails with picturesque little trains from the heart of Europe.

Once a year a concert of trolley and train songs is presented and the date this year is July 22nd, Sunday, from 2-4 p.m. Performers will include Mike Rivers, Mike Holmes, Jonathan Eberhart and other FSGW members, as well as a Bluegrass group, "The Informed Sources" (whose name comes from the fact that all members belong to the media).

Directions: Take the beltway to Georgia Ave. Drive North for approximately 5 miles to Bonifant Rd. Turn East for about 1½ miles. Trolley museum on left, Admission is free.

The group will be joined by Dewey Balfa, the surviving member of the internationally-known Balfa Brothers, playing fiddle, and his nephew, Tony Balfa, on guitar.
