FSGW NOVEMBER PROGRAM FEATURES MUSIC FROM WEST VIRGINIA



Three exceptional musicians from West Virginia will be featured at the Folklore Society's November program. On Friday, November 9, we'll have the pleasure of hearing fiddler/banjo player Woody Simmons, guitarist/fiddler Blackie Cool, and hammered dulcimer player Sam Rizzetta in what promises to be a truly unique concert of traditional music.

Woodford ("Woody") Simmons has played fiddle for over 50 of his 67 years. He grew up-and still lives-in Mill Creek, W. Va., 16 miles south of Elkins. At age 13, he earned the \$15 he needed to buy his first fiddle by building the fire each morning in the schoolhouse. He won his first fiddle contest in Elkins at the age of 19, and continues to win prizes at contests all over the state. Woody's

first banjo was made by his father, and had 5 frets made of fencing wire, a groundhog-hide head, and strings made of unravelled screen wire. He developed his unique two-finger banjo style partly from listening to the 1920's gramophone recordings of Fred VanEpps. In the '30's and '40's, Woody played fiddle on numerous radio shows with such groups as the Leary family and Joe Phillips and the Dixie Pals. A record of Woody's music, titled All Smiles Tonight, will be released by the W. Va. Dept. of Culture & History this fall.

Blackie Cool is an eager and energetic musician who is ready to play music with anyone at any time. Many listeners on the CB around Point Mountain, W. Va., have heard the open invitations from "Texas Blackie" for musicians to stop by and play. Blackie plays an astonishing variety of music in several surprisingly different guitar styles. His flat-picking and spicy runs add just the right touch to accompany old-time fiddling. As a solo player, Blackie will often play old-time guitar pieces, rags, blues, polkas, waltzes, and popular tunes. He has also adapted a number of "classical" banjo pieces to his guitar style. He is also a fine fiddler, and plays many of the tunes popular among central West Virginia fiddlers during the "30s. He has played music with Woody since around 1940.

Sam Rizzetta is well known to Washington audiences as a splendid hammered dulcimer player, a member of "Trapezoid," and a maker of handcrafted guitars, hammered and mountain dulcimers, and other stringed instruments. He lives in Valley Head, W. Va., about 10 miles from Blackie and Woody. The three musicians first played together at local square dances and now get together whenever they can, mostly for their own enjoyment.

The program will begin at 8:30 p.m., Friday, November 9, at the Washington Ethical Society Society auditorium, 7750 - 16th St., N.W. (at Kalmia Rd.) Admission is free for Folklore Society members; admission for nonmembers is \$2.00.

A rare opportunity has come to us to hear one of the foremost Welsh folksingers. Dafydd Iwan, in a house concert on Tuesday, November 6, at 8 p.m., at the home of Lars and Becky Hanslin in Chevy Chase, MD. An architect by trade, Iwan is a champion of the Welsh language and traditional Welsh music. In past years jailed for his activism, he has more recently been honored officially for his contributions to the Welsh culture, and is a member of the Order of Druids. As a teacher of the language, he is experienced in leading group songs for "non-speakers." Dafydd Iwan is a linguist. musician, entertainer (and, I understand, very charismatic). Welsh song is rarely heard here and we welcome him--and you--to this house concert. Admission is \$2 for FSGW members, and \$3 for nonmembers. For directions, call Lars and Becky at 654-4317.

Debbie McClatchy, well-known singer of traditional American and Irish songs, will present a house concert in Takoma Park, MD, on November 3, at 8:30 p.m. Debbie has researched gold rush songs in the mountains of California and has toured Ireland, learning a great many songs there. She has recorded for Philo, and performed with the Red Clay Ramblers in the New York production of "Diamond Studs." In addition to singing, Debbie plays banjo, concertina, pennywhistle, dulcimer, guitar, spoons (bring along a couple of spoons and we'll see if we can get a short course in the fine art of spooning ...) and sundry other instruments.

Debbie, who last appeared here in May '78, is planning to move back to the West Coast soon, and her visits here will be less frequent from now on, so don't miss this chance to see her! IN MEMORIAM -- MOTHER SCOTT

Washington singer Esther Mae "Mother" Scott died October 16 following a stroke. She had sung blues and gospel music for most of her 86 years. In the 1960s she began composing and singing professionally in this area, having spent most of her life as a housekeeper in her native Mississippi, in Baltimore, and in New York. For many years, Mother Scott sang gospel music at St. Stephen and the Incarnation Episcopal Church in Washington, where she was a member. She also performed in services at other churches, including the Washington Cathedral, and in shows at nightclubs, colleges, and on radio and TV. She was also a member of the Traveling Blues Workshop. She will be sadly missed and long remembered.

EAT. DRINK. AND BE MERRY. FOR TOMORROW THERE'S MORE!

All who attended the Sunday night dinner at this year's Getaway, and/or who partook of the punch at the FSGW Anniversary Party, know that we have some real talent (besides the obvious musical talent) in our midst. So that you'll know what you were eating and drinking (or if by some misfortune you missed it all and would like to try it yourself), here are the recipes for some of the more exotic yummies. The quantities in the Vietnamese dishes can be multiplied, of course, but keep in mind that wok cooking (stir-frying) works best with small amounts at a time. As for the punch, it was created especially for this event, and the recipe makes a lot. If you want to cut it down, though, you'll have to use partial bottles—the smallest amount used here is a fifth. Try it for a big party—it's good!

Thit kho (Caramel pork)

- 1 lb. fresh pork butt (with fat on), cut in 1" cubes 2-3 scallions, copped
- 1 tsp. oil
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 Tbs. nuocmam (fish sauce). In Philippine markets this is known as "patis"
- 1 tsp. sugar or, preferably, caramelized sugar 1/4 tsp. pepper
- Water almost to cover

Saute scallions in oil over medium heat, add pork, and brown in deep pot. Add salt, pepper, sugar & water. Simmer uncovered 1 hour. Add nuocmam and simmer another hour. Don't let it boil, or it will get stringy and mushy. The liquid should cook down to practically nothing (don't burn it) and the meat cubes should retain their structural integrity. Serve on rice.

Gà chiên sa (Chicken with lemon grass)

- 1 lb. frying chicken, cut in manipulable chunks 1 Tbs. dried citronella (lemon grass), powdered
- 3 scallions, sliced in thin round sections
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 dried red chile pepper, seeded, in 1/4" lengths
- 1 Tbs. oil
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 2 Tbs. chopped dry-roasted peanuts
- 1 Tbs. nuocmam (see pork recipe)

Coat chicken pieces with citronella, scallions, salt & pepper; let stand 20 minutes. Heat a wok or skillet to high or medium high heat. Add oil. When oil is hot, toss in chicken and fry, stirring constantly. After a couple of minutes, add red pepper. Saute about 8 minutes more, still stirring, then add peanuts, a little more black pepper, sugar, and nuocmam, and cook another minute or so, still stirring.
