Hazel Dickens & Band: Friday, Sept. 11

FSGW's first regular program of the year will feature Hazel Dickens and Band. The program will be held on Friday, September 11 at 8:30 p.m. Hazel Dickens is recognized as one of the best traditional singers in the U.S. today. Her latest record on the Rounder label, Hard Hitting Songs for Hard Hit People, sums up the theme of much of her music: songs for, by, and about struggling working people. In addition to her fine original songs (a number of which were featured in the soundtrack of the Academy Award winning documentary, Harlan County U.S.A.), Hazel's repertoire includes songs of working women, Carter Family songs, gospel songs, and traditional bluegrass music. A full bluegrass band will perform with Hazel, complimenting her driving vocal style.

Hazel was raised in the coal camps of West Virginia in a large family where music was an important part of daily life. She has remained in touch with her heritage and a lot of her songs, time, and energy go towards coal mining people's concerns, welfare rights groups, and women's organizations.

The concert begins at 8:30 p.m. at the Washington Ethical Society auditorium, 7750 16th St., N.W. (at Kalmia Road). Plenty of street parking is available, but come early to get a good seat. This and all regular monthly programs are free to FSGW members (bring your ID card). Admission for nonmembers is \$2.00. Be there Friday, September 11 for a special first program of the year!



Fred & Jenny Armstrong-Park & Jan Davidson: Sept. 5

Southern mountain musicians Fred and Jenny Armstrong-Park along with Jan Davidson come to town singing, picking, and storytelling on Saturday, September 5. Fred and Jenny play all kinds of folk music, from English ballads to blues, gospel, and old-time dance



tunes. Fred is known as a master caller and harmonica player. He also jumps in with spoons, washboard, and fiddlestix. Jenny plays a fine fiddle, guitar, banjo, and lap dulcimer, as well as the Highland bagpipe. Their songs range from beautiful ballads to footstomping instrumentals. Jan Davidson plays just about every kind of music-blues, gospel, country, bluegrass, and rock and roll. He's also a fine storyteller, and is co-author of the hit off-Broadway musical Diamond Studs. Be sure to be there Saturday, September 5. The program begins at 8:30 at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th St., N.W. Admission is \$3 for FSGW members and \$4 for nonmembers.



Eamonn Curran, Dolores Keane & John Faulkner on Sept. 18

On September 18, Eamonn Curran, Dolores Keane, and John Faulkner will present an evening of traditional Irish music and songs of England, Ireland, and Scotland. Dolores, a former member of De Danann, has recorded with the Chieftains and has appeared throughout the British Isles and Europe. Besides singing an extensive repertoire of outstanding, unusual traditional songs, Dolores plays flute in the traditional Galway style.

John Faulkner was a member of Ewan MacColl's folksong study group during the 1960s, learning much of his material from field recordings of English and Scots singers. John plays guitar, bouzouki, hurdy-gurdy, and fiddle, while his English and Scottish songs complement Dolores' Irish repertoire.

Eamonn Curran, like Dolores, was born into a musical family. He began learning tunes on tin whistle from his father, Ned, who played fiddle and flute. Eamonn began playing the uillean pipes at age 14. Since then, his primary influences have been the great pipers Johnny Doran, Willie Clancy, and Patsy Tuohey.

These three fine musicians are not to be missed! The concert will be held at the Washington Ethical Society auditorium, 7750 16th St., N.W., at 8:30~p.m. Admission is \$3 for FSGW members and \$4 for nonmembers. See you there.

Faroe Islands "Stringband" Spaelimenninir i Hoyølum Sept. 19



Spaelimenninir i Hoyølum, a Scandinavian string band from the Faroe Islands, will give a concert on Saturday, September 19, at the Hirshhorn Museum auditorium.

The group brings an evening of instrumental offerings that are high on pure joy and excitement. Behind the distinctive hardandger fiddle of Janne Danielsson, the group's founder Kristian Blak on piano, bassist Magnus Paul, and guitarist Iver Baerentsen create an infectious accompaniment and rhythm for a wide range of Scandinavian dance music and song. Former Washington resident Sharon Weiss blends her pennywhistle and recorder with the intricate melodies of her fellow musicians.

While much of the group's music is from the Faroe Islands (a group of small islands in the North Atlantic between Scotland, Iceland, and Norway), they also reflect the broader heritage of the North Atlantic shores, performing a smattering of Celtic tunes from both sides of the ocean.

The concert is cosponsored by the Smithsonian Institution's Office of Folklife programs, and will be held in the Hirshhorn Museum auditorium on the Mall. The date, again, is Saturday, September 19. The concert begins at 8:30 p.m. Tickets (at the door) are \$3 for FSGW members and \$4 for nonmembers. For more information, call the FSGW hotline at 281-2228.

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FSGW Sampler Sept. 25 to Showcase Members' Talents

Two or three times each year, the Folklore Society features its own members in a Sampler Concert-- a kind of smorgasbord of FSGW members' diverse talents. This year's first Sampler Concert will be held Friday, September 25, and will feature Bob Hitchcock, Steve Scantlin, Chance Shiver, and FSGW's Sacred Harp Sing and Gospel Sing groups.

In the case of Bob Hitchcock, England's loss was FSGW's gain. From Britain, Bob has brought a fine repertoire of sea shanties, drinking songs, lovely lyric songs from the British Isles, and ballads. When not performing solo, Bob is a member of The Boarding Party.

Steve Scantlin, one of FSGW's newest members, is gaining recognition as one of the area's finer fiddlers, particularly in the style popularized by groups such as the Skillet Lickers in the 1920s. He'll be on hand to provide a sample of his fiddle music at this concert.

If you've never been to Grant's Tomb on a Sunday night, Chance Shiver (who leads the open stage at "the Tomb") will show you what you've missed: mellow "C&W" accompanied by some mighty fine guitar picking.

And finally, representatives of FSGW's Sacred Harp and Gospel Sing groups will round out a fine musical evening and give everyone a chance to sing along and harmonize with some great old hymns and gospel songs. FSGW has had a Sacred Harp sing almost every month since the Society was founded in 1964; the monthly Gospel Sing is younger, but no less enthusiastic.

All the music begins at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, September 25, at the Washington Ethical Society auditorium, 7750 16th Street, N.W. (at Kalmia Road). Admission is \$3 for FSGW members and \$4 for nonmembers. As in the past, all the performers are donating their talents, and all proceeds from the concert will go to help FSGW sponsor other traditional music activities throughout the year.

Announcing Getaway XVII - Bring Your Flashlight!!

The Folklore Society's annual Getaway weekend will be held Friday through Monday, October 9 - 12, 1981. Our special yearly retreat to the autumn woods will again be at Prince William Forest Park, but because the camp we ordinarily use is undergoing some renovations, WE WILL USE A DIFFERENT CAMP THIS YEAR. Camp #2, Mawavi, is reached from I-95 South by taking Route 619 toward Prince William Forest Park, continuing about four miles, and turning right.

Because we are in a new camp, we will have some different facilities for our activities. There is a campfire circle with benches for workshops and evening sings, and a boat dock area on the lake for all those water-lore workshops. As always, the Getaway weekend will be abuzz with jam sessions, concerts, nature walks, workshops, dances, sings, plus good food and good friends. (Make new friends BEFORE the Getaway - carpool!)

Camp Mawavi has four cabin areas, each with a lodge and cold-water latrines. Cabin sizes vary from cozy doubles to groups of fourteen, but most of them hold four folks. Cabins provide cots and mattresses; campers bring bedding and towels.

Getaway activities begin Friday evening, with arrival anytime after 5 pm, but remember, there is NO DINNER served Friday. Come to the dining hall to meet other Getaway participants, and from 7 to 9 pm, learn to create cat's cradles and other fun things with string. The evening square dance begins at 9 pm, and an open sing starts at 10 pm.

Music workshops, led by FSGW members, will be held at several areas during the day on Saturday and Sunday. We will also schedule two days of dance workshops, plus quilting and some other crafts to learn. After the evening concert on Saturday, the Sunshine Skiffle Band will play for a late boogie in the dining hall. We have asked the Blue Sky Puppet Theatre to return this year to help the children create their own puppets and present their own puppet show. Blue Sky will do something for the grown-ups this time, too. On Sunday, the foursome will present a Celtic folk tale in an unusual style of puppetry.

Your cost for the entire weekend, including lodging and all meals Saturday and Sunday, is \$30 adults, \$14 children under 14, and free for children under two (who bring their own beds). Members of FSGW have first preference until September 11, then it's first come, first served until spaces are filled. Payment in full must accompany your registration form.

All adult registrants will be expected to help with chores at some point during the weekend. Providing our own labor is very important to the smooth operation of the Getaway, and keeps costs down. There is space on the registration form for you to indicate whether you can help on Friday or Monday, or you may sign up at the park. Everyone must obey park regulations, including no alcoholic beverages and no pets allowed.

If you can't come for the entire weekend, you may register for either Saturday, Sunday, or both for the day-time activities. Prices are \$4 adults, \$2 children under 14 (two and under, free) per day. NO FOOD is available for day registrants, so plan to bring a picnic large enough to feed your whole group for the time you are there. Tent camping is not allowed within the Getaway site, but it is available nearby. Contact Prince William Forest Park, telephone: 703/221-1744 for more information.

A PRAIRIE HOME COMPANION COMES TO WASHINGTON

Many FSGW members have heard "A Prairie Home Companion," especially since it has been broadcast nationally over National Public Radio stations. This unique radio program originates in St. Paul, Minnesota, and is heard in Washington over WETA-FM 91 on Saturdays at 8 p.m.

The one and only Garrison Keillor and the crew of "A Prairie Home Companion" are going on the road in October, and will present two shows in Washington: at 8:00 p.m. Friday, October 16, and at 5:30 p.m. Saturday, October 17, at Lisner Auditorium, 21st and G Streets, N.W., Washington, D.C. Friday's show will be taped for future broadcast; Saturday's will air live beginning at 6:00 p.m.

Keillor's home-grown wit and whimsical "commercials" for Powdermilk Biscuits and for the shops and services of the mythical "Lake Wobegon" Minnesota have drawn attention from the <u>Wall Street Journal</u>, <u>Rolling Stone</u>, and thousands of admiring fans.

The Washington shows will feature the Butch Thompson Trio from St. Paul, as well as several Washington area folk performers.

Tickets are available by mail, and WETA (which is sponsoring the shows as part of its fall fund-raising marathon) will begin promoting the concerts in the next few days. Seats are reserved; the best go first. To see what Garrison Keillor really looks like, get your ticket to a "Prairie Home Companion" Washington performance.

KHMER CLASSICAL BALLET ON SEPTEMBER 3

On Thursday, September 3, the Library of Congress' American Folklife Center will host an outdoor concert featuring the classical and folk dance of Cambodia performed by the Khmer Classical Ballet. The free concert will take place from noon to 1:30 p.m. on the Library's Neptune Plaza.

The members of the Khmer Classical Ballet carry on a dance tradition that developed in Cambodia a thousand years ago. Interrupted once for a period of some 500 years during the Middle Ages, the tradition was very nearly lost a second time in 1975 when the Khmer Rouge took over Cambodia. A complete loss of the tradition was averted only by the courage and tenacity of a few members of the royal Cambodian ballet, who disguised their identities and eventually arrived at the refugee camps in Thailand. In the Thai camps, the few scattered members of the troupe slowly reassembled and began once again to teach the dances to young girls.

By the time they were moved to the Khao I Dang camp, well inside the Thai border, they had formed a cohesive group of 40 dancers, singers, and musicians who were determined to stick together. The first dance performance that the group gave at the camp electrified the camp's 160,000 refugees who saw the dances as symbols of the revival of their shattered culture.

The group, which now numbers 50, began leaving the refugee camps at the end of last summer and have now settled in Wheaton, Maryland. With a grant from the National Council for the Traditional Arts and assistance from other organizations, they have been able to make the colorful costumes, masks, and accessories used in their performances. The concert at the Library will feature 15 dancers, four musicians, and three singers in one long and several short dances and musical numbers.

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TAKOMA PARK FOLK FESTIVAL IS SEPTEMBER 13

The Fourth Annual Takoma Park Folk Festival will be held on Sunday, September 13, at the Takoma Park Junior High School. The festival will feature several well-known area performers and groups representing a wide variety of folk music. 
