September Program Features The Smokey Valley Boys



On Friday, September 10, FSGW will hold the first of the new season's regular programs (held the second Friday of the month). In honor of this festive occasion, a fine traditional old-time stringband from North Carolina, The Smokey Valley Boys, will perform. Their sound is a powerful combination of traditional and newer country music. Band members are Benton Flippen, fiddle; Paul Sutthin, guitar; Berlin Clifton, mandolin; and Paul Brown, banjo.

The band is a direct descendent of the Camp Creek Boys, whose members included the legendary Fred Cockerham on fiddle and Kyle Creed on banjo. The Smokey Valley Boys have won at countless fiddlers' conventions in the South, and have appeared at the Festival of American Fiddle Tunes in Port Townsend, Washington; Pinewoods Camp in Massachusetts; and at many concerts, dances, and radio shows.

Benton Flippen has developed a unique fiddling style with a smooth bow technique and plenty of unusual slides. Paul Sutthin calls himself "The Last Clawhammer Guitar Player," and once you've heard--and seen--his amazing right-hand technique, you'll understand why. Paul Brown has picked clawhammer

banjo since childhood, and Berlin Clifton completes the lineup with his old-time, chug-along mandolin playing.

Don't miss a great chance to hear a great old-time band, as they play and sing everything from the oldest tunes of their region to classic country songs, original fiddle compositions, and music of Arthur Smith and Tommy Magness.

The concert begins at 8:30 p.m., Friday, Sept. 10, at the WES Auditorium, 7750 16th St., N.W. (near Kalmia). Admission is free to FSGW members, and \$4.00 for nonmembers.

To get to the concert via public transportation, take the Metro red line to the Silver Spring station. From there, take the S-4 bus (marked Federal Triangle) to 16th & Kalmia. The bus runs every 15 minutes. Or take the S-4 bus marked "Silver Spring" from Federal Triangle or Metro Center in downtown D.C. Buses leave every 15 minutes and stop near the Ethical Society building.

The Lees will share the evening with Kel Watkins, of Perth, Australia. Kel is a poet and reciter of Australian bush ballads. These stories from the spoken ballad tradition of Australia bring to life the shearers, drovers, swagmen, and other characters of the Australian outback. "The Man From Ironbark," "Holy Dan," and "The Horizontal Champ" are just a few of the characters you'll meet in stories told by Kel in an entertaining--and often humorous--style.



It's almost here! The 1982 FSCW Getaway will be held September 24-26 at YMCA Camp Letts in Edgewater, Maryland, one mile from the Chesapeake Bay. If you haven't registered to come for the whole weekend, plan to join us as a day registrant. The advance registration form for day attendance is below. Just fill it out and mail to Jody Fitterer, P.O. Box 553, Bladensburg, MD 20710-0553. Or, you can come to the camp on Friday night (for the dance), Saturday, Sunday, or all three, and register and pay there. Admission is \$3.00 for the Friday night dance, which begins at 8:30 p.m., and will be called by Bob Dalsemer. Saturday or Sunday admission is \$5.00 per day for adults, \$2.50 per day for children 14 and under.

Song workshop topics during the weekend will include many of the old favorites, such as ballads, blues, gospel, and Sacred Harp. Other workshops include foreign songs, occupational hazards, Irish and Irish-American songs, train songs, pocket instruments, storytelling, and canoe lore. Also featured: two-day sessions of basic guitar and basic banjo. The Blue Sky Puppet Theatre will once again be on hand to work with (and entertain) the kids.

Dance workshops will include clogging, jitterbug, and Scandinavian dance. Craft workshops on basket weaving, fly tying, and waulking (plan to get wet, and dress accordingly) will be held.

To reach Camp Letts, take Rte. 50 to the Davidsonville exit (Rte. 424). Follow to Davidsonville (1st traffic light), and turn left on Rte. 214. This will take you to the camp, which is a right turn after you pass Rte. 468. Watch the signs. Please plan to carpool if possible. Parking should be adequate, but the fewer cars there are, the easier it will be for all of us. REMEMBER: No pets or alcohol!
