Dalglish, Larsen & Sutherland Perform September 3rd

Malcolm Dalglish, Grey Larsen and Pete Sutherland are as innovative, ecletic and surprising a trio of musicians, singers and zany performers as could be wanted. They bring their hammer dulcimer, flute, fiddle, concertina, banjo and keyboard facilities to Washington in an FSGW special event, Saturday, September 3, in an 8:30 pm concert at Bradley Hill Presbyterian Church, 6601 Bradley Blvd., Bethesda, Md.

Dalglish, Larsen and Sutherland play and sing Kentucky dance tunes, Irish music, old ballads, new-made and old-time songs, glimpses of gone-by days, and occasional outbursts of profoundly improbable and vivid nonsense.



The concert is being held in a new (for FSGW) hall. To get there <u>from town:</u> come out Wisconsin Ave. to Bradley Blvd. (first light in Bethesda proper), go left (west) on Bradley approx. 3 miles to just before Fernwood Ave, where you'll see the church's parking lots on your right. From Maryland: take I-495 to Old Georgetown Rd, go south (towards D.C.) to Huntington Parkway (the light just after you've passed NIH). Turn right on Huntington Pkwy. and go to the next light, which is Bradley Blvd. Turn right and continue to Fernwood Rd. (about lightless). From Virginia: Take I-495 to River Road East (into D.C.). Go to Wilson Lane (2nd light). Turn left on Wilson Lane, and go to Bradley Blvd. A left on Bradley and a mile and a half to the church. Bradley Blvd. is on the T-1 Metrobus line (from Friendship Heights). Alternative Maryland Route: I-495 to Old Georgetown Rd. South to Greentree Rd. (opposite the South Drive entrance to NIH). Go right on Greentree till you reach the church, which is situated between Bradley Blvd. and Greentree Rd. with parking lots on all sides.

Admission is \$4 for FSGW members and \$5 for non-members.

Afro-Cuban Group, Kubanakán First Program of Season



The opening monthly program in the 1983-1984 FSGW season September 9 features the driving rhythms, intricate vocals and vibrant dances of Kubanakan, an eight-piece Afro-Cuban group now living in the Washington area. Kubanakan's performances draw on the musical history of Cuba's African population, from the earliest days of slavery on sugar plantations to the later rumba, mambo, chachacha and other popular dance music forms which blend African and European elements. A typical program might range from ancient African drum songs to a fiesta conga dance.

The 8:30 pm concert takes place at the WES auditorium, 7750 16th St., N.W., near Kalmia Rd. Admission is free for FSGW members and \$4. for non-members.

To get to the concert via public transportation, take the Metro red line to the Silver Spring station. From there, take the S-4 bus (marked "Federal Triangle") to 16th and Kalmia, N.W. (WES auditorium is located about 2 blocks inside the District line).

JOE & ANTOINETTE McKENNA Sept. 11th



Joe and Antoinette McKenna are two remarkable musicians from Ireland. Joe is a master of the uillean pipes (the Irish bellows-operated kind), tin whistle and accordian, while Antoinette plays harp and sings in the sean nos (old style). Joe comes from a family of pipers. and has absorbed and extended the art of playing, creating his own individual style. Antoinette's parents imparted a great love of traditional music to her, and she made frequent trips to country singers and musicians to learn her craft. Both of the McKennas learned their music at the hands of older, traditional music-makers, and exhibit a


deep understanding of their country's musical heritage.

Joe and Antoinette will present their ballads, humorous songs, jigs, reels, slow airs, and their own tradition-based compositions in an FSGW special-event concert, Sunday, September 11, at the Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church, 6601 Bradley Blvd., Bethesda, Md. Erik Ilott, the Bristol Shantyman, Sept. 30th

From across the sea -- Bristol, England -- comes the rare pleasure of Erik Ilott's songs, music and tales on Friday, September 30, at 8:30 pm.

Erik sailed with the Royal and Merchant Navies, and is the official Shantyman to the "Bristol Shiplovers Society," formed in 1931 for men who served under sail. He sings shanties, forebitters, ward-room songs and many other songs associated with the sea. He accompanies himself on several diverse instruments such as the bosun's call and bones (seven at a time!), and is also a gifted storyteller, presenting tales of the seas and the men who sailed them with wit and knowledge. His record, Shipshape and Bristol Fashion has sold in 18 countries.





Sept. 23rd FSGW Sampler Concert Part of a Tradition

A continuing tradition in the Folklore Society is the Sampler Concert, which brings the talents of Society members to the attention of the public. The first Sampler concerts featured various combinations, from solos to ensembles, while later ones consisted of three or four "acts", each one distinct from the others. The 1983 Fall Sampler combines these two approaches, as Carly Gewirz Mack-all, Alan Mackall, Susie Mathieu Cornell, Dave Olive and Mark Radomski join their voices and instruments in a tapestry of folk talent on Friday, September 23, at 8:30 pm, at the WES auditorium. 7750 16th St.. N.W.

Carly Gewirz Mackall is a clear-voiced singer of ballads and lyric songs. Her husband, Alan, plays concertina, tin whistle, banjo, and guitar and sings everything from Irish songs to gold rush ditties. Susie Mathieu Cornell is a singer of English, Scottish and American ballads, plus several hundred zany parodies and other musical oddments. Dave Olive is a bearish, bearded, blues and country guitar-picker and singer with an irrepressible sense of humor. Mark Radomski found his musical self in the Appalachians; he plays banjo, fiddle and guitar, and sings those "lonesome hill-country songs."

FSGW GETAWAY XIX OCTOBER 7-9

Attention all lovers of good music, dance, crafts, and general fun. The 19th annual FSGW Getaway will take place Friday through Sunday, October 7-9. This year we will be again at YMCA Camp Letts, located on a peninsula one mile from the Chesapeake Bay in Edgewater, MD. The camp provides cabins that sleep 12 people each. Cabins are equipped with beds and mattresses; you must bring bedding or sleeping bags. Also don't forget warm clothes, rain gear and flashlights.

Activities will begin on Friday night with a potluck supper followed by a dance and the October Open Sing. On Saturday and Sunday, there will be workshops on music, dance, and crafts during the day. Each evening's dinner will be followed by a concert and sing. Saturday night there will be a second dance. In addition to these planned activities, the camp offers canoes, sailboats, tennis, horseback riding, and a swimming pool. (Some of these involve a slight additional charge.)

Because last year's Getaway lost money for the first time in FSGW history, we regretfully have to raise the registration fee again this year. The entire weekend, including meals (planned and cooked by us this year), will cost \$35.00 for children 2-14 years of age and \$45.00 for all those over 14. There is no charge for children under 2.

FSGW members will get preference until September 23. After that, the remaining spaces will be filled on a first-come, first served basis. Payment in full must accompany your application. Everyone registering for the entire weekend is expected to volunteer one hour of time helping in the kitchen, or other chores. There will be a sign-up sheet at the camp.

All of the usual rules will apply, including \underline{no} pets and \underline{no} alcoholic beverages allowed. Because of the large ammounts of waterfront area at the camp, parents with small children should be prepared to take extra care.

If you plan to come as a day registrant for Saturday, Sunday, or both, admission will be \$5.00 per day for adults and \$2.50 per day for children 2-14. Day registration does not entitle you to meals or a cabin space. You can use the form in this Newsletter, or you can come to Camp Letts for the day and pay when you arrive. Tent camping is available near the camp. For information call Jennifer Woods at 528-8537.
