FIDDLE FEVER JULY 14

Calling themselves "a fiddlers' convention on wheels." Fiddle Fever will bring its unique blend of fiddle music and songs to Washington on Saturday, July 14th. The band consists of five top-notch solo musicians, four of whom play (you guessed it!) fiddle. Their music includes mountain, Scandinavian, swing, bluegrass, Cajun, and Celtic fiddling traditions. The concert will be held at Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church, 6601 Bradley Blvd., Bethesda, MD, (AIR CONDITIONED) and begins at 8:30 pm. Admission is \$4. for FSGW members, and \$5. for nonmembers.

Band leader Jay Ungar is a versatile musician whose fiddling can be heard on more than 30 albums. He also (cont. on page 2)

pays a mean mandolin. Fiddle and viola player <u>Evan Stover</u> is a whiz at country/western and bluegrass music, and has performed and recorded with an impressive variety of bands and artists. <u>Matt Glaser</u>, on fiddle and piano, plays jazz and swing, and also serves as chairman of the string department of the Berklee School of Music in Boston. Guitarist and fiddler Russ Barenberg is the author of several guitar instruction books, and has played both lead and back-up guitar with many performers. Bass player <u>Molly Mason</u>, who also plays guitar, has been a regular musician on "A Prairie Home Companion," and is a much-sought-after accompanist.

They'll all be here to explore a whole world of traditional fiddle tunes and songs on Saturday, July 14th. Be there for a toe-tapping first appearance for FSGW by this exciting band. This one is bound to be a sure-fire cure for those midsummer doldrums!

British Isles Music With Holdstock & MacLeod June 15

Allan MacLeod and Dick Holdstock bring songs, tunes and stories from their native Scotland and England to an FSGW house concert on Friday, June 15. The duo has delighted audiences from Massachusetts to California with their songs of love, labor and the sea, as well as their mandolin and guitar playing. Their last East Coast tour was in 1981, and included a house concert here, and an appearance at the Mystic Seaport Festival in Mystic, Connecticut.

Allan MacLeod was born in Armadale, Scotland, and was actively involved in the early days of the British Folk Revival. Dick Holdstock, from Sittingborne, Kent, England, has appeared at clubs and concerts on the West Coast, and has sponsored concerts of traditional performers for over ten years. Both men play guitar & mandolin, and Allan is also a first-rate storyteller. They always sing songs with great choruses, and involve the audience in each performance.



This concert will be held at the home of Ursy Potter, conveniently located in McLean, Virginia, just off the beltway near the Cabin John Bridge from Maryland. The 8:30 concert costs \$3 for FSGW members, and \$4 for non-members. Call 821-1373 for directions.

SAUL BROUDY HOUSE CONCERT JUNE 28

Singer, guitar player, and harmonica virtuoso Saul Broudy is a dynamic and varied performer with a songbag of traditional country songs, blues, instrumentals, and contemporary compositions. Long a mainstay of the Philadelphia area, Saul imbues his performances with his ability, his knowledge, and his whimsical wit. Saul traveled for a time with U. Utah Phillips, acting as accompanist, companion, and co-author.

Saul seldom visits the Washington area, and comes even more rarely to perform. He usually travels to this city only to work on the staff of the Smithsonian Festival of American Folklife, where he acts as stage manager, researcher, and technical assistant, so it is a special treat to get to hear him actually sing and play.

This concert will be held in the new home of Bob Clayton and Jennifer Woods, located in Arlington, VA, near the Glebe Rd. exit from I-66, and only four blocks from the Ballston Metro station. Admission is \$3 for FSGW members and \$4 for non-members. Call 528-8537 for directions.

IN MEMORIAM Joe Heaney 1920-1984

In the Fall of 1968, the Folklore Society of Greater Washington opened its fifth season with a solo concert by Joe Heaney, one of the first given in the U.S. by this supreme Irish sean-nos (singer of songs) and seanchai (teller of tales). Joe came to Washington many times during the next 15 years for FSGW concerts, Smithsonian Festivals, Gaelic League programs, and a National Council on the Arts presentation. In 1982 the National Endowment for the Arts gave him one of their first National Heritage Awards. Many FSGW members, including Kathy and myself, were his friends, and friends seemed as precious to Joe as a good song or story. Joe's friendship was certainly so for us.

In the Spring of 1984, in Seattle, Washington, Joe Heaney passed away. His body has been flown to Ireland and buried at his birthplace, near Carna, in the Connemara Gaeltacht. His legacy and his spirit are with us, as is Joe himself.
