STEWARTS of BLAIR AUGUST 9th

On Saturday, August 9th, FSGW will present a special concert by The Stewarts of Blair, an extraordinary family of Scottish singers performing the traditional music of Scotland's gypsies, or "traveling people." This is the first-ever FSGW concert by 80-year-old singer Belle Stewart; her daughter, singer Sheila Stewart; and her grandson, piper Ian MacGregor. The Stewarts will appear at the Lyceum, a lovely AIR-CONDITIONED hall located at 201 S. Washington St. (GW Parkway) at the corner of Prince St. in Old Town Alexandria.

Born in her traveling-parents' tent on the banks of the river Tay in 1906, Belle Stewart learned her large repertoire of songs from her ballad-singing father and the other "tinker" folk who roamed the Scottish countryside with the family. She, in turn, has passed those songs on to her daughters and grandson. "Discovered" by Scottish folklorist Hamish Henderson in 1954, the family has since appeared at festivals and folk clubs around the world and recorded seven LPs. This year, Queen Elizabeth awarded Belle the British Empire Medal for her contributions to Scottish folk music.

The concert begins at 8:30 pm, Saturday, August 9th. Admission is \$4. for FSGW members and \$6. for nonmembers (\$1. discount for senior citizens). Some parking is available in the lot adjacent to the Lyceum; plenty of street parking also available.





Cindy Mangsen August 2nd

Cindy Mangsen, the woman Art Thieme calls "my favorite singer of the old songs," will make her FSGW debut in a house concert on Saturday, August 2nd, at the home of Bill Day and Rita Ferrara in Wheaton, MD. Cindy sings traditional and contemporary folksongs and ballads, accompanying herself on guitar, mountain dulcimer, concertina, and five-string banjo. Her repertoire ranges from haunting ancient ballads to songs by Si Kahn, Jean Ritchie, Greg Brown, and other modern songwriters.

With what one critic described as "a voice that can warm a New England winter," Cindy has appeared in concert with such performers as Pete Seeger and Dave Van Ronk, and has sung on three recent Tom Paxton LPs. Her own LP, Long Time Traveling, was chosen one of the top folk albums of 1983 by the Chicago Reader. Cindy currently lives in Bennington, Vt., and makes frequent appearances in folk clubs throughout the Northeast.

When FSGW schedules concerts, the Society assures the performers that only an official, archival recording will be made--with their permission, of course--of their performance. It is FSGW's policy to allow <u>ABSOLUTELY NO TAPING</u> of any Society concert by individuals. In many cases, performers allow FSGW to make listening copies of official concert tapes for members. When this is allowed, a member pays: 1) a fee for the recording engineer's time, 2) the cost of cassette tape(s), <u>AND</u> 3) a royalty fee for the performer. For more information on obtaining material from FSGW's tape archive, contact our tape archivist, Mike Rivers at (703)241-7445.

FSGW EDITORIAL POLICY

We try to print all copy that is relevant to FSGW's purpose, and membership [Quote from the FSGW Bylaws: "The main purpose of the Society is to further the understanding, investigation, appreciation, and performance of the traditional folk music and folklore of the American people." However, in most instances, it is simply impossible to print announcements in full. When space is tight, FSGW news receives top priority, followed by local non-FSGW news, followed by listings of out-of-town, Non-FSGW events.

Because so many dancers seek dances with live musicians, all dance events articles submitted should state whether the music is live or recorded. We do this as a service to our members. No dance copy will be used unless it so states.
