Ethel Caffie Austin, The Word of God Youth Choir & YOU!! Saturday, February 4



The Folklore Society is made up of people who love to sing. Ethel Caffie Austin is a Gospel singer and teacher from West Virginia who creates magic from people who love to sing. What better material can she have but you from which to form a Gospel choir! And what better place to house this gathering of singers than the majestic Great Hall of the National Building Museum in downtown DC, Saturday, February 4th.

You are invited to participate in this event. Come form a Gospel choir under the direction of Ethel Caffie Austin at the 1 pm workshop and then share the stage in an evening concert of Southern Gospel for voice and piano by Ms. Austin and the contemporary, community-based Gospel of the Word of God Youth Choir.

Ethel has been immersed in Gospel all her life. At age six she was taking piano lessons; at nine, she was music coordinator of her church choir. At 14, she was organizing and directing singers from ten congregations. Now she shares her Gospel talents through "Gospel for Everyone" workshops at festivals and conferences, such as the Augusta Heritage Arts Workshops. Ethel can take a small group of interested amateurs or a full-scale chorus of practiced Gospel students and create a sound of beauty, spontaneity and

John McCoy and the musical direction of Daryl Mims, the choir has 25 members between 15 and 30, and were winners of the "Best Choir" category at the Kennedy Center's Gospel Competition this year.

Combined admission for both concert and workshop, payable at the workshop starting at 1 pm is \$10 for FSGW members and \$12 nonmembers. Concert- only admission is \$6. members, \$8. nonmembers. The doors will open for the concert at 7:45 pm.

Okyerema Asante, African Percusionsit, January Program, Friday the 13th

The January FSGW Program, Friday, January 13th, at 8:30 pm in the WES Auditorium, features Okyerema Asante.

Okyerema Asante arrived in America nearly 13 years ago in 1976, when Hugh Masekela encouraged him to tour with him. Asante recorded six albums with Masekela following that tour. Amazingly, he became a master drummer at age 10 and is known in Ghana as "the Master Basher." Asante captivates audiences around the world with his throbbing African rhythms with a jazz flavor. The African drum tradition is a key primary source of American music, a pre-echo of rhythms, harmonies, and dynamics that run through the Afro-American continuum (fife and drum music, rags, "Jump" blues, stride, swing, bop, funk) and spill over into such black-influenced white music forms as Dixieland, bluegrass and rock 'n roll.

Asante, in his solo percussion performance, shifts through 30 or so instruments and countless rhythm changes. Playing primarily the Balafon (similar to our xylophone), he keeps a steady beat with various rattles and bells attached to his ankles and thighs. Most recently, he toured with Paul Simon on the Graceland Tour and at present he is touring with Fleetwood Mac. After his performance at WES, he will be happy to answer questions about his homeland, Ghana, the music, the instruments, Paul Simon and his last 12 years living in Springfield, VA. Programs are FREE to FSGW members, \$4. for nonmembers. WES Auditorium is at 7750 Sixteenth St., NW, D.C., two lights inside the District from the Maryland line, at the corner of Kalmia Rd.

Saul Broudy House Concert Friday, January 20th in Falls Church

From Philadelphia, Saul Broudy comes to DC for a house concert at the home of Mike Rivers in Falls Church, VA on Friday, January 20th at 8:30 pm.

With a career spanning 20 years on the folk music circuit, Saul sings country, blues and other traditional and contemporary forms of grassroots American music, accompanying himself on acoustic guitar and harmonica.

Saul's performances make American music come to life; from the traditional sounds of Appalachia, Louisiana and Texas, to standards, and modern country, and he presents it in a way that allows the roots of the music to shine through.

The late Steve Goodman, with whom Saul performed and recorded for many years, described him as "an entertainer and communicator of the first order who works to bring what is great about American music to the forefront of everyone's consciousness."

chorus songs, gospel songs, or your own songs. Join in singing songs from the *Sacred Harp*. Song swaps are lead by Susan Graham White, Mike Waters, and others. Learn about sea songs, how to personalize your songs, how many traditional songs have changed. Tutorials are lead by the Boarding Party, Bob Clayton, Carly Gewirz, and more. Bring your guitars, hammer dulcimers, autoharps, pennywhistles, or whatever to the instrumental workshops and jam sessions lead by the Mill Run Dulcimer Band, Sam Rizzetta, Mike King, Philippe Varlet, and others.

Bring your dancing shoes (wooden floors) and come out swinging or waltzing, or join in the squares, contras, English or Scandinavian dances with live bands and callers all day. Dances for all levels (introductory to advanced) and exhibitions. Listen and participate in stories by, with, and for everyone by Al Booth, Charlotte Smutko and many more. Learn from technical sessions how to run and use sound systems. Or bring your questions and stringed instruments to Marc Glickman at the stringed instrument evaluation and repair clinic. Taste the tempting food from Ma McClatchy's Trail's End Kitchen with treats for lunch like shrimp cheddar bisque and Mississippi MudCakes, or for dinner try her Cajun chicken or Babuti.

After dinner, enjoy three hours of a sampler concert by Joe Hickerson, Side by Side, Sam Rizzetta, and Ironweed. Or dance to the lively strains of Little Red and the Renegades and then to New Hampshire's own Steve Zakon and Evening Star. Or enjoy some of each. Both start at 7:30 and end at 10:30. 

It is with great sadness that we announce the death of Erik Ilott in Bristol, England on November 23, 1988.

Erik, known as the Bristol Shantyman, sang in the D.C. area several times during this past decade. His extensive repertoire of shanties, forebitters, shore sea-songs, and more were collected during his world-wide travels. He played many instruments, including banjo, concertina, and zither, but Erik's favorite accompaniment was to play the bones — seven at a time!! He was also a gifted storyteller whose tales of the sea and the men who sailed them were told with knowledge and wit. To his songs he brought his unique styles, to his stories a humorous eloquence, and to his friendships a wonderful sparkle.

To his wife, Fiona, and his daughter Anya and family we extend our deepest sympathy. Those of us who were fortunate to know Erik have lost a special friend, and the world of folk music has had another irreplaceable loss. Erik will live on in our memories of happy times spent with him, and in the songs we sing that he taught us.
