# 20th Annual MiniFest Saturday, January 25, 1992 Takoma Park Intermediate School Afternoon Events Noon - 6 pm Concert and Dance 7:30 - 10:30 pm



The end of January is the time for the MiniFest, the Folklore Society of Greater Washington's annual fund raising event. The MiniFest is an opportunity to get out of your house and participate in a day-long event of song, music, storytelling, crafts and dance. The Takoma Park Intermediate School, 7911 Piney Branch Rd, Takoma Park, MD will once again be the location for the MiniFest. Workshops, song swaps, and mini-concerts will start at noon, as will programs for children and various dance events. The afternoon events will run until 6 pm. An evening concert and a dance will start (concurrently) at 7:30 pm and end around 10:30.

# **Afternoon Events**

The theme of the afternoon is Participation by Everyone. Events include song swaps, instrumental "jams," folk song, harmony singing and instrumental tutorials. These sessions are guided by selected members of the folk community with participation by all encouraged. The tutorials tend to be structured with the leaders teaching or demonstrating some particular facet of folklore. The song swaps and jams are open, to allow members of the folk community to trade songs, stories or arts. Examples of scheduled song swaps are Sacred Harp (shape note), Chorus Songs, Parodies and "This is 1965." Instrumental jams will include a Slow Jam, Old Time String Band and Clog sessions and for the first time, a participatory big band Skiffle session. Dance events include a contradance medley, vintage, squares, and international folk dances. All dance sessions have live music. Some sessions will be directed at beginners, others at more experienced dancers. There will also be mini-concerts by local folk performers. These may include instrumental concerts, storytelling sessions, and folk singers. Events tailored for families and children will be scheduled throughout the afternoon. A number of craft artisans will exhibit their handicrafts and demonstrate their skills.

# **Evening Concert and Dance**

The evening events feature a sampler concert. The performers this year are: Lisa Null - Traditional and Country Songs with Gusto; Anne Sheldon - Storyteller; Boarding Party - Sea Chanteys, Work Songs and more; and The Buffalo Nickel Band - Western Swing, Blues, & Jazz. The evening dance features contra dances and squares with calling by a number of local callers. The music will be provided by the MiniFest Orchestra, a gathering of many local dance musicians. Musicians are encouraged to bring their instruments and "sit in" with the MiniFest Orchestra.

All of the performers at the concerts and dances, the workshop leaders, the ticket sellers, the instrument checkers and even the "Gofers" are volunteers. # How Much?

As in the past two years, admission for FSGW members is \$10 All Day, including evening events, and \$6 Half Day for either the afternoon events or the evening concert and dance. Admission for non-members is \$12 All Day and \$8 Half Day. (You may join FSGW at the door). Children from 5 to 12 years of age are half price, children 4 years of age and under are FREE, and the maximum All Day family price is \$30 for FSGW members and \$36 for non-members. The maximum Half Day family price is \$18 for FSGW members and \$24 for non-members.

# All Winter Dances will be at Cherry Hill Park 7:30 - 10:30 pm

All winter dances (through March 15) will be at Cherry Hill Park Clubhouse, 9800 Cherry Hill Road, College Park, MD. From Beltway 495, take Exit 25B for Route 1 South toward College Park. At the second light (about 1/10 mile) turn right on Cherry Hill Road. Entrance is one mile on the left. From Interstate 95, take Exit 29B (MD Rt. 212, Powder Mill Road). Follow Rt. 212 one mile, turn left on Cherry Hill Road and go one mile. Entrance is on the right. Follow the main road one block past the stop sign. Go right and parking is straight ahead past the clubhouse building. DRIVE S L O W L Y TROUGH THE PARK! Bring clean, soft-soled shoes to protect the dance floor. The weekly dances are aimed at intermediate to advanced dancers (i.e., little teaching, short walk-throughs, lots of music & dancing). Dances start & end promptly. Admission is \$5.50 for FSGW, BFMS, ATDS, and CDSS members, NPS Golden Eagle Pass Holders and Senior Citizens; \$7.50 for non-members.

- Jan. 5: Swing in the new year with Jim Gregory calling mostly contras to New England, some French Canadian and some Southern tunes. Jim and the band of Bill Walach on mandolin, Will Welling on fiddle, and Dave Howard on guitar all join us from Connecticut and points near. - Jan. 12: With our own Michael Schechtman calling, we will be treated to an eclectic version of "the same old notes in a brilliant new combination" (you note, I quote). Said notes will be warmly delivered by Jacqueline Schwab on piano (from Boston--she's part of Bare Necessities), Andrea Hoag on fiddle (from Seattle), Charlie Pilzer on bass (local), and John Devine on guitar (also local).
- Jan. 19: Howard Bass and the Mighty Possums will create a lively night of dancing with jigs, reels, hornpipes and more. Hailing from NW Virginia are Joe DeZarn on fiddle and mandolin, Tabby Finch on piano and accordion, Seth Austen on guitar and Ralph Gordon on bass.

A Note From The Dance Chair. It's time for New Year's resolutions, and I would like to propose a few for your consideration. We refer to dancers as "the dance community." The term has been embraced because it implies mutual interest and support. As you have probably observed, there has lately been an imbalance of the sexes at some of the dances. Because of a local custom of booking dances ahead, frequently newcomers are the ones left sitting out when imbalances occur.

Here are some ideas to address the imbalance of sexes: When you see that someone has had to sit out, ask them to dance the next dance, or sit out a dance yourself to give another the chance to dance, or consider dancing with a partner of the same sex.

To welcome newcomers and increase your enjoyment of the dance community, you may want to use an idea provided by Larry Jennings of Boston, who has suggested that each night you dedicate three dances: one to someone whose name you don't know, one to someone of a different dance skill level, and one to someone with whom you most want to dance. Let's keep our dances open and vital. Happy New Year!




# **SWALLOWTAIL IN CONCERT** January Program Friday, Jan. 10, 8:30 pm

Here's a rare opportunity to hear one of the country's most popular contra-dance bands, Swallowtail, in a concert that will be in a brand-new auditorium at Capitol College, just four miles outside the Beltway near Beltsville, MD (see map/directions below).

Swallowtail blends traditional Irish and country dance tunes with classical themes in innovative arrangements that make for an unforgettable musical experience. The band alternates between driving reels and jigs and haunting, ethereal airs and melodies. Featured instruments include the violin, oboe, concertina, piano, hammered dulcimer, flute and bodhran.

The members of Swallowtail, George Marshall, David Cantieni, Ron Grosslein, Tim Van Egmond and Timm Triplett, are well known to Washington-area contra dancers. This concert offers a chance to focus on their exciting music in a setting that offers both good acoustics and close-up seating. Check it out!

# Traditional Singing Workshops with Jerry Epstein Coming Feb. 1 & 2, 1991

We have all had the experience of hearing someone with a beautiful voice whose singing somehow fails to hold our attention, while a singer with a rougher voice may captivate us completely. Why is this so? The answer can be called "style."

We will explore this phenomenon when Jerry Epstein leads a workshop for singers the weekend of February 1 & 2. Jerry has run these sessions at folk festivals, at Pinewoods Music Camp, in private classes, and for folk music societies throughout the Northeast for the past 15 years.

The sessions are run clinic-style, with each participant bringing a song to work on. The other participants will give their reactions, and Jerry will help the singer examine the song and explore its stylistic possibilities.

The goal of the workshop is the removal of obstacles—imitations and affectations that interfere with the words. The sessions are designed to raise the participants' awareness of what makes a good singer so riveting. The aim is to communicate the story with a minimum of distraction.

These are sessions for singers; participants should have some repertoire of songs, and they should feel comfortable singing. While these are not classes in voice production, aspects of voice placement and sound will be discussed as needed. Instrumental accompaniment is welcome, although participants will be encouraged to sing unaccompanied, at least at first. How the instrument affects vocal timing is an important topic for discussion.

The workshop runs Saturday AND Sunday, morning and afternoon, two sessions of about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours each, starting around 9:45 am. Attendance is limited to nine (9) so that each participant can work on a song in each session. Fee for the workshop is \$50 for both days, or \$35 for one day. The workshop will be held either in the Silver Spring area or in Virginia, depending on who signs up by January 10. Please register ASAP! # The Tenth Annual Chesapeake Spring Dance Weekend

# April 10 - 12, 1992

For 10 years, Chesapeake has presented the best in music and dance. This year we want to celebrate! On our 10th anniversary we're bringing back some of our favorite bands and callers and some great new friends. From New England, contradances with Wild Aparagus; squares and contras with John Krumm and the Hellbenders; clogging and stepdance taught by Sandy Silva; and, something completely different, Latin dancing with Peligro. The dancing starts Friday night at Camp Letts on the shores of the Chesapeake Bay and continues with more dancing, workshops and concerts throughout Saturday and Sunday. There will be plenty of opportunities for informal dancing, singing and music-making. As always, Chesapeake means great music, great calling, great dancers and a great setting in which to enjoy it all.

# **CAMP LETTS**

Located in Edgewater, Maryland, ten miles from Annapolis and 34 miles from Washington, D.C., Camp Letts is on a peninsula created by two rivers flowing into the Chesapeake Bay. The camp is owned and operated by the YMCA on the grounds of a former estate. The main dances will be held in the spacious wooden-floored dance hall overlooking the waterfront. This building doubles as the dining hall for delicious meals prepared by our caterer, Barbara Kline. Smaller workshops will be held in other buildings on the camp grounds. Weather permitting, we will also have access to other camp facilities including walking trails, tennis courts, athletic fields, boating, and horseback riding (modest fee). Cabins are dormitory style, sleeping 8-12 persons to a room.

# **STAFF**

Wild Asparagus - New England Dance Band. It hardly seems necessary to describe Wild Asparagus. They have delighted dancers from Alaska to Florida and at all of the dance camps in between. Everywhere, they have brought just the right dance with just the right combination of tunes and their own distinctive sound. Wild Asparagus will offer a variety of workshops in addition to daily and evening contradances. Coming from chilly New England to bring in the spring, Wild Asparagus is George Marshall calling and playing concertina, bones and bodhran; David Cantieni on oboe, flute, fife, recorder, saxophone, and whistles; Ann Percival on piano, guitar, synthesizer and vocals; Mary Lea on fiddle; and Sam Bartlett on banjo and mandolin.

Sandy Silva - Step Dance. Sandy Silva has been teaching and performing American step dance styles for 10 years. Based in Seattle, she has taught at dance camps from Pinewoods to Port Townsend. Although Sandy is a master of Appalachian, Cape Breton and other traditional step dance styles, she has also received rave reviews for her transformation of these sources into her own vision of tap. At Chesapeake Sandy will be teaching Appalachian clogging and what she calls percussive dance - rhythms for feet, hands and body.

John Krumm - Southern Caller. Last time we invited John to call "Southern" dances, he did dances from southern Appalachia, southern New England and southern Canada! We know better than to predict what John will do this year. We only know that it will be challenging, exciting and fun.

The Hellbenders - Southern Band. It's been said that "old time music is about rhythm." The music and rhythms of the Hellbenders have been making people dance at festivals, dances and camps around the country. The Hellbenders' members bring together the energy of the two great centers of modern old time music - Ithaca, N.Y. and Lexington, Va. In addition to playing for dances, they'll be playing for workshops and in concert. The Hellbenders are Bruce Molsky and James Leva on fiddle, Mary Winston on guitar, Dave Grant on bass, and special guest Dirk Powell on banjo.

Peligro - Peligro (Spanish for *Danger!*) is one of the most popular Latin bands in the Washington, D.C. area. The award-winning 10-piece group includes horns, bass, keyboard, vocals and lots of percussion. Peligro will play for instruction in basic Latin dances including merengue, mambo, cumbia and salsa. The teaching will emphasize understanding and moving to the music and enjoying the Latin rhythm.
