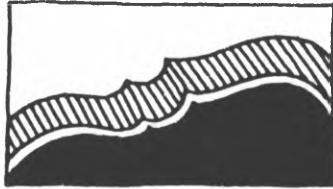

18TH ANNUAL WASHINGTON FOLK FESTIVAL SATURDAY, JUNE 4, 12pm to 11pm SUNDAY, JUNE 5, 12 pm to 6pm.

Just before noon on Sat., June 4, a group of Indonesian gamelan musicians and dancers, in elaborate and authentic costumes, will twist and snake their way in a parade through Glen Echo Park to open the 18th Annual Washington Folk Festival. Some 30 hours later, at dusk on Sun., June 5, the festival will close with the raucous kazoos, jugs, and tub thumping rhythms of the *Sunshine Skiffle Band's* early jazz music. Packed between those two performances will be dozens of concerts, workshops, crafts demonstrations, storytelling sessions, and family programs, all highlighting the D.C. area's wide cultural diversity. This year's program features many local favorites, including: Pete Kennedy and Maura Boudreau, Cathy Fink and Marcy Marxer, Bill Danoff, *The New St. George*, Doris Justis, *Ceoltoiri*, and Ben Andrews. There is a contradance to the sounds of *Future Geezers of America* Saturday night in the Spanish Ballroom -- beginners are welcome!

The Washington Folk Festival features the best of the Washington area's thriving and diverse community of traditional artists, presenting folk music, dance, story-telling, and crafts from some 30 countries on 7 stages. This two-day celebration--from noon to 11:30 pm on Saturday, June 4 and noon to 6 pm on Sunday, June 5--is FREE to the public (donations encouraged). The Festival is sponsored by the Folklore Society of Greater Washington (FSGW), with the cooperation of the National Park Service, the Montgomery County Commission on the Humanities, and WAMU 88.5-FM radio.

The Festival is truly a community affair. All the performers and staff donate their time and talents, in one of the largest all-volunteer community festivals in the nation. Because this is an all-volunteer event, the Festival needs your donations of time and money. For a tax deductible donation of \$25.00 you can become a "Friend of the Washington Folk Festival." You can support this event by bidding on some of the 80+ items our silent auction and by buying tickets for the baby quilt we are raffling at the Festival. 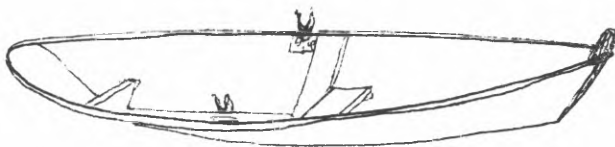

FSGW SUNDAY NIGHT DANCES

Glen Echo Park, Spanish Ballroom 7:30 - 10:30 PM

The Sunday night dances at Glen Echo Park in the Spanish Ballroom are held in cooperation with the National Park Service. Dances start & end promptly. - July 3 Hey! You don't have to work tomorrow! Come out and dance! **Tom Hinds** will call an evening of dances with Bo Bradham on fiddle and Craig DuBose on piano. From Charlottesville, Bo and Craig provide a great sound that will be sure to get you moving!
- July 10 Always a great dance when **John Krumm** calls! Don't miss this dance, as John calls to the music of *Francis Street*. This new band features local talent Angela Botzer on fiddle, Dennis Botzer on fiddle and flute, Drew Hillman on uilleann pipes, and Nigel Stevens on guitar.
- July 17 Great dancing tonight, as master choreographer and dance caller **Ron Buchanan** visits from Pittsburgh. Ron will be calling to the music of the *Pegheads*. The *Pegheads* are Michael Ballo of DC on fiddle, Kevin Enoch of Greenbelt on guitar, Kate Brett of Greenbelt on banjo, and Nancy Mamlin of Weaverville, NC, on bass.
- July 24 Coming back from Buffalo Gap, we're glad to have **Jan Dreschler** and *The NeanderBobs* swing by for a dance. *The NeanderBobs* are Bob Stein on accordion, Bob Mills on stringed instruments, and Bob Pasquerello on piano.
- July 31 From Baltimore, we're glad to have **Larry Edelman** coming to call some great dances to the music of *Fiddlestyx*! It'll be a hot time in the Spanish Ballroom tonight! (*Fiddlestyx* personnel are listed above -- see June 5.)

Note from the Dance Chair: As I said last month, this is it. I've officially relocated to North Carolina, and so the next writing you'll read here will be Paul's. I thought I'd close with a brief report of the 108 Sunday Night Dances that I've booked over the last two years. In that time, we've had 67 different bands and 49 different callers. Of those, 29 bands and 19 callers were from this area. Another way to look at it is that 55 weeks we danced to local musicians, and 52 weeks we danced to local callers. That's pretty close to the 50/50 split that we try for! As for the amount of Southern music, there were 27 weeks that I hired old-time bands, just at the goal of one every four weeks. All in all, I feel good about how things have gone, and I hope you have to. I'm sure you'll give Paul all the suggestions, help, and support that you gave me! -- Nancy Mamlin

On Friday, June 10, 1994. FSGW's monthly concert series concludes for the season with a fiddle contest. This event, one of last year's most successful, has been called back by popular demand. It provides area fiddlers -- amateur and professional, young and old -- with a chance to strut their stuff before friends, other musicians and area enthusiasts.

The rules are simple: fiddlers will sign up and play three minutes of music appropriate to the category in which they have entered. Judges (Chris Romaine, Andrea Hoag and Dave Eisner) will award cast prizes to contest winners. If there is a tie, play-offs may take place. Up to eight contestants, chosen on a first-come, first serve basis, will perform in each category: Old-time, Celtic and Junior.

Local folk personality Wally Macnow will host the evening which begins at 8:30pm and takes place at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th St. N.W., Washington, D.C. The Washington Folk Festival is a volunteer event with performers, artists, and staff contributing their time and talent without charge. Despite the generosity of all the people involved, the Festival still has significant expenses, including: rental of sound systems and pianos; feeding performers and staff; printing the programs and publicity; maintaining the tents; stages and equipment; buying postage and office supplies; and paying for the shuttle buses. In addition to typical expenses, the Festival is still recovering from the fire last winter at Glen Echo Park that heavily damaged the building where we store much of our festival equipment.

Roy Harris House Concert

Friday, July 15, 8:30pm

British singer Roy Harris pays an altogether too-infrequent visit to the Washington area in a Fri. July 15 house concert at the home of Bob Clayton and Jennifer Woods in Silver Spring, MD. A unique performer -- a professional singer who sings totally unaccompanied -- Roy sings a repertoire that is 80% traditional and the rest a mixture of contemporary material, parodies, Music Hall and even 1930's pop songs. Considered a professional's professional, Roy's concerts always bring out the local singers in droves, to join in the choruses and raise the rafters. Roy is an engaging and entertaining performer, with a voice that ranks with the best of the folk scene.

Since 1964, Roy has played British folk clubs, concerts and festivals from Orkney to Cornwall, has toured Europe, Canada, the US and even Bermuda, had founded folk clubs in Wales and England and has recorded several splendid albums. 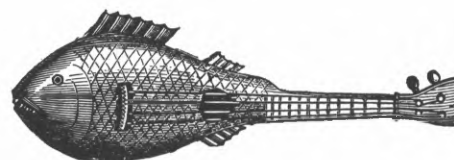

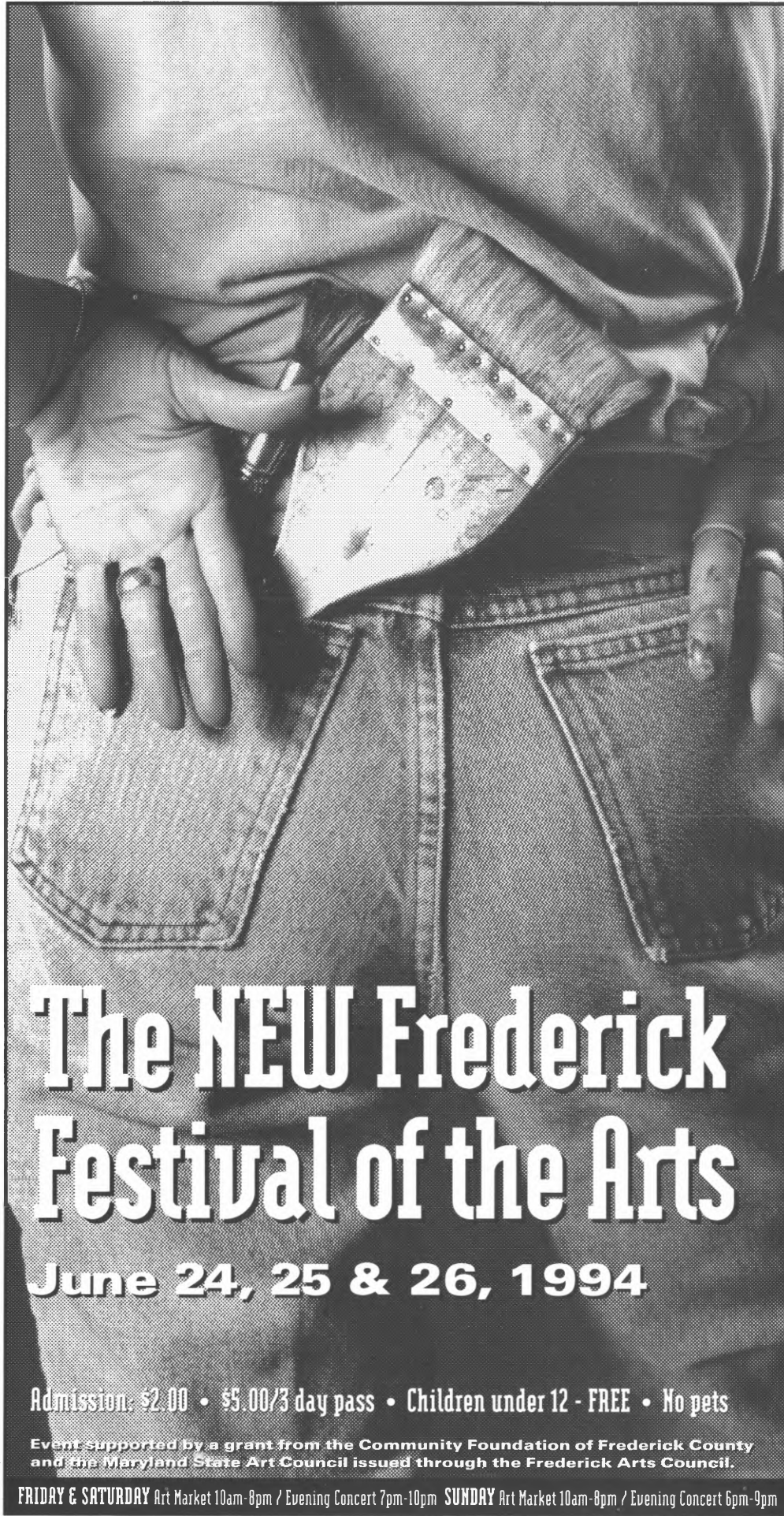
