A Weekend on the Water for Singers, Musicians, and Music-Lovers Friday-Monday, October 4-7, 2013 West River Conference Center, West River, Maryland

Love traditional music? Want to laugh, discover, enjoy? Then break away to a beautiful river-front haven where you can share time and songs with performers you've long admired and friends from near and far. Relax at the water's edge by day, jam and laugh all night, and be open to learning something new at any time. It's all there for you at the Getaway, known worldwide as one of the finest gatherings of its kind.

Friday night begins with a potluck followed by a huge and friendly open sing. Saturday and Sunday, choose from workshops, mini-concerts, song circles, and jam sessions, and then it's your time to shine in the evening at the sign-up concerts. There's a silent auction for the scholarship fund (please bring an item to donate), and crafts, CDs and instruments for sale.

Last year, several people brought children—they had a wonderful time, so this year we hope for even more kids! Just let us know how many children you will be bringing, and their ages, and we'll plan activities for them. **George Rathbone's** Famous Fantasy Adventures are already in the works!



Our special guests this year include West Coast troubadours Larry Hanks and Deborah Robins, the legendary Ann Mayo Muir and daughter Christina Muir, the ever-popular John Roberts with tunes from both sides of the Pond, Castlebay (Fred Gosbee and Julia Lane) with Celtic and New England music, Mike Agranoff, to make you laugh, and Mark Gilston, an old friend returning with dulcimer and squeezebox. We are disappointed that Ed Trickett will not be joining us after all, but hope to bring him back another year.

ACCOMMODATIONS: The Center has 50 bedrooms in buildings with heat, AC and hot showers, with up to four bunks in a room.

A discount is offered for taking an upper bunk. Indicating a preference for a lower bunk does not guarantee you one (there aren't enough); if you must have a lower, please let us know. Tents and RVs are OK, but no hookups are available. Public areas and some bedrooms are handicapped-accessible. Let us know in advance of special dietary needs. A fridge, freezer, and microwave are available at all times. No smoking indoors and we are asked not to bring any alcohol.

WHAT TO BRING: Along with voices, instruments, and your love of music, bring bedding, pillows, towels, flashlight, and a coffee mug to help save paper. No pets, please.

RATES AND REGISTRATION: *The registration form is on page 27.* Rates are for one, two, or three nights, and for day-trippers who bring their own food. To dine at the Getaway you **MUST** register in advance. If you register for two nights, the fee covers three meals each day and a late-night snack both Saturday and Sunday. A three-night registration gives you an additional night's lodging and breakfast on Monday morning. A one-night registration gives you all meals and snacks on either Saturday or Sunday, and, if you wish, a bed on either adjacent night. Please register early!

OCEAN Quartet Friday, September 20, 7:30 pm Falls Church, VA

Celebrate the official beginning of Autumn with a high-spirited concert by the OCEAN Celtic Quartet, whom The Washington Post has called "nothing short of spellbinding" and Eye on Annapolis has dubbed "Washington's most prominent Celtic fusion group."



With soaring vocals and stirring instrumentals, OCEAN will pay tribute to the Autumnal Equinox with moving seasonal songs (two original compositions, Fall, Leaves, Fall, and Leaves of Autumn are only heard once a year), lore, and plenty of blazing jigs and reels.

The group is directed by **Jennifer Cutting** (accordions, piano), an ethnomusicologist who mines the Library of Congress for rare ballads and tunes, giving them shimmering new life. The Chakavak Ensemble Ancient Persian Classical Music

Persian classical music, rich in structure and melodic tones, dates back to the fifth century B.C., but continues to inspire listeners today. Dr. Nader Majd, an Iranian musician and

scholar, and the Chakavak Ensemble, will perform a concert of this music as part of the Worldplay Traditional Music Series curated by Theadocia Austen and Parker Jayne. Mary Cliff of WAMU's *Traditions* will moderate a discussion with the musicians to kick off the performance.

A brilliant Iranian musician and scholar, **Dr. Majd** was born in Iran and has been studying and performing music since his childhood, learning from generations of musicians within his family. He has participated in many concerts and TV shows in Iran and abroad, produced a number of audio and video tapes, and taught music in the USA for the past ten years. He specializes in playing and teaching the tar, setar, santur, violin, and voice. Dr. Majd is the director of The Center for Persian Classical Music (CPCM) in Fairfax, Virginia.

The Backstory—Taking the Road Less Traveled and Song Circles

Several years ago, an alliance was formed in the heart of Ireland, a friendship between a pair of American travelers, **Arnold and Sheila Fieldman** of Alexandria, who liked to travel off the beaten path, and a group of Irish singers from a place called County Roscommon, a place notorious for epic tales, gorgeous landscapes, and beautiful music.

Arnold and Sheila are members of the **O'Neill Malcom Branch of CCÉ**, the largest single non-profit group working to preserve and promote Irish traditional music and culture. CCE's mission parallels FSGW's mission, to preserve and promote the traditional arts, so it is only natural that dedicated members of both groups have converged to study, sing, and perpetuate the old Irish music.

Locally, **CCÉ's Frank Harte Memorial Song Circle** (FHMSC) provides a place for that to happen. **Frank Harte** was a legendary Irish singer and teacher who inspired many members of our local Irish community, some of whom formed the circle here in the D.C. area after his passing. Now in its eighth year, it meets bimonthly at the Glen Echo Irish Inn.

These gatherings attract many FSGW members who enhance the group with their love of old songs and lore. The SoRo singers first visited Virginia two years ago, and the night they sang with the Circle has become legendary and unifying. Lasting bonds were formed, and as a result, members of the Frank Harte Circle are traveling to Ireland to teach and perform at the renowned *South Roscommon Singers Festival*, this October. Both groups are most excited about the cultural exchange. The FHMSC is open to the public, so come check it out if you are curious...and open to going down roads less traveled.

The SoRo Singers have evolved into one of the best-known circles in a network of circles revitalizing traditional song in Ireland today. Founded in September 1993, the group comprises friends who sing together once a month in Jimmy Murray's Bar, Knock-croghery, County Roscommon. But don't be fooled, these are not amateurs, but passionate artists with a deep sense of history.



Declan Coyne is the founder and driving force behind the SoRo Singers. He has published two books: *The Lilting Sons of Country Folk*, and *Alone by the Wild Wood: A Roscommon Song Book* (with companion CD), and produced documentaries for Irish radio. **Johnny Johnston** uses traditional song as a teaching aid in his classroom and has trained other teachers to do so. He conducts workshops and his repertoire is humorous, history-laden and benefits from his wife, Pat's, input. **Liam Lally** is a consummate performer of both traditional and contemporary ballads and a leader of the "Ferbane Bawlers", a singing circle based in Hiney's Bar in Ferbane, in the bordering county of Offaly. **Mai Hernon** is possessed of a fine singing voice and an in-depth knowledge of Irish traditional song. She performs and teaches at festivals and summer schools in Ireland and overseas. Recently, she moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, where, no doubt, she will continue to reinforce her already powerful reputation as one of Ireland's finest traditional singers.

It continues to be FSGW's, and Glen Echo Park's, most ambitious event. FSGW relies on a dedicated team of Festival staff to plan, set up, execute and put away the event. 
