SATURDAY: Adventure Theatre (Stage 2)

- 1:00 Folk songs and ballads from Puerto Rico and Spain are performed by **Lorraine Villanueva and Irma Alvarez**, accompanying themselves with the *cuatro* (a ten-stringed "small guitar"), and guitar.
- 1:30 A veteran of the folk music circuit, multi-talented instrumentalist and singer **Marcy Marxer** teams up with singer/guitarist **Diane Walder** for a smooth harmonic blend of old and new songs.
- 2:00 What makes **Dave Olive** unique? Maybe it's the fact that he's likely to sing anything, although he's partial to blues and country music. An eclectic performer, to be sure, Dave never fails to delight an audience.
- 2:30 From the thirteen-stringed, six-foot-long zither called the *koto* to the breathy, evocative flute named the *shakuhachi*, the beautiful **Music of Japan** will be offered by **Kyoko Okamoto**, president of the Washington Toho Koto Society, along with **Masahiro Nishihama** and others.
- 3:00 **Folk Flutes:** The haunting sounds of flutes are used in the traditional music of many cultures. Flutes from Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Americas will come together here. *Host:* Laura Laning

- 4:00 **Ganga** presents folk music of India, with leader Hita Brata Roy and friends singing in Bengali and other languages, as well as playing numerous instruments, from the *dōtarā* to the *ānandalaharī*.
- 4:30 The *sáo meo* (a flute with a "free reed" like a harmonica's), the *dan t'rung* (a sweeping, curved double xylophone, here hung in a tree-branch), and the *dan bâu* (the most sensuous one-string instrument you've ever heard) are only some of **The Musical Instruments of Vietnam**, played here by members of a talented Vietnamese musical family.

5:30 Having performed his distinctive style of country blues throughout the world, **Archie Edwards** returns with more of his classic blues and bottleneck guitar.

- 6:00 **Hagos Alemayehu** brings the music of Ethiopia, singing old songs and his own (some of them improvised and constantly changing) in *Amharic, Tigrina*, and *Oromo*, and playing the bowed, one-string *masenko* as well as the deceptively difficult river-reed flute called the *washint*.
- 6:30 **Linn Barnes and Allison Hampton:** Playing duets of Renaissance and Celtic Music on lute, guitar, and harp, these fine instrumentalists weave a musical spell that would make Turlough O'Carolan himself proud.
- 7:00 **Ballads:** Setting stories to music is a tradition that spans many cultures and lands. Often allegorical or historical in content, these songs form one of the richest bodies of folk music.

- 7:30 **Double Decker Stringband** combines fiddle, banjo, guitar and mandolin to create sounds of the Southern stringband tradition.
- 8:00 **Ed Trickett's** intricate guitar picking, expert hammered dulcimer playing, and warm voice have made him a favorite at concerts and festivals across the U.S.A., and especially here in his home town.
- 8:30 **The Kentucky Kinfolk**, featuring **Speedy Tolliver** and **Speedy Baker**, play country and bluegrass music from the Virginia-Kentucky border, again making Washingtonians glad they live so near Appalachia and its musical heritage.
- 9:00 Take a warm mellow voice, add talent on flat-picked or finger-picked guitar, be sure to include an ear for good bluesy or country-oriented song, and you'll have **Reuben Musgrave.**
- 9:30 **Grazz Matazz:** This superb band features brilliant vocal harmonies and virtuoso instrumental performances in a variety of styles including swing and the group's own eclectic blend of folk-jazz-rock. The ensemble recently won "best album" honors in the country/rock/jazz category at the WAMMIES.

SATURDAY: Cuddle-Up Stage (Stage 3)

- 12:30 The close (and difficult) harmonies of the vocal music of eastern Europe are presented by the singers of **Slaveya**, offering songs in Serbian, Macedonian, and several other languages.
- I:00 When young clawhammer banjo players get to talking among themselves, the name **Reed Martin** always brings an admiring response of "Ahhh! Now *that's* how it *should* sound." Hear for yourself.
- 1:30 The **Ukrainian Bandura Ensemble** performs a variety of folk songs on the *chernijivka* and *poltavka*, two versions of the "combination of harp and lute" that is the national instrument of the Ukraine and dates back to the 16th century.
- 2:00 **Pete Kennedy** may apply his virtuoso guitar technique to a flat-picked fiddle tune, an intricate jazz ballad, or a John Hurt-style Delta blues no matter which, his playing shows not only musical knowledge, but also soul.
- 2:30 **Unaccompanied Harmony:** From the Balkans to Africa to the USA, from doo-wop to Gospel to barbershop, the total effect of harmony singing is more than the sum of its parts! *Host:* Nancy King Classic Blend, Sacred Harp Quartet, Slaveya, Some Dumb Trout, Sweet Accord, Uganda Cultural Club
- 4:00 **Music of Turlough O'Carolan:** An all-star group of Celtic musicians presents the compositions of the legendary 17th Century blind Irish harpist.

- 5:00 One of Washington's finest folk-performers, **Bruce Hutton** is a multi-instrumentalist, an engaging and witty singer, and master of Appalachian musical styles.
- 5:30 From Appalachian folk song to lilting Irish melody to the traditional music of Asia, the **Hammered Dulcimer**, with its multiplicity of strings, produces a richness of sound belying its simplicity and portability.

- 6:30 **The Shamrock Aces** bring their infectious enthusiasm and musical expertise to a repertoire of Irish music that includes ballads, protest songs, and a liberal dash of reels, jigs, and hornpipes.
- 7:00 Even if you've been to **Suriname**, on South America's northern coast, you may never have heard the like of the songs presented here by **Judith and Ingrid Morroy** in the country's unofficial but beautiful "lingua franca" called *Sranan*, which combines influences from African languages, Dutch, English, even Hebrew.
- 7:30 The vast concert hall of Nature herself is often home for the huge **Swiss Alphorn**, sometimes used to exchange greetings among the peaks of the Alps. It is played here by **Richard Spicer**, who will also play the more trumpet-like, coiled *Buchel*.
- 8:00 **Music and dance of the Philippines** come to you with the **Estrella Rondalla** members and friends of the Estrella family, offering traditions from Luzon, Visayan, and Mindanao, with instruments such as the fourteen-string, guitar-like *banduria* and the metallic rhythms of the *batingting*.
- 8:30 **Scott Reiss** and **Tina Chancey**, the founders of the Early Music group *Hesperus*, bring their subtlety and sensitivity to a wide range of folk material.
- 9:00 The **Music of Afghanistan** is here presented through the singing (in *Peshto* and *Farsi*) of **Mohammad Eqbul Hassani**, who also plays the *armonia* (pumped reed organ), accompanied by the *tabla* of **Arif Ahmadi**, as well as by **Atta Sadiq** and the many-stringed *rebab* of **Ezzethullah Majadidi**.
- 9:30 **The Fox Paws Stringband** shows the strength and liveliness of the stringband trio format fiddle, banjo, and guitar with a set of old-time Southern mountain dance tunes.

SATURDAY: Spanish Ballroom (Dance)

- 12:00 **Clogging Workshop:** Try your foot at this traditional Appalachian dance form. **The Footloose Cloggers** will teach basic steps and some intermediate steps for more advanced dancers, as well as demonstrating some of their routines. Music by **Fox Paws.**
- 1:00 **Basic Contra Dancing:** Learn the fun and delight of contra dancing as done at the Folklore Society's regular Sunday Night Dances. Taught by long-time dancer and caller **Tuppence Blackwell**, with the exciting music of **Triple Delight.**
- 2:00 Try **polkas, figure dances, and more** to the German brass-band music, or *blasmusik*, of **Die Alte Kameraden**, offering dances from Germany, Poland, and Czechoslovakia in the familiar variety as well as in accelerating tempos and other variations you may not have experienced.
- 3:00 **Family Dance: Donna Barker** will lead dances for the whole family. Do circle, contra, and square dances for all ages to music by **Sodabread.** Bring the children! And move to the music.
- 4:00 **International Dance: Jamie Platt** will take you on a one-hour dance tour of Europe. Learn line, circle, and couple dances from a variety of cultures.
- 5:00 **Waltz:** Waltzing is charming, waltzing is sweet; waltz your partner off his or her feet. Basic waltzing and some simple variations. Taught by **Ken Haltenhoff** and **Donna Barker.** Music by **Triple Delight.**
- 6:00 **Zydeco Dance Party:** Boogie in the Bayou beat! Learn two-step, waltz, and more, to the irresistible music of **Little Red and the Renegades.** Dances will be taught by **Bev Fleisher** and **John Gilmer.**
- 8-11:30 **Saturday Night Dance:** Washington has become one of the most exciting centers in the country for traditional contra and square dancing. Try it out under the direction of caller **Beth Grupp** to the music of an Open Band, led by **Steve Hickman.**

- 12:00 **Future Tellers: Jean Alexander** and **Bob Rovinsky** introduce us to some of the best young storytellers in the D.C. area.
- 1:00 **Tales from Watership Down: Richard Ashford,** a lively and dramatic performer, tells "folktales" from the world of *Watership Down* (by Richard Adams), about the adventures of the rabbit trickster/hero El-ahrairah.
- 1:45 **I Remember Mama . . . And Dad . . . And the Dog . . . And Uncle Charlie:** In an informal session of family reminiscence, **Al Booth** illustrates that we all have stories to tell.
- 2:30 **Latin American Stories: Sharon Butler,** an accomplished full-time storyteller, and **Chuck Kleymeyer,** who's worked, traveled, and collected stories in the Andean region of South America, present this lively workshop.
- 5:30 **Stories from Ballads:** Singer **Connie McKenna** and tellers **Sharon Butler** and **Vicki Velsey** show there's more than one way to tell the same story.
- 4:15 **Tales from Africa: LaWanda Randall** has the uncommon gift of making us feel she was an eyewitness to the stories she tells. Her African stories are a special treat.
- 5:00 **Travels of a Folktale:** Stories travel, and as they do, change often radically. **Elva Van Winkle, Anne Sheldon,** and **Vicki Velsey** tell, respectively, Norse, English and Appalachian versions of a story that started out as "Cupid and Psyche," and is now best known as "Beauty and the Beast."
- 6:00 **Puppets and Stories:** Watch **Jeanne Leckert**, a natural with little kids, tell her children's stories with and without puppets.
- 6:45 **Haunted Houses of Washington, D.C.: Kay White** and the Washingtonian Division of the D.C. Public Library offer a haunting slide-show introduction to domestic supernatural phenomena.
- 7:30 **Ghost Stories:** On Saturday night? But of course! Funny stories, sad stories, scary, and more scary, and even more scary stories! Host **Bill Mayhew** will provide laughs in between blood-chillers. With tellers Sharon Butter, Mary Hahn, LaWanda Randall, Charlotte Smutko, Barbara Spears.

12:30 Often presented at the Chinese New Year, the **Chinese Lion Dance** is a 5,000-year-old tradition. Performed here by members of the **Tai-Yim Kung Fu School** of Wheaton, Md., its colorful lion and roaring music ward off evil and bring good luck and prosperity to all who view it.

1:00 What do melodeons, concertinas, harmoniums, and harmonicas have in common? Reeds, fixed at one end and vibrating through a slot at the other. Hear local experts play strange and wonderful devices from distant lands in the **Free Reed Instrument Workshop.**



- 1:00 Varieties of music you may not have expected come from the button accordions and Austrian diatonic accordion of **Joan Geller** and **Dale Wise**, with tunes from Scandinavia, Bavaria, and even Israel, and tempos such as 9/8 and 5/4. Joining them will be **Brad Sidwell** playing *dumbek* (drum).
- 1:30 **Jeff Warner** brings a lifetime of traditional music to his performances, having grown up in a family of folk song collectors. Jeff sings and plays American and British ballads, sea songs, and lots more!
- 2:00 **Blues II:** Representatives of Washington's blues community explore the many variations of the blues. *Host:* Barry Pearson Ben Andrews, John Cephas, Craiq Jones, Phil Wiggins
- 3:00 **Capoeira** is both a dance and a martial art, presented here from its native country by the aptly named group **Brazil Brazil**, led by **Joselito Santo** to the accompaniment of the rhythmic bow called the *berimbao* and of the *bandeiro* (drum).
- 3:30 Multi-instrumentalists with powerful and moving voices, **Magpie** creates more music with just two people than some bands do with a dozen and offers a variety of songs that is as wide as their own world travels.
- 4:00 **Bill Destler's** haunting tenor voice and fine instrumental work bring life to a variety of American lyrical songs, work songs, and gospel.
- 4:30 Jewish **Klezmer** music as well as traditional Israeli/Hebrew and Russian melodies are played by **Lox and Vodka** on clarinet, violin, mandolin, and other instruments, enriched by the singing of **Caron Dale.**
- 5:00 **The Pan Masters Steel Orchestra,** most of whose members come from Trinidad, plays calypso music on the ends of tuned oil drums, and hopes you won't "insist on being respectful" but instead will get up and dance.
- 5:30 **The Foggy Bottom Morris Men:** With stamping feet, ringing bells, rapping sticks, and fluttering handkerchiefs, Washington's own Morris "side" recreates ancient English ritual dances of fertility and good luck.

Crafts Area

Ever wonder how a cabinet or a flute or a dulcimer is actually made? Ever wish you could watch a calligrapher or a potter or a quilter at work? Now's your chance. For both days of the Festival, local craftspeople will be continuously demonstrating their skills, and displaying their work in the Crafts Area.

Don't be shy about talking to people who are demonstrating their crafts. Ask them questions about what they do - they expect it.

Don Allen demonstrates his **wood carving** skills by creating handcarved, naturally colored wildfowl. He will dazzle both children and adults by demonstrating his latest interest, the restoration and carving of wooden horses for carousels.

Hand-painted, kiln-fired **stained glass** boxes are some of the intricate products of **Sushila Bales. Doris Johnson** will assist Sushila in demonstrating the Tiffany foil and leaded methods of joining together cut pieces of glass.

Carolyne Bassing revives an ancient instrument, the **ocarina**. You'll notice that no two of these clay instruments are alike — the perfect marriage of music and sculpture.

Jeanne Benson is a **quilter** who demonstrates unique styles of piecing, appliqué, *trapunto* (padded work that originated in Sicily), and Italian cording.

Joyce and Bill Claque began making **wooden toys** for other people's children when their own children grew older. They use whittling and lathe-turning techniques and are constantly developing new designs.

Marvin Cohen's scrimshaw is made from part of the few remaining registered stocks of old sperm whale ivory. He is one of the few scrimshanders authorized by the U.S. Government under the Scrimshaw Preservation Act to practice and preserve this old art form.

Carl Gotzmer creates a wide variety of **mountain zithers** fashioned after European designs. Let him introduce you to the Norwegian *Langeleik*, Swedish *Humle*, German *Scheitholt*, and Icelandic *Langspeil*, relatives of the American mountain dulcimer.

Stuart and Karen Helble are masters of the art of **handcrafted pewter.** Their ornamental and dining wares are crafted from lead-free pewter, an alloy of tin, antimony, and copper finished in high polish or brushed satin.

Jane Hyland, Nancy Norris, and Lois Lamb demonstrate wool carding and spinning. All three women have been spinning for a decade or more and are members of the Moonspinners' Guild, a group of Washington-area spinners.

Anne Merete's beautiful **enamel work** is made by melting powdered colored glass on copper and firing it in a kiln at 1500 degrees Fahrenheit. She will display examples of enameled jewelry, bowls, and cloisonne.

Tomas Ohrstrom's flutes represent many musical traditions, among them notched flutes from South America (*quena*) and Japan (*shakuhachi*), and various rim-blown flutes from the Near East and the Balkans.

Betty Omara demonstrates the application of **dyes** by hand to **fabric** with and without resist. Hers is like a watercolor technique, placing color on top of color to create bright patterns.

Pat Peat O'Neil demonstrates basic **paperfolding and dyeing** techniques. She teaches children and adults how to make intricate, brightly colored designs, all of them interesting, some beautiful enough to frame.

Won Hyuk Pak, former United Nations illustrator and current teacher with the Smithsonian Resident Associates Program, displays the ageless beauty of Oriental art through his **Sumie (stroke) and brush painting.** His specialties include "Four Seasons/Four Gentlemen" paintings, calligraphy and Oriental framing and mounting.

Grace Peterson displays a wide variety of **stained glass** lamps, windows, and boxes. She employs both imported and domestic glass in creating her original designs.

Susan Prock discusses *pa ndau* or "cloth flowers" **needlework** while **Lee Xiong**, **Shona Lee**, **Chao Lee**, and **Blia Yang** demonstrate appliqué, reverse appliqué and cross-stitch embroidery designs used by the Hmong people of Laos.

Crafts Area (continued)

Vince Serra and **Nikki DeMars** are **sculptural potters** and resident artists here at Glen Echo Park, and recently began teaching classes in pottery. These enthusiastic craftspeople are favorites among Festival visitors. They will demonstrate the art of throwing pots on the wheel.

Genie Sidwel knits Irish sweaters, hats and mittens. She often uses hand-spun wool with lanolin still in it to maintain a natural look. Unique items include knitted stuffed cats (a basket full of them!).

Larry Sifel excels in applying **pearl inlay to stringed instruments**, specializing in very intricate designs. He is currently building "master" acoustic guitars played by professional musicians.

Jean Smith has been making and selling **baskets** for about six years, always on the lookout for different techniques and materials. Her work runs the gamut from natural vines and traditional styles to the contemporary use of dyed reeds and original shapes.

Roma Starczewska learned the art of **Polish Paper Cutting** from her mother. Her intricate designs are made from brightly colored paper. Her husband, **Philip Murray**, **Sr.**, demonstrates Carpathian **rug weaving**.

Catering to a tradition of Renaissance fairs, **Christy Swid** creates **papier-maché masks** on sticks, decorated in a wide variety of materials, colors, and styles. She recently returned from Venice with new ideas for some of the more beautiful masks.

Kiyoko Uyeda shares her varied talents as Professor of **Bonseki Art (sand painting)** and **Ikenobo Art (flower arrangement)** in the Hosokawa and Ikenobo Schools. The finer techniques of sand painting and flower arranging will be demonstrated on separate Festival days.

Richard Wabnick is a self-taught **cabinet maker** who constructs furniture utilizing traditional woodworking principles such as hand-cut dovetail joints. He is assisted by his wife, **Roberta Brockelman**, who designs most of their woodworking pieces. The couple uses American hardwoods such as cherry and walnut.

Coleen Walters, quilter and dress designer, combines colorful fabrics with embellishment techniques to create clothing fashioned in traditional ethnic styles. Her original dress design,

"Coleen's Fancy," allows the wearer's personal choice in fabrics (including silk noile, Thai silk and antique lace), and techniques (including applique, piecing, embroidery and Seminole). "Coleen's Fancy" was recently featured in *McCall's Needlework and Crafts Magazine*.

Hakua Ware and **Rose Adwoa Allen** are a team. Hakua specializes in original **jewelry** designs, working with beads and metal to fabricate earrings, bracelets, and necklaces. Rose is a **textile artist** whose designs are influenced by ethnic folktales. They will demonstrate traditional African dyeing (*Chup*) and needle resist methods such as *Plangi* and *Tritik*.

Anne Woodward is an international **silhouette artist** who cuts profiles freehand without the benefit of sketches or shadow methods. She can have profiles ready for framing in five minutes.



COME ON IN!

The Folklore Society of Greater Washington, which organized this festival, was started in October of 1964 by a small group of friends who hoped such an organization could help traditional folk music flower in an area already abloom with jazz, classical music, rock and other sounds. Today, the Folklore Society has more than 3,000 members, presents several events each month (sometimes several in a week), distributes a newsletter detailing the Society's own activities as well as many other folk-related doings, and, in general, has become one of the largest, most active such groups in the country.

Folklore Society Events — virtually all of them for the public — include concerts large and small (most featuring performers from outside the area), regular weekly and monthly dances, programs for children, workshops, day-long master classes, song swaps, festivals, periodic gatherings on special themes such as shape-note singing, and a host of other ventures. Yet most Society members are not performers; they're simply people who love the music, and dance, and other pleasures, and to whom the Society is a way both of finding out about folk events and of helping still more to happen. Look around you at this festival, and at all the people who enjoy what the Folklore Society does. If you're moved to join, it's easy (our information booth here at the festival has application forms) and inexpensive (\$12 a year for individuals and \$18 for families).
