V. Arlington County, Recreation Dept. JA 4-7000

C. Lubber Run. (off Columbia Pike): will hold perhaps 200 persons, more if spread out. Site includes small outdoor amphitheatre (run down, but usable) with concrete-floor stage, campfire ring (log seats), picnic tables, swings, a shelter (perhaps 220-person capacity), and Lubber Run, with rocks, trees, and a little water. Parking in small lots and on street spread around the park. No access except by foot (except to Park Dept trucks). In residential area, but not too close. Amphitheatre stage is wired for lights and electricity, but sockets and wiring in very poor condition.

Addendum (from JKS): To reserve an area, call Arlington Rec., Dept., JA 4-7000, Ex. 46, Mrs. Robey. Inform of date, time, and which facilities. Amphitheatre also used by Rec. Dept. drama group and Children's group.

VI. City of Alexandria, Recreation & Park Dept. (City Hall, 549-7700)

No facilities for large groups, except Fort Ward: Col. Mitchell, 549-1509

Fort Ward (Braddock Road near N. Howard St. and Shirley Hwy, in NW Alex.)

Historical restoration and picnic area, partly restored, development not yet complete. 40 acres. Bst. capacity: 200-250 persons.

Main purposes to preserve the historic area (i.e. no baseball, football, or climbing on cannon) and provide recreation facilities (in a separate area). Very friendly; reasonable use encouraged.

Facilities: small museum, restored "Northwest Bastion" with cannon, parapets, etc.; comfort station; limited off-street parking (perhaps 80 cars); a few barbecue ovens (portable grills allowed), 18 picnic tables. Relatively isolated (flanked by school, highway, tract being bulldozed). Blectricity may be available (they have lights on the cannon) if we negotiate.

Rule against business activities mainly directed toward hot-dog stands; would have no objection to our selling supper tickets or asking for donations.

Museum open 9-5 M-Sat, Sun 12-5. Park open 9 a.m.-sunset all days.
