## 'Hard Times' draws 2200

During the last weeks in January, the HARD TIMES CONFERENCE in Chicago drew more than 2200 people together to draft a plan of action in response to the present condition of the economy.

A 'People's Bill of Rights', written largely before the conference opened, was adopted. Workshops on a wide variety of subjects were scheduled to discuss the language and implementation of the Bill of Rights but conference organizers, led by the newly-formed Prarie Fire Distributing Committee, failed to schedule workshops for women or third world people. Workshops in these areas were scheduled and reported their criticisms to the conference plenary at a Sunday afternoon session.

The most impressive thing that went on at the conference was the wide variety of activists and organizers in attendance, and the general desire for unity among the delegates. Since there were so many people coming from a number of different perspectives, the conference restricted debate from the floor and limited the action proposals adopted to from the cultural workers sessioms and proposals adopted to from the cultural workshops. Three things stood out first workshop participants expressed the general tendency of the Left to seperate culture from "real" political work: that the conference schedule allowed for this error to continue unchallenged. The second aspect was the contrast between those cultural workers who worked independently and those who worked as part of a larger organizing body. Thirdly, workshop members observed that their own behavior had a large effect in setting them apart from the larger group.

The planned Saturday evening cultural presentation, despite the reservations of some of the cultural workers who participated, was a real 'up' as a multi-racial group of artists sharpened the focus of the conference by presenting the people's struggle against capitalism in song, dance and poetry.
