MAY 7th SPECIAL CONCERT AND DANCE

Maple Sugar, a group dedicated to presenting traditional Canadian Folk music. is co-sponsoring a 6 week American tour of Graham Townsend and friends. The FSGW is delighted to present them in concert and in dance. Graham Townsend is, according to fiddle contest regulars, "the best damn fiddler in Canada". He is a winner of so many championships that he no longer competes. Graham was only 9 years old when he won his first Canadian National exhibition championship at Toronto in 1951, and at 35 he is a 4 time winner of the North American championship. He has recorded 28 albums, toured Canada and Europe and performed for Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip on Parliament Hill in 1967.... continued on P. 3

ANDEAN MUSIC FOR MAY PROGRAM

Some of the instruments and elements of the music that you hear from Rumisongos were part of the daily lives of this hemisphere some 20 centuries ago. They have survived centuries of Spanish colonization and later influences, while at the same time acquiring some elements of the imposed culture, the guitar for example. This music, like the languages and ways of the native people, is part of an immense cultural tradition that has been largely ignored or rejected. Rumisongos in the Quechua language of South America can be roughly translated to mean hearts of stone: not the insensitive heart but rather the heart that, like a stone, endureth through time and history.

Now Washingtonians, Nato, Alfredo, Alvaro, and Carlos are all from the Andean region of South America. Their instruments include the quena (bamboo flute), the tarka (carved wooden flute), the zampoñas (pan-pipe like instrument), the charango (small stringed instrument, the product of the assimilation by the native peoples of a mandolin-like instrument) and the bombo (native percussion instrument).
