Medicine-Show Pitchman Featured June 11



Medicine-show pitchman Fred Foster Bloodgood, along with Andy Cohen playing ragtime piano, will be featured in FSGW's last monthly program of this year, on Friday, June 11, at 8:30. Fred Foster Bloodgood comes to us from Madison, Wisconsin. After many years of retirement from the stage, he will once again deliver the medicine-show and sideshow pitches of yesteryear. He remembers seeing his first circus at age 7. "The talker was extolling the benefits to be derived from actually visiting that Congress of Freaks, Curiosities, and Monstrosities, as he expounded before a long line of pictorial paintings. From that instant, I can't recall wanting to do anything else," he says.

Immediately after high school, he joined the show world, and from 1928 to 1939, "Doc" Bloodgood toured the U.S. with medicine and sideshows. He has recently appeared at the Smithsonian's Folklife Festival, on "Good Morning America," at universities, and even before a group of modern physicians.

On June 11, he will talk about the background and history of medicine shows, including many stories from his own experiences. He'll explain about the good tonics, explain the makings of a successful pitch, and then, before your very eyes, he'll demonstrate the power of the well-chosen word. Children and adults alike will marvel at his linguistic artistry. The program will include slides from old medicine and tent shows, authentic musical entertainment (Andy is a superb ragtime pianist and blues guitarist), and perhaps even the sale of surprise goods.

The program begins at 8:30 p.m. at the W.E.S. auditorium, 7750 16th St., N.W. (at Kalmia Road). Admission is free for FSGW members, \$4.00 for nonmembers.

Frankie Armstrong to Perform July 14

"Whether it's a song of our times or a hundreds-year-old ballad, Frankie Armstrong can make it vivid and real to us as few singers can. The urgency and intensity of her oft-unaccompanied singing cuts through centuries, holds the audience spellbound," wrote Ethel Raim in 1974. FSGW members will have a chance to hear this extraordinary singer on Wednesday, July 14.

Using a number of different vocal styles, including some learned from the elderly traditional women singers of her native Britain and of Ireland, Frankie sings rural, industrial, and music hall songs, as well as many of the lyric songs and ballads which come out of the rich traditions created by the British common people over the past few hundred years--laments, celebrations, and silly bits of fancy and fun, all drawn neatly back into their context.

Frankie's singing has been greatly influenced by British singers and collectors A.L. Lloyd and Ewan MacColl. She has recorded with these and other artists, and also has three solo albums.

The concert begins at 8:00 p.m., Wednesday, July 14, at the W.E.S. auditorium, 7750 16th St., N.W. (at Kalmia Road). Admission is \$3.00 for FSGW members, \$4.00 for nonmembers. Don't miss this special concert. Frankie's tours of the U.S. are infrequent, and her singing is not to be missed.

FESTIVAL OF AMERICAN FOLKLIFE

Ninety traditional craftsmen and performers from the state of Oklahoma will participate in the 16th annual Smithsonian Festival of American Folklife, to be held on the Mall (12th St. & Madison Drive, N.W.) June 24-28 and July 1-5, from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily. Highlights of the festival will include the cultural traditions of native Americans in Oklahoma, and the occupational folklife of individuals linked to selected industries in Oklahoma. Eskimo craftsmen and performers from Alaska also will take part in the festival. Their participation will be related to the exhibition of Bering Sea Eskimo artifacts collected in Alaska in the 1880s. (See story, below.)

About 100 volunteers are needed each day of the festival to assist craftspeople, dancers, musicians, and cooks; watch equipment during breaks; help in the children's area; perform administrative duties; interpret for deaf visitors; work with grounds and stage crews; and provide hospitality for visiting participants. ESKIMO EXHIBIT AT SMITHSONIAN

A major exhibit of Eskimo cultural materials collected in the 1880s by naturalist/collector E.W. Nelson opens at the Natural Museum of Natural History June 4, and continues through August 15. A large number of ivory carvings are included in the exhibit, as well as other artifacts of the Bering Sea Eskimos of the late 1800s.

44TH NATIONAL FOLK FESTIVAL

The 44th National Folk Festival will once again celebrate the richness and diversity of traditional music and dance in America on July 16, 17, and 18 at Wolf Trap Farm Park in Vienna, Virginia. Performers include the Royal Cambodian Ballet, three groups of gospel singers, two groups of Hispanic performers, Western swing by the Junior Daugherty Band, Arapaho and Shoshone people from Wyoming, blues artists from Arkansas and Missouri, Appalachian singers and instrumentalists, and much, much more. Daytime performances and workshops will take place on Friday and Saturday, July 16 and 17, from noon to 6:00 p.m., and on Sunday, July 18, from 11:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Daytime admission is \$4.00 for adults and \$2 for children 6-12 each day. Children under 6 are admitted free to daytime events. Evening concerts on Friday and Saturday at 8:00 p.m. will feature six different groups of performers each night.
