Rich Kirby and Tom Bledsoe, the featured performers in FSGW's December program, have been playing music together since 1973. From southwestern Virginia, they both have been exposed to traditional mountain music since childhood. They began playing music together as part of a project to develop a mountain music curriculum and test it in schools. Energetic preservers of traditional mountain music, tales, and dances, Rich and Tom helped found June Appal Records, a recording company dedicated to preserving Appalachian folklore.

A typical concert by Rich and Tom includes hoedown instrumentals, stringband numbers, ballads, children's songs, ragtime, Carter

Family songs, old-time gospel music, and works by modern mountain songwriters such as Ron Short, Si Kahn, and Hazel Dickens. Rich and Tom are versatile instrumentalists on banjo, mandolin, fiddle, guitar, harmonica, and jaw harp. They are also gifted storytellers with a large repertoire of traditional mountain tales.

Excellent harmony singing, solid instrumental work, energy, and good humor are the trademarks of Rich Kirby and Tom Bledsoe. Don't miss their performance at the WES Auditorium on Friday, December 10, at 8:30 p.m. Admission to the program is free for FSGW members, \$4.00 for nonmembers. Interpretive signing for the hearing impaired will be provided. To get to the concert via public transportation, take the Metro red line to the Silver Spring station. BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The FSGW Board met November 3 at the home of Bill Day in northwest D.G. Among other actions, the Board:

- Adopted as policy a number of recommendations presented to the Board by the FSGW Futures Committee. These recommendations follow extensive discussions on the part of the Committee and the Board, and pertain to FSGW's programs, organization, finances, and community outreach policies, among other topics. While these recommendations are too numerous to summarize in this Newsletter, any member of FSGW may receive a copy of the minutes of the November 3 Board meeting by requesting one from Secretary Joanne Turner.
- Expressed general support for the idea of cosponsoring another series of Saturday dances at Glen Echo next summer.
- Discussed a draft cooperative agreement between FSGW and Glen Echo Park, covering the period through September 1985. Endorsed the spirit of the draft agreement, and authorized Board member Dwain Winters to sign the document, provided no substantive changes are made in the final version.
- Abolished the position of Volunteer Coordinator recommended by last year's Board. It was felt that sufficient means of obtaining volunteers exist without creating a special position to accomplish this goal.
- Moved to develop a questionnaire for recruiting volunteers for FSGW. Board member Jennifer Woods will develop
 the questionnaire and submit it for Board approval at its
 January meeting. The questionnaire will be enclosed with
 a future edition of the Newsletter.
- Approved a motion that Treasurer David Olive chair a new FSGW Finance Committee.
- Approved a motion that lists of FSGW volunteers be restricted to Board members and organizers of FSGW events, unless a specific exception is approved by the Board.

The Getaway Committee reported that Camp Letts has approved FSGW's application to hold the Getaway there on Columbus Day weekend, October 7-10, 1983.


