The group's members originate from Istanbul, Iran, Armenia, and Washington, D.C., and are proficient on a variety of traditional instruments including dehol (a percussion instrument), ganoum (a stringed, trapezoidal instrument), and kamancheh (another stringed instrument, usually bowed). The group's songs and tunes come from many different areas, showing a great diversity of poetic and modal structures and dialects, each explained and introduced by members of the ensemble.

The group has recordings on the Arion, Harmonia, Mundi, and CBS labels.
