FSGW Mini-Festival: All Day January 22

The Folklore Society's 11th annual Mini-Festival will be held Saturday, January 22, at George Mason University's Metro Center, 3401 North Fairfax Dr., Arlington ($\frac{1}{2}$ block from the Ballston Metro stop), from noon until 11:00 p.m. Plan to bring the whole family for this special day of music, dance, and fun.

The day's activities begin with a one-hour concert of workshop leaders. Then, from 1:00 to 6:30 p.m., there will be workshops, followed by a dinner break. At 8:00 p.m., there will be a concert featuring Ed Trickett, The 4:30 Crowd (Country & Western), Laura Laning, and Bob Clayton. A dance also will be held at 8:00, with squares and contras called by Lou Shapiro, and music by The Fiddlesticks Connection featuring fiddler Steve Hickman.

New workshops this year include an old English music hall, songs of absent lovers, the k harp, songs of occupational hazards, and ancient Scottish songs. There will be five reduled jam sessions during the day: old-time, dulcimer, bluegrass, Country & Western, and a ceilidh. Dance workshops will include clogging, international dance, and beginning squares. A new feature this year will be the showing of a film about a North Carolina stringband. HAPPY 90th BIRTHDAY LIBBA!

Mike Seeger, Libba Cotten In Concert January 8



On Saturday, January 8, Baird auditorium will be the site of an extraordinary birthday celebration. Elizabeth "Libba" Cotten will mark her 90th birthday with a concert, sharing the stage with Mike Seeger, who helped start her on a concert career in 1959.

Libba Cotten came to the Washington area in the late 1940s to join a daughter and grandchildren here. A chance encounter led to her working for composer Ruth Crawford Seeger and her husband, musicologist Charles Seeger. Surrounded by music, Cotten began to play guitar and banjo again, as she had as a child



in North Carolina. And she taught youngsters Mike and Peggy Seeger her ragtime and blues styles. She remembered songs, like "Freight Train," she'd written many years before, and started writing songs once again. Libba, 90 years young, is still going strong, and will play these and other songs for us all on January 8th. (((continued on next page)))

Ian Robb, Grit Laskin, Kate Murphy Perform Jan. 14



Ian Robb and Grit Laskin, two of Canada's foremost performers of British, Irish, and Canadian traditional music, will be joined by pianist and stepdancer Kate Murphy in FSGW's monthly program on Friday, January 14.

Ian, a native of London, emigrated to Canada in 1970 after serving his "singer's apprenticeship" as a resident singer at the St. Alban's folk music club (an establishment that has nurtured such singers as Louis Killen, Frankie Armstrong, Tim Hart, and Maddy Prior). Ian's strong, direct style, varied repertoire, rich concertina accompaniments, and fine songwriting all owe much to these early influences.

Grit plays guitar, tenor mandolin, Northumbrian smallpipes, concertina, tenor banjo, melodeon, and dulcimer, all with remarkable skill and good taste. He's also a fine singer and songwriter, perhaps best known for his irreverent parodies of traditional songs. In "real life," he keeps body and soul together as one of North America's most respected guitar makers.

Grit and Ian met several years ago at Toronto's "Fiddler's Green" folk club, where Grit got his first taste of British music. They've been performing together ever since--either as a duo or in various groups such as Friends of Fiddler's Green, Laylum, and Hang the Piper.

Grit and Ian's joint repertoire covers the entire spectrum of traditional song: work songs, love songs, funny songs, bawdy songs, chorus songs, sea songs, and drinking songs are all represented, together with a number of their own compositions and instrumental duets thrown in for good measure. The two have performed at most of the major folk festivals and clubs in Canada during the last decade, as well as in the Northeastern U.S. They have several recordings on the Folk Legacy and Fogarty's Cove Music labels.

Ian and Grit will be joined in their January 14 concert by Kate Murphy, a fine backup piano player and one of Ontario's leading step dancers. Kate learned her step-dancing technique from the renowned

Ottawa Valley step dancer, Alex Mulligan. Following in Alex's footsteps, and interpreting other regional styles, Kate, along with the Mulligan Dancers, has performed concerts and workshops all over Canada.
