

UTAH PHILLIPS IN CONCERT



Bruce (W. Utah) Phillips-"The Golden Voice of the Great Southwest"-- pays another welcome visit to FSGW on December 8 at Georgetown University's Hall of Nations, 36th and Prospect Streets, N.W. Admission to the 8 pm concert is \$4. for FSGW members, \$5. for nonmembers, and the audience is promised an evening of good song and outrageous puns. In Utah's words, a Bruce Phillips concert is "a foot--that is to say a singular feat."

It's hard to pin a label on Bruce Phillips. Storyteller? Singer? Songwriter? Labor organizer? None of these labels really encapsulates this performer. In fact, encapsulation of Bruce is like getting the genie back in the bottle. But if words can tell anything about a person, those words -- storyteller, singer, labor organizer, song writer--tell us something of the man. His music tells us more.

Utah's singing voice is remarkably adequate (he says he has two styles, loud and soft) and his guitar-playing manages to uphold his voice without skating too near the edge of virtuosity. His humor is wry and outrageous, and his stories are filled with truth that may or may not have happened.

In Bruce's words, "I sing songs about trains, coal mines, Unions, factories, working people, lazy people, the old and new West, bums, politicians, and different things that happen to you when you're in love Most of the songs I sing really belong to those people; they just don't know it yet.

The FSGW Board met on Wednesday, November 2, at the home of Past president, Mary Cliff in Falls Church, Va. Among other actions, the Board:

- Accepted Past-president Mary Cliff's report on her research into FSGW incorporation, and directed her to proceed with the incorporation process in accordance with the provisions of the FSGW Bylaws.
- Approved the establishment of an FSGW Educational Programs Committee, and directed the President to appoint a committee chair as soon as possible.

GETAWAY HISTORY, OR "FOR YOUR INFORMATION"

Several people have asked, "Why did FSGW leave Prince William Forest Park (the site of the first 17 Getaways)?" The primary reason was the unavailability of sufficient space. In 1981, 220 people tried to register for the Getaway, and in 1982, 230 registered. Our old camp ("Pleasant") holds only 180, and is now undergoing renovations --not due to finish till 1990 -- reducing this to 150. The only other large camp in Prince William sleeps 220, but feeds only 140, and has insufficient workshop space. No camp at Prince William Park being adequate, the 1982 Getaway Committee instituted a search, using the American Camping Association list of nearby camps, and settled on Camp Letts, near Annapolis, as the best available camp for our needs.

We have tried to make the Getaway available to as many as want to attend while keeping the friendly atmosphere we all remember from past years. Anyone with comments or suggestions should feel free to contact the committee via the FSGW hotline, 281-2228.
