FSGW MINI-FESTIVAL SAT., JAN. 28

Earl Robinson, John Jackson, and the Boarding Party headline the evening concert at FSGW's 1984 Mini-festival, Saturday, January 28, at Trinity College, 125 Michigan Ave., NE (across the street from Catholic University and the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception). In addition to the evening concert, the annual mini-festival features an evening dance, called by Tom Hines (with music by the Hobotoe String Band), daytime music and dance workshops, mini-concerts and song sessions, snack food, and the "folk marketplace," where records, tapes, instruments, accessories, and crafts will be for sale.

The activities begin at noon, with a short concert by the several workshop leaders, followed from 1 to 6 pm by workshops and mini-concerts (in five areas simultaneously). After a break for supper, the dance and concert begin at 8:30 pm. Food sales and the folk marketplace will operate

from noon to 6 pm, but not in the evening.

The evening concert will have a historical focus. Earl Robinson, composer of "Joe Hill" and "Ballad for Americans," was a compatriot of Woody Guthrie, Josh White, Leadbelly, and the Almanac Singers in the early days of the urban folk revival. He is sure to have many fascinating reminiscences to share with the audience in his portion of the concert.




