KINVARA, IRISH MUSIC AUGUST



The long, hot summer should seem a little shorter and cooler when <u>Kinvara</u> (Reel Union) brings the music and song of their native Ireland to an FSGW special event Friday, August 24, at Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church, Bethesda, MD. The 8:30 pm concert features one of the finest female Irish singers alive in Dolores Keane, and the sensitive and dynamic instrumental work of John Faulkner, Jackie Daly and James Kelly, in a combination guaranteed to please lovers of Irish music.

Dolores Keane sings in a voice which has been effusively praised by critics, described as "willowy but resilient, delicate yet powerful." A founding member of De Dannon, she plays both concertina and flute as well. Husband John Faulkner is a singer and instrumentalist (fiddle, guitar, bouzouki and hurdy-gurdy) with a solid grounding in traditional styles. He brings a thorough knowledge and conviction to his performances. (Continued on p. 2)

Jackie Daly has been playing button accordian since age 10, and imbues his playing with an impish glee. Also a former member of <u>DeDannon</u>, Jackie was strongly influenced by the last of the great Irish fiddle masters, Padraig O'Keefe.

James Kelly is a fiddler, and has been since age three. A member of both $\underline{\text{Kinvara}}$ and $\underline{\text{Planxty}}$ James is a veteran of the Irish music scene.

Kinvara is virtually a "who's who" of Irish music, and should provide a considerable relief to the summer doldrums. The concert at the air-conditioned church costs \$4. for FSGW members, \$5. for non-members. The church is at 6601 Bradley Blvd., Bethesda, three miles west of Wisconsin Ave.




SPECIAL FALL EVENTS SCHEDULED


