Monthly Program Features Bodie Wagner November 9



Singer-songwriter Bodie Wagner will return to the Washington area as the featured performer in FSGW¹ November program on Friday, November 9th at 8:30 pm at the WES Auditorium.

Bodie is a polished vocal and instrumental performer as well as a talented songwriter. His songs run the gamut from the light-hearted to ballads to songs in the cajun and blues tradition. Much of the material draws on Bodie's experience as a hitchhiker and hobo. His album <u>Hobo</u> is available on the Philo label. Although Bodie has appeared at the Philadelphia, Vancouver, and Mariposa Folk Festivals as well as the Smithsonian Folk Life Festival, he has made few East Coast appearances in the last few years.

The November program will be an overdue opportunity to catch up on his new songs and stories. The WES auditorium is at 7750 16th St., N.W. just below Kalmia. Admission is free for FSGW members, \$4. for nonmembers.

GORDON BOK CONCERT NOVEMBER 10

Gordon Bok, singer, songwriter, guitarist, and storyteller, returns to the Washington area for a solo concert (his first here in several years) Saturday, November 10th, at Gaston Hall, Georgetown University. The 8:30 pm concert is sure to be a popular one, and mail order tickets have been going well.

Gordon Bok is from Camden, Maine. Raised near the sea, he worked in shipyards and sailing vessels, working as everything from dishwasher to captain, and learning songs and stories from the people he worked with and met. Self-taught on guitars, 6- and 12-string, he sings traditional and handmade songs of many countries and home, tells tall and short stories, and creates a word world of sails and seals, of myth and music.

He has made seven solo albums, and four with Ed Trickett and Ann Mayo Muir. This trio did a memorable FSGW concert last April, and Gordon's fans who have been looking forward to a solo appearance will be well rewarded by this concert.

Jerry sings traditional songs, mostly unaccompanied (though he plays concertina and guitar quite well), and is a true scholar of folk songs, drawing on some very rare songs from such sources as the Frank and Anne Warner collection, which he transcribed for publication. Jerry is fond of audiences that like to sing, so bring your voice and be prepared.

PEGGY O'NEILL 1914-1984

Washington was deeply saddened by the death on October 15th of Peggy O'Neill, one of the country's premier teachers and adjudicators of Irish dance. Born in County Kildare in 1914, Mrs. O'Neill did not come to our area until 1964, yet in those two decades made a profound impression on the cultural self-awareness of our Irish-American community. She was active in the Irish-American Club and the Gaelic League, president of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, and Gael of the Year in 1978. Yet it is as the exacting, but loving, teacher of generations of Irish stepdancers, and as the indefatigable leader of Irish ceilidh dancing in our area, that she will be most fondly remembered. She will be keenly missed ... but, thanks to her, we'll go on dancing.

DON RENO

A heart attack on October 15 took blue-grass banjo innovator Don Reno. Reno's style was distinctively different from Earl Scruggs' featuring more complicated right-hand techniques and dextrous left-hand positioning (he avoided use of the capo). Reno spent 46 years on the road, with the late Red Smiley and later with Bill Harrell. Reno wrote over 500 songs and tunes, but his best-known tune was the relatively light-weight "Feudin' Banjos," later renamed "Duelin' Banjos" and used in the film "Deliverance."
