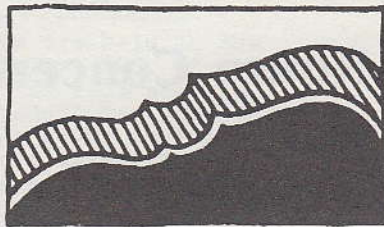

GOSPEL MUSIC OPENS 20TH YEAR



The first program in FSGW's 20th Anniversary season will be a rousing concert with Arlene Mills and the Ultrasounds on Friday, September 14th. Pastor Arlene Mills has been pursuing her "music ministry" by performing gospel music for over 20 years in the United States and Europe. For the past three years she has served as pastor of the Celestial Tabernacle in Philadelphia and she now performs with the Ultrasounds, a group composed of members of her family.

The group's music has a contemporary flavor but "makes you think of the old gospel." Pastor Mills says the group's goal is to "use the music to make people rethink their way of life." Those who saw the group at this year's Smithsonian Folklife Festival on the mall know the excitement and intensity they create. Arlene Mills and the Ultrasounds will kick off this year's program series at the WES auditorium



7750 16th Street, N.W., at 8:30 pm. Admission is free for FSGW members, \$4 for nonmembers. (There will not be a program in October, due to the Getaway.)

The WES auditorium is just inside the District line, near the corner of 16th and Kalmia. It is about half a mile from the Silver Spring Metro stop on the Red line, and also on a Metrobus line.

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The FSGW Board met on July 11th and August 1 in Arlington, Va., and Takoma Park, MD. Among other actions, the Board:

- Authorized Dance Chair Dave Eisner to open an account at Suburban Bank in the name of the FSGW dance program;
- Approved a new editorial policy for dance events announced in the FSGW Newsletter (see accompanying article);
- Dissolved the existing Finance Committee (which had been created for a one-year time span ending in June), and formed a new committee, to be headed by Vice President Dwain Winters;
- Approved the appointment of Dean Clamons and Laura Laning as co-chairs for the 1984 Getaway;
- Directed President Kathy Hicker-son to draft a letter to the appropriate Congressional committee stating FSGW's concerns with a bill that would make the square dance the National Folk Dance;
- Passed a motion that the FSGW monthly programs be held in the same location throughout the season, whenever possible;
- Approved an increase in FSGW's basic dues (see accompanying article);
- Approved a budget for 1984-85, and adopted Treasurer Dean Clamon's guidelines for budgetary matters;
- Authorized expenditures of up to \$2300 to replace FSGW's auxiliary sound system, and to purchase stronger cases for the concert system;
- Agreed to increase non-member admission fees for special events (see accompanying article); and
- Approved a "certificate of authority" establishing an FSGW checking account at Equitable Bank.

Any FSGW member may obtain copies of the budget or the letter on the square dance bill from Secretary Carol Lite.

BOARD APPROVES DUES INCREASE, EFFECTIVE OCT. 1

At its August 1 meeting, the FSGW Board voted to increase basic dues for Society members to \$12 for individuals and \$18 for families. The dues increase was necessary in order to continue to provide the same membership benefits as in the past (the Newsletter by first-class mail, nine free monthly programs, and reduced admission to special events and dances). The three-year dues rate is \$36 for individuals, and \$54 for families. The new dues rates will take effect October 1. Any new memberships or renewals received by the Membership Chair before that date will be processed at the old rate.

ADMISSION PRICES RISE

Since the FSGW Board has decided to raise membership dues, the difference between non-members' and members' admission to FSGW Events has also been raised, in order to maintain the incentive to become a member. In addition, admissions to some Special Events may from time to time be higher than heretofore. This is due to the fact that many performers are asking higher fees than they used to, and Special Events are intended to be self-supporting. We regret the necessity of this action.



NEW EDITORIAL POLICY FOR DANCE EVENTS

Because so many dancers seek dance with live musicians, all future dance event articles submitted should state whether the music is live or recorded. We do this as a service to our members, so, as of the December Newsletter the editor will, at her discretion, refuse to run any article which does not identify the source of the music.
