FRIDAY EVENING:

7 p.m. Prologue--Featuring two folk music bands; a small band, Alan Kerns and the Country K's (a bluegrass group), and a large band, the Takoma Mandaleers (a mandolin orchestra).

7:30 p.m. Concert--About two-thirds ethnic dancing and one-third music, featuring, among others, the Song Swappers and probably a gospel group. SATURDAY:

Noon til ?--Crafts and food items will be displayed and sold.

- 1 p.m. Youth Concert -- A concert of folk music performed by musicians teenaged or younger.
- 3 p.m. (roughly) -- The Adventure Theater will do dramatizations of folk tales.
- 7 p.m. Prologue -- Theme is "Old Time Music is Alive in Virginia"; featuring the Greasy Run Toad Trompers (you know them), Delmer Lester & Sons (a fiddle band), and Renee Pigeon (a banjo player).
- 7:30 p.m. Concert--Again about two-thirds dance and one-third music SUNDAY:

1 p.m. Sampler Concert -- A broad view of American folk music, featuring John Jackson, Chuck & Nan Perdue, Alberto Vazquez, Gus Meade & his band with Speedy Tolliver, Dallas Keller (an old fiddler from the Blue Ridge), and maybe some others.

SUNDAY continued

- 5 p.m. Religious Music Concert--Coordinated by Gene Anderson, featuring Chuck & Nan Perdue, a group of <u>Sacred Harp</u> singers, a black gospel group from the Mt. Olive Baptist Church and an ethnic group (probably Jewish or Hungarian).
- 7 p.m. Prologue—Fiddle jamboree featuring several of the top fiddlers in Northern Virginia, young and old, including Gus Meade and his band with Speedy Tolliver, Dallas Keller, and others.
- 7:30 p.m. Concert-Again basically two-thirds dance and one-third music.

 John Jackson will be one of the performers.

On Wednesday, May 23rd, the MARYLAND FOLKLORE SOCIETY will present a free showing of two films about life on the Chesapeake Bay. The first film, Watermen of the Chesapeake, was made in 1964 by the U.S. Department of Interior. It depicts the life of one family and how they make their livelihood on the water. There is some music in it—the crew sings as it works. The other film, Just Plain Waterman, was made in 1969 by Fisher Slezas. The showing is open to the public, begins at 8:15 p.m., and will be held in the Perpetual Building Auditorium, 7401 Wisconsin Ave., Bethesda, one block south of East-West Highway.
