### JOE AND ANTOINETTE CON"T

Joe plays the uilleann or elbow pipes and has won two consecutive all-Ireland championships (1974 and '75). He is a virtuoso of the instrument, combining high-speed melody playing on the chanter with beautiful, tasteful harmonies on the regulators. With the pipes and tin whistle he also accompanies Antoinette, who sings traditional Irish songs in both Gaelic and English, accompanying herself on the harp. A record of the McKenna's music was released recently on the Shanachie label.

May Gadd (Gay) will long be remembered for her inspired leadership and dedication to the Country dance and Song Society.

Sarah's voice was the most prominent in the sound of the original Carter Family. She inspired several generations of women singers of folk and country music.

Shortly before the newsletter went to press, we learnt with great sorrow of the tragic deaths of Will and Rodney Balfour, two of the famed Balfour Brothers who have bought Cajun music into National prominence. We will miss them.
