The institution of the southern minstrel show was one of the primary forces in the transmission of the Afro-American culture, and may have been the most important influence on American folk culture. At the same time, the minstrel show became a prominent symbol of the racist nature of American society of the period. At the FSGW march program, the DC Youth Ensemble will present its "Minstrelsy" program, which highlights the contributions of the minstrel tradition to American music, dance, and song while exploring the reasons for and effects of the sensitivity which remains on this subject. The DC Youth Ensemble is a young people's performing company made up of students ages twelve to eighteen who attend public and private schools throughout the Washington metropolitan area. The group has been warmly received in performances throughout the area, including the Smithsonian and WETA-TV. The program will begin at 8:30 p.m. on March 14 at the WES Hall, 7750 16th St. NW.
