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Songs, Tales from Belfast May 16 with Maggi Peirce

Whether she's singing songs, telling tales, or relating anecdotes from her Belfast childhood, Ireland's Maggi Peirce is an incomparable performer with a stage presence, wit, and repertoire that mesmerize her audiences. She'll be returning to Washington on Saturday, May 16 for a special FSGW performance at the Takoma Park Junior High School auditorium, 7611 Piney Branch Rd. (just north of Rte. 410/Philadelphia Ave./East-West Hwy.). The concert begins at 8:30 pm. Admission is \$4, for FSGW members and \$6, for nonmembers, with a \$1. discount for senior citizens.

A U.S. resident since 1964, Maggi was born Margaret Kerr in Belfast, Northern Ireland, where she grew up surrounded by songs, skipping rhymes, and recitations. She learned music hall songs from her Scottish father, while her mother's family provided a background of hymn-singing, recitations, children's songs, and stories. Her FSGW program will draw on all these traditions, combining songs, story-telling, and Victorian drawing-room recitations.



Martyn Wyndham-Read May 2

Australian Longs

Martyn Wyndham-Read, a great singer of Australian traditional songs, returns on Saturday, May 2, for a special FSGW concert at Piney Branch School in Takoma Park. The school, at 7510 Maple Ave., is just a few blocks from the Takoma Metro (Red Line) station, and also offers lots of free parking. The concert in the all-purpose room begins at 8:30 pm. Admission is \$4. for FSGW members, \$6. for nonmembers, with a \$1. discount for senior citizens.

Come for to Sing called Martyn "an astoundingly expressive and powerful singer, ... probably the finest (living) singer of Australian songs." His interest in this music began in 1960 when a travel urge led him from England to Australia. There, he worked as a jackaroo (apprentice) on a sheep station, learning songs from the very shearers and bullockies found in Australia's traditional songs and stories. After seven years, he returned to his Sussex home, but his love of the country and its music endured. "I just love the songs. Every time I sing them the flavor and smell of the bush comes back to me and I can taste the outback. Part of my heart will always be in Australia. I love the place, and I love its music!" A special Washington Folk Festival fundraising dance/concert occurs Monday, June 1, with a Cajun Potluck Supper, featuring not just one, but TWO top-notch bands, Beausoliel and Little Red and the Renegades. Come eat with the bands, meet the bands, dance, or just listen to this hot music from the Mississippi Bayou country at the Spanish Ballroom, Glen Echo Park, Glen Echo, MD.

Beausolie! has achieved national prominence for their rousing performances, excellent musicianship, and originality, incorporating traditional Cajun, Creole and medieval French music with New Orleans Jazz, island rhythms and Southern boogie. The band was formed by fiddler Michael Douset, called "Cajun's leading young innovator," and features Errol Verret (accordion), David Douset (guitar), Billy Ware (percussion), Tommy Alesi (drums), Tommy Comeaux (dobro, mandolin), and Dave Ranson (bass, rhythm guitar).

Little Red (Tom Corradino) has been playing Zydeco, the blues-oriented Cajun music, since the 1960's. Accordionist Corradino is highly knowledgeable and very adept at his craft. The Renegades have appeared at the Washington Folk Festival and Gerde's Folk City in New York, and have shared the stage with Queen Ida, Los Lobos, Dr. John and other top acts.

The potluck supper starts at 5:30 pm, and the music and dancing at 8. Admission is \$8, but you can become a FOLK ANGEL for \$25 (and get the FSGW T-shirt of your choice), or \$50 gains you the name of FOLK HERO! as well as the FSGW T-shirt of your choice and an autographed Beausoliel album. Free State Ramblers Program Friday, May 8



The late John Ashby's family has lived in Faquier County, Virginia since before the Revolutionary War. An Ashby family band was first formed around 1930 to play for dances and house parties. Later, this band became the Free State Ramblers, who are celebrating their fiftieth anniversary this year. The band has played the National Folk Festival (1938 - 1943), Connie B. Gay's hillbilly music programs on WARL radio (1947 - 1948), and even FSGW (long ago, too). The musical legacy of John Ashby returns to FSGW at 8:30 pm, Friday, May 8, at the WES Auditorium, 7750 16th St. NW.

Though John Ashby died in 1979, the Warrenton fiddle stringband style continues today, in the persons of fiddler R. B. Fraser, Skip Ashby (John's son) on bass, David Embry on banjo, and Ashby Kyhl (John's nephew) on guitar. Though this is another generation, the tradition continues.

Admission to this regular monthly FSGW program is free to FSGW members, \$4 to non-members, with a \$1 Senior Citizen discount. Come and enjoy fiddle and banjo music with a pedigree.

FSGW TAPING POLICY

When FSGW schedules concerts, the Society assures the performers that only an official, archival recording will be made -- subject to their permission -- of their performance. It is FSGW's policy to allow ABSOLUTELY NO TAPING of any Society concert by individuals. In many cases, performers allow FSGW to make listening copies of official concert tapes for members. When this is allowed, a member pays: 1) a fee for the recording engineer's time, 2) the cost of cassette tape(s), AND 3) a royalty fee for the performer. For more information on obtaining material from FSGW's tape archive, contact our tape archivist, Mike Rivers, at (703)241-7445.

GENERAL CONCERT POLICIES

Unless announced otherwise, FSGW <u>DOES NOT SELL ADVANCE TICKETS TO ANY EVENT!!!!</u> When advance tickets are available, information on purchase will be published in the <u>Newsletter</u> well in advance of the event. (1-3 months in advance) Admission prices announced in the <u>Newsletter</u> are the prices that are charged at the door for members and nonmembers. (Children under 12 are admitted for half the adult price; senior citizens receive a \$1. discount.)

The doors generally open at around 7:45 for an 8:30 concert, although audience members may have to wait to be seated until all sound checks are completed.

Other general rules-of-thumb include: [1] NO private taping of any FSGW concert; [2] NO flash photography of any FSGW concert without the expressed permission of (a) the FSGW person in charge, and (b) the performer; [3] NO smoking, eating, or drinking in the concert halls.






