

SARA GREY & ELLIE ELLIS IN CONCERT JULY 24

It has been many years since Sara Grey, a long-time friend of FSGW, has returned to Washington for a concert. Her long-awaited return will take place on Friday, July 24, when Sara, joined by Ellie Ellis and Paul Downes, performs for FSGW in a special concert at the WES Auditorium, 7750 Sixteenth St., N.W. (near Kalmia Rd., just south of the DC/Silver Spring line). Admission to the concert is \$4. for FSGW members, and \$6. for nonmembers, with a \$1. discount for senior citizens. The performance begins at 8:30 pm.

Sara and Ellie are two American women who have lived in Scotland and England since 1981. Sara frails 5-string banjo, and is a marvelous singer whose expressive solo voice can be heard on the Folk-Legacy label. Ellie, who sings and plays guitar, has been touring with Sara for a number of years, and has recorded with her on the Fellside and Greenwich Village labels. Together they present a combination of old-

timey, traditional and contemporary songs from the U.S. and Canada, plus lyric songs and ballads from their adopted England. On this tour, their first in this country in six years, they will be joined by singer/instrumentalist Paul Downes, whose fine musicianship can be heard on more than 80 LPs.

After eight months of planning, FS6W and the National Park Service are once again presenting the Washington Folk Festival to the Greater Washington community. On Saturday, June 6th from 12 noon to 10 pm and Sunday, June 7th from 12 noon to 6 pm over 500 performers from more than 30 countries will once again sing, dance, tell, play, and demonstrate cherished traditions.

Come to historic Glen Echo Park in Maryland at the intersection of Goldsboro Road and MacArthur Blvd. and see celebrated local folk groups such as Magpie, the Boarding Party, and Grazz Matazz. Listen to the haunting blues of John Jackson, the liquid tones of Ed Trickett's hammered dulcimer, and the virtuosity of musicians like Jeff Warner and Pete Kennedy. Enjoy the many workshops including old favorites like Banjo, Gospel, Guitar Styles, Blues, Harmony,

Festival Schedule, Gerry Hallom



British Singer Gerry Hallom Friday, June 26

FSGW's summer series of special events will start on Friday, June 26, with an FSGW debut concert by British singer/guitarist Gerry Hallom at the WES Auditorium, 7750 Sixteenth St., N.W. The concert begins at 8:30 pm. Admission is \$4. for FSGW members, \$6. for nonmembers, with a \$1 discount for senior citizens.

Although he is British, Gerry's repertoire comes mainly from the wealth of songs and stories of the Australian pioneers. From gentle ballads of the drover's life, to up-tempo songs echoing the independent spirit of the itinerant bushworker, to poems that give a taste of the dry wit and ironic sense of humor that are part of Australia's character, Gerry paints a vivid picture of the land and its people. His driving, yet subtly intricate guitar style is reminiscent of British folk greats Nic Jones and Martin Carthy.

Gerry's hard-to-obtain LPs, A Run a Minute and Travelin' Down the Castlereagh (both on the Fellside label), will be available at the concert. Don't miss this first-ever Washington appearance by a fine performer.

Boston-area guitarist, singer, and banjo player Larry Unger will make his FS6W concert debut on Friday, July 17, in a house concert at the air-conditioned home of Mike Rivers in Falls Church, VA. Admission to the concert is \$4. for FS6W members and \$6. for nonmembers, with a \$1. discount for senior citizens. For directions to the concert, which begins at 8:30 pm, call Mike at 241-7445.

Larry Unger is a versatile musician who specializes in tunes from the traditions of ragtime, blues, and Irish music. He is known for his adaptations of piano rags, swing and fiddle tunes, and his collection of 1920s vintage humorous songs. A typical concert might also include old-time tunes played clawhammer style on banjo, a blues song by Blind Blake, Swedish dance tunes on guitar, and one or two original compositions. His performances convey his knowledge and love of traditional music in a way that fellow performer Maggi Peirce describes as "always a joy."

BALTIMORE'S 'GRIOT' JUNE 12 PROGRAM

Our June program features a dynamic performer who says she likes to "build bridges of understanding where there are chasms" in age, background, and experience. Bringing us songs, stories, history, humor, poetry -- the many different aspects of the Afro-American experience -- Mary Carter Smith has been a full-time storyteller for 17 years. Come have fun, and be entranced at the regular FSGW monthly program, Friday, June 12 at 8:30 pm, at the WES Auditorium, 7750 Sixteenth St., NW.

Mary Carter Smith is Baltimore's official 'griot' (storyteller). She has travelled the U.S., the Caribbean and Europe, and visited Africa seven times all the while learning and telling tales. She's Alabama-born, but has absorbed the lore of Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia while living at times in each state. She is already well-known to the Smithsonian, local school systems, the Kennedy Center and Storytelling festivals throughout the mid-Atlantic. A fascinating performer, she also spent many years teaching school, and is a television producer, radio host, and author (including co-writing The Griot's Cookbook).

Admission to the program, as usual, is *FREE* for FSGW members, \$4. for nonmembers, with a \$1. senior citizen discount for nonmembers.

- July 5: Connie Waring with Triple Delight. From Philadelphia, Connie brings us mostly contras to music by Ellen Jacobs, fiddle; Charlie Pilzer, bass; Ritchie Schuman, guitar along with Karen Ashbrook on hammered dulcimer.
- July 12: Too Gone Conclusions (Half of Fourgone Conclusions)? David Kaynor calls and plays fiddle along with Van Kaynor, fiddle, and Mary Cay Brass, piano. The trio brings us the rowdy contra style of northern Massachusetts.
- July 19: Fred Park with Roustabout. Fred brings us his inimitable Southern style with lots of squares and some of his own contras to the spirited music of our own Roustabout (Chris Romaine, Lars Hanslin, and Ritchie Schuman).

Unless announced otherwise, FSGW <u>DOES NOT SELL ADVANCE</u> <u>TICKETS TO ANY EVENT!!!!</u> When advance tickets are available, information on purchase will be published in the <u>Newsletter</u> well in advance of the event. (1-3 months in advance) Admission prices announced in the <u>Newsletter</u> are the prices that are charged at the door for members and nonmembers. (Children under 12 are admitted for half the adult price; senior citizens receive a \$1. discount.)

The doors generally open at around 7:45 for an 8:30 concert, although audience members may have to wait to be seated until all sound checks are completed.

Other general rules-of-thumb include: [1] NO private taping of any FS6W concert; [2] NO flash photography of any FS6W concert without the expressed permission of (a) the FS6W person in charge, and (b) the performer; [3] NO smoking, eating, or drinking in the concert halls.


