The Folklore Society and the National Building Museum are pleased to join forces to bring you a full day of fun, fellowship and fine singing on Saturday, Feb. 4. Gospel is the theme, and W. Virginia's Ethel Caffie Austin and DC's Word of God Youth Choir will raise the roof of the Great Hall of the National Building Museum in a concert, Saturday, Feb. 4 starting earlier than usual at 7:30pm.

Ethel Caffie Austin invites you to help her create a choir at a workshop from 1-4pm. If you like singing harmony, learning music—and to sing it boldly, come to the workshop! The evening's concert will be your choir debut.

In addition to her solo performances, Ethel teaches "Gospel For Everyone" at conferences and festivals, including the Augusta Heritage Arts Workshops.

The Word of God Youth Choir is composed of 25 young adults who regularly sing at the Word of God Baptist Church on K Street SE. A community-based choir, their repertoire reflects a more contemporary gospel sound. They received first-place honors in the choir category of last summer's Kennedy Center gospel competition. The choir is directed by Daryl Mims and accompanied by drums and piano. Their energetic sound will surely stretch the seams of the Museum.

HAPPY TRAUM FEBRUARY PROGRAM


Friday, February 10th

The February FSGW Program, Friday, February 10th, at 8:30pm in the WES Auditorium, features Happy Traum, a great name in American folk music.

Happy Traum has been active in American music for nearly thirty years. He began playing guitar and 5-string banjo in the mid-1950's, and was an active participant in the legendary Washington Square (Greenich Village) folk scene. A full-time musician since graduating from NYU in 1960, Happy has performed extensively on 3 continents, both as a soloist and as a member of various groups. The recording list for Happy Traum reflects both his solo career (4 albums). his continuing duet performances with his brother Artie (3 albums), and his collaborations with other performers (5 albums). His avid i terest in traditional and contemporary music has brought him recognition as a performer, writer, editor, folklorist, teacher and recording artist.

Happy has written more than a dozen books which teach and document the playing styles of great traditional guitarists. He has been editor of Sing Out! The Folksong Magazine. With his brother Artie, he hosts a popular radio show, "Bring It On Home", broadcast monthly over WAMC, Albany, NY.

The Seventh Annual Chesapeake Spring Dance Weekend

March 31-April 2, 1989

Fool: a person with a talent, fondness, or enthusiasm for a certain activity (as in, "I'm a dancin' fool").

Spend the weekend of April Fool's Day in a fool's paradise of music and dance. This year's program will feature New England traditional dance, Southern squares, Irish stepdancing, traditional French and Breton social dance, and song and instrument workshops. Music and dance workshops will be held throughout Saturday and Sunday, and there will be evening dances on Friday and Saturday. As always, there will be plenty of opportunities for informal dancing, singing, and music-making. Be sure to bring something foolish for the Saturday evening Fool's Dance.

CAMPLETTS

Located in Edgewater, Maryland, ten miles from Annapolis and 34 miles from Washington, D.C., Camp Letts is on a peninsula created by two rivers flowing into the Chesapeake Bay. The camp is owned and operated by the YMCA on the grounds of a former estate. The main dances will be held in the spacious wood-floored dance hall overlooking the waterfront. This building doubles as the dining hall for meals prepared by our favorite caterer, Barbara Kline. Smaller workshops will be held in other buildings on the camp grounds. Weather permitting, we will also have access to other camp facilities including walking trails, tennis courts, athletic fields, boating, and horseback riding (modest fee). Cabins are dormitory style, sleeping 8-12 persons to a room. We can accommodate most people in heated facilities with bathrooms, but some participants will be assigned to more rustic, unheated cabins. Cabin assignments are based on date of receipt of application and space is limited so register early.

Staff

Lotus Dickey, singer, songwriter, musician. Quentin Lotus Dickey lives and works on the farm in Paoli, Indiana where he was born and where he has been singing, fiddling, and composing songs for the last 70 years or so. In the last ten years he has charmed audiences at folk festivals and concerts around the U.S., including the National Folk Festival, Augusta, and Pinewoods, with his own compositions as well as traditional songs and stories he learned as a child. Lotus will be offering music and song workshops and talking about his life in Indiana.

Larry Edelman, caller, Southern dances. Larry has travelled from Maine to Alaska collecting, performing, teaching, and calling dances. Throughout these travels his energetic and challenging calling have made Larry a favorite of dancers. Larry has taught and called at many dance camps and was coordinator of Augusta Dance Week for several years.

Bob McQuillen, piano and accordian. Bob played his first dance for Ralph Page in 1947 and since then has established himself as the quintessential New England dance musician. His original compositions, such as "Dancing Bear" and "Amelia's Waltz," have been enjoyed by many dancers and recorded by many artists. Performing with Bob this weekend will be Greengate: Sarah Bauhan on flute and whistle; David Surette on mandolin and guitar; and Jane Orzechowski on fiddle.

Susan Elberger, caller, New England dances. Susan has been calling dances for more than ten years, from New England to Devon, England, and at festivals including Fox Hollow, Eisteddfod, NEFFA, Heritage, and Hudson River. She has written more than 25 dances, many of which have been taken into the popular dance repertoire. She has been president of the New England Folk Festival Association since 1985.

Critton Hollow String Band, Southern dance band. With Sam Herrmann on hammered dulcimer, Joe Herrmann on fiddle, and Joe Fallon on guitar and banjo, Critton Hollow has developed a large following that can't get enough of their warm, personable style of singing and playing. Since their start in 1975, the band has performed at countless concerts, festivals, and dance camps. Their most recent album is "Great Dreams."

Maubuissons, traditional dance band of Brittany and France. Well known in the Paris region, Maubuisson plays for Bals-Folk (evenings of traditional French dancing) and Festou-noz (Breton dance parties). Their music includes tunes for couple, circle, and set dances such as valses, mazurkas, bourrees, and gavottes. The group members are: Bruno LeTron on diatonic accordian; Francois LeTron on guitar and mandolin; and Serge Liorzou on bombardes, saxophone, gaita, and French bagpipes.

Marilyn Wathen, instructor, traditional French social dances. A teacher of international folk dance at Santa Rosa Junior College in California for 18 years, Marilyn has done extensive research into the traditional music and dances of France, studying in master dance classes and meeting with musicians and instrument makers. She has helped organize dance camps at Mendocino and has taught at many others, including Pinewoods, Buffalo Gap, Stockton, and the Kolo Festival. Marilyn will teach traditional group and couple dances of France, particularly those of Berry and the Auvergne.

Linnane Wick, instructor, Irish stepdance. Linnane has won numerous competitions as a World Class dancer in Ireland and the U.S. since 1980. She now teaches in Denver and performs all over the country. Washington area dancers may have seen Linnane perform with her brother, Regan Wick, at the Glen Echo Irish Folk Festival. Linnane will be offering several levels of stepdance workshops and will discuss the background of Irish stepdance.

Danny Noveck and Philippe Varlet will join forces to play for Irish stepdancing. Danny is known for his fine tenor banjo, guitar, and fiddle playing. His repertoire also includes New England and Quebecois music. He taught banjo and played for dance classes at Celtic week at Ashokan last summer. Philippe has been playing Irish fiddle with D.C. area bands for ten years. He is currently at work on a dissertation on Irish dance music.

REGISTRATION

The cost for the weekend is \$100, which includes program costs, sleeping accommodations (participants supply own bedding) and use of other camp facilities, and five meals (potluck Friday night). Each application must be accompanied by a \$60 deposit of which all but \$15 will be refunded if cancellation is made by March 17. You are encouraged to pay the full fee in advance if possible. Full payment must be made on arrival at Camp Letts. Check-in begins at 4:00 p.m. Friday; the program concludes at 3:30 Sunday. A number of \$60 registrations are available in exchange for five hours of work in the kitchen (\$60 deposit is required for scholarship registrations).

Attendance at the dance weekend is limited. In the past it has filled up very quickly, so early registration is encouraged. Applications will be accepted on a first-come/first-served basis, with a balance maintained between men and women. Participants must be at least 18 years of age; unfortunately, we cannot accommodate children. Once your application is received, you will be sent a confirmation, additional information about the schedule, and directions to Camp Letts.
