
"THE GOLDEN VOICE OF THE GREAT SOUTHWEST"

An American original, U. Utah Phillips sings songs that evoke images of the Old West, outrage at injustice, and laughter. He also delights in telling t-a-l-l tales--and taking his spellbound audiences for the ride. "Everybody tells a story," he says. "Everybody is a story. Hopefully, when we get to the end, it will have been well told."

U. Utah Phillips' shows have always been a celebration - of everything from life on the rails to union solidarity to the joys of parenthood - in folkclubs and at festivals since the late 60's. Over the years he has washed dishes, helped build a hospital on a Navajo reservation, worked as a printer, warehouseman, and archivist, assisted in the management of a house for migrants and vagrants and has been a neighborhood organizer. All these jobs have inspired stories. "You can live in a big city will millions of people and go days without ever talking to anyone," he said. "You can even get money out of a hole in the wall of the bank now and not even have to talk to a teller."

LO JAI - FRENCH FOLK ENSEMBLE

Sunday April 7, 8:30pm

Prepare to be swept away on a musical journey of enchantment and adventure as the French ensemble Lo Jai performs Sun. Apr. 7, 8:30pm at the Unitarian Church of Arlington VA, 4444 Arlington Blvd. (at SE corner of Rt. 50 & George Mason Dr.) The music of Lo Jai ranges from medieval dance tunes and ballads heard in the time of Joan of Arc to contemporary settings of the 18th and 19th century airs still played in the French countryside. Drawing from a diverse instrumental palette that includes flute, accordion, violin, hurdy-gurdy, tinwhistle, saxophone, and a welter of bagpipes, keyboard and percussion, Lo Jai creates an ever-shifting sound mosaic of textures and moods gliding effortlessly from the subtlety and precision of a classical chamber group to the wild abandon of a crossroads dance band at a village wedding feast.

Lo Jai has toured throughout Europe, Mexico, Canada & the U.S. performing at folk clubs and universities as well as major festivals: Edinburgh, Philadelphia, Vancouver, Sweden's Jarne, & the Festival des

musiques Celtiques. Group members include Pierre Imbert (hurdy-gurdy, percussion, kalimba), Eric Montbel (French bagpipes, keyboards, vocals, tinwhistle), Christian Oller (diatonic accordion, violin, percussion), Guy Bertrand (vocals, flute, string tabor/one hand flute, soprano sax), & Didier Boyat (keyboards). As an ensemble & individually they play key roles as performers and scholars in the recent French folk music renaissance. The result is a lively mix of erudition and humor - spiced repartee that makes Lo Jai an immediate favorite with audiences of all ages. Hypnotic, exhilarating, uncompromisingly creative - the music of Lo Jai is a unique entertainment experience. At the Unitarian Church of Arlington VA. FSGW's Fallon Family Benefit is Sunday, April 14!

Concert (2pm at Takoma Park Intermediate School) & Dance (7:30pm at Glen Echo's Spanish Ballroom)

On Sunday, April 14th, FSGW will host a concert and dance to benefit the fund established to help the Fallon Family with their medical bills. As you may remember from previous *Newsletters*, Linda Fallon was diagnosed with cancer while pregnant. Their daughter, Monica, was safely delivered; Linda is still undergoing treatment.



The benefit concert at the Takoma Park Intermediate School (7611 Piney Branch Road, Takoma Park MD) begins at 2pm. Freyda Epstein & the Atta Boys perform along with Blanton, Gordon, and Austen.

After leaving the band Trapezoid, with its marvelous mixture of musical talents, Freyda Epstein collaborated with Fred Boyce and Bob Vasile in providing music for a Charlottesville VA production of Sam Shepard's play, "A Lie of the Mind," in 1989. All three immediately noted a "special and spontaneous chemistry" among them, and they've recently added the spark of former Trapezoid



member Ralph Gordon. The group performs a mesmerizing blend of earthy ballads, soulful songs, and innovative instrumentals infused with classical influence. Rounding out the repertoire are several original songs by banjoist Boyce, an imaginative writer bent on emancipating the banjo from its formerly rigid stylistic definition.

Nick Blanton and Ralph Gordon perform a wide and eclectic assortment of music on hammered dulcimer, bass and cello, ranging from fiddle tunes, Irish music, and eastern European music to baroque, renaissance and early music. Seldom heard performing together, they bring a fresh voice to the tunes they play, not only because of the unusual combination of instruments but also because the diversity of their backgrounds has greatly influenced their playing styles. They have played together for over ten years solely for their own enjoyment, and their long association shows in their fluid movement from hammered dulcimer to cello lead and back. This performance will give us a rare opportunity to appreciate Ralph Gordon's talents in another context besides back-up in his many ensembles. The duo became a trio when they were joined by new acoustic guitarist Seth Austen. Seth has several recordings on his own and with Maddie MacNeil. The trio has a debut album called "Ways Upon Bells."

The concert runs from 2-5pm. Admission: \$8 FSGW members, \$10 others. The School is located at 7611 Piney Branch Road, one block north of the intersection of Piney Branch and Philadelphia Ave (East-West Hwy, Rt. 410).

Following the concert, we move to Glen Echo Park, Glen Echo MD, for a potluck supper at the Park's Bumper Car Pavilion from 5:30-7pm. This is a great chance to talk to the musicians who have participated in the afternoon concert as well as those who will do the evening's dance: Critton Hollow String Band and caller Bob Dalsemer. You bring the food; FSGW supplies non-alcoholic set-ups, paper plates, etc. This is also a good



opportunity to meet fellow FSGW members and your Board members (current and newly nominated).



The second part of our benefit is the Sunday Night Dance at Glen Echo's Spanish Ballroom. Critton Hollow String Band is Sam Herrmann, hammered dulcimer and mandolin; Joe Herrman, fiddle and banjo; and Joe Fallon, guitar and banjo. Critton Hollow personifies the spirit, sound, creativity, and energy of an old-time string band. Bob Dalsemer, the evening's caller, is one of the East Coast's most popular callers, and we are fortunate he lives in nearby Baltimore. As Critton Hollow would say, "Be there or be square!" The dance starts at 7:30pm. Admission: \$8, FSGW; \$10, others.



MUSIC FROM QUEBEC

Lisa Ornstein with Nick Hawes

Music from Quebec, Canada, is the subject of the April Program. FSGW is fortunate to present the fiddling of Lisa Ornstein with accompaniment by Nicholas Hawes. She grew up in the Midwest as a member of a musical family and started playing the violin 27 years ago. Lisa began to explore the worlds of traditional fiddling when she was 15, visiting with old-time musicians in Ohio and West Virginia and with Irish musicians in Cleveland.

A meeting with Franco-American fiddler Louis Beaudoin in 1973 sparked a long-term, very close musical apprenticeship and friendship which resulted in Lisa's move to Quebec in 1978. She was to stay for only a year to do independent research on French-Canadian fiddling but instead remained in Quebec for 14 years. Lisa became a member of La bottine souriante, one of the preeminent Quebec folk groups and as she says, "spent countless hours in kitchens and dance halls in many

parts of the province." Lisa also says, "playing music is my means of communion with a host of fondly-remembered fiddlers and accordion players whom I met during my stay in Quebec. I have a particularly deep admiration for the self-sufficient, 'dance orchestra of one' solo repertories of the older generation of dance musicians."

Nick Hawes is accomplished on many instruments, including piano, button accordion, and fiddle. He lived for many years in the Northeast and has spent time in Quebec working and playing with Lisa. He will accompany Lisa on piano. Together, Lisa and Nick will present dance music from the province of Quebec.

The monthly program for May will be at the WES auditorium on May 10, 1991 and will feature the Toast String Stretchers from North Carolina. Details will be in the May issue of the FSGW Newsletter.

Our yearly volunteer drive is underway, and we'd love to hear from you. Just a couple hours of your time can help make two days of fun and music possible!

What kinds of jobs do we need people to do? Last month, we described **Operations**, the construction and stage crew. This month, we'll describe some of the other ways you can help out and meet people during the festival.

Sandwiches, salad and soda are provided for performers who volunteer their talents to the festival. Exercise your talents at chopping veggies, serving sandwiches and performing traditional KP on the Food Crew. Help folks find their way around the Park, hand out programs, distribute flyers for upcoming local folkie events, and encourage people to join the FSGW at the Membership, Information and Program Booths. Get your start in the Festival's garment district, raising money to support WFF in small, medium, large or extra-large amounts in T-Shirt Sales. Let craftspeople take a break by watching their wares for a while as a Craft Sitter.

Our indoor stages need Ushers to direct people to seating and SHuSHshers to encourage quiet so the performers may be heard. Help direct traffic to and from our satellite Parking Lot and give directions to shuttle bus pick-up and drop-off points - your chance to tell people where to go! In the Office, meet and check in performers, staff and your fellow volunteers at the hub of Festival activity. At Instrument Check, learn the difference between a tubaphone and a balalaika while helping performers stash their instruments until they need them. If you are a skilled Sound Technician or Photographer, and would like to volunteer your talents, let us know.

The Washington Folk Festival could not exist without the cooperation and efforts of people just like you. Everyone involved is a volunteer--performers and staff alike. Won't you join us this year?

The Washington Folk Festival is FREE to everyone attending, but it isn't without production costs. Second Annual Potomac River Sacred Harp Singing Convention Friday, April 5, 2-5pm & 7-9pm and Saturday, April 6, 9:30am-4pm

Fairfax Unitarian Church, 2709 Hunter Mill Road in Oakton, VA, will ring with the sound of 200 voices raised in song in an FSGW-sponsored traditional two-day singing of the powerful and harmonious early-American folk music from The Original Sacred Harp.

On Friday, April 5, Hugh McGraw from Bremen, Georgia, President of the Sacred Harp Publishing Company and recognized authority on Sacred Harp Singing, will teach a special singing school from 2-5 pm. Mr. McGraw received a National Heritage Award for his contributions to the preservation of this uniquely American singing tradition and was the featured songleader of the Georgia Sacred Harp singers in Bill Moyers' recent PBS television special Amazing Grace. He will instruct in the basics of the shape note method and share his abundant knowledge of the colorful history of this tradition. He will be assisted by Richard DeLong from Davidsonville, Georgia, Secretary of the National Sacred Harp Foundation and a renowned treble singer.

On the same day from 7 to 9 pm and on Saturday, April 6, from 9:30 am to 4 pm, the traditional singing sessions will take place. In accordance with the time-honored practices of this tradition, the singers sit in a hollow square facing each other (one voice part on each side) and sing with remarkable intensity and enthusiasm and without instrumental accompaniment. The four part harmony is exceptionally rich because the treble and tenor parts are sung by both men and women singing an octave apart. Singers democratically take turns leading songs of their choice in the center of the square. Each tune is sung first by singing the syllables of the shape notes, followed by the words, a practice which both honors the singing school tradition and assists in learning the tune.

Singing schools spread across America in the 18th and 19th centuries as a popular form of recreation and led to the publication of numerous songbooks, including The Sacred Harp in 1844. The music is written in "shape notes" which resemble standard musical notation except that the head of each note has a shape to indicate its interval from the key pitch. This method enables untrained singers to sight read music easily, but does not interfere with sight singing by trained musicians who are unfamiliar with the shape note code. Shape note singing continues to be popular in the rural South where there exists a tradition of all day singings of Sacred Harp ("fa-so-la") music in rustic one-room churches,

with dinner on the grounds, the honoring of deceased relatives and friends, and traditional Southern hospitality and fellowship.

The music itself is characterized by melody lines in the tenor part, strong rhythms, stark and open harmonies, and numerous songs in minor or modal scales (such as *Wondrous Love*). Its roots lie in the 18th century fusion of elements from the folk music of the British Isles with those of medieval European church music, resulting in gems of rugged music set to the powerful religious poetry of the day.

Beginning and experienced singers (and listeners and observers!) are welcome to participate in all or part of these two days of singing and fellowship. The sound of upwards of 200 voices singing this music is an unforgettable, and at times moving experience. Loaner songbooks will be available for use. ALL SESSIONS ARE FREE AND OPEN TO THE PUBLIC and a free-will offering will be collected to help pay the expenses.

Coffee and donuts will be available to fortify those attending the Saturday morning session, and traditional potluck meals will be shared on Friday at 5 pm and on Saturday at noon. Local folks are encouraged to add a few extra portions to their potluck contributions to help feed the many out-of-town visitors expected. Child care is available to those who register for it by April 2; call Janine Smith at 301-926-9142. It will include a brief history of the tradition, recorded examples, instruction (with lots of new visual aids), practice session, resources available, and an opportunity to meet people and ask questions. The North American Folk Music and Dance Alliance

The "Folk Alliance" met in Chicago from January 24-27. Mary Cliff represented FSGW and sends these notes: Some 300 people attended the Third Annual Conference. Networking is always the best part of these events and we trade lots of "lore"--names, references, ideas and methods. Panels and workshops included peer sessions (magazines, instrument makers, small folk societies, performers, agents, radio producers, record companies, etc.), organizational planning, career management, multi-cultural programs, folk in the schools, fundraising, folklorists, family programming, volunteers, etc. The biggest laugh came at the tongue-in-cheek suggestion that we "define folk music."

Attendees ranged from traditional artists and folklorists to singer-songwriters and administrators of small volunteer events to huge paying festivals. They all had real involvement in the folk music industry-full time, part time, paid or volunteer. The exhibit hall was impressive and almost too small for the number of exhibits. Two dozen performers/ensembles were showcased--from Indian dance to old-timey fiddle, blues harp to celtic harp--no weak links here. Canada was strongly represented. And jam sessions lasted well into the nights.

Although this was the third conference, the "Folk Alliance" just incorporated this year, and there's still a lot of housekeeping to do. For example, should we be an organization of organizations, or of individuals or of entities (which could include both)? Should we be oriented to professionalism -- performers, agents, presenters and others involved with the business of folk music? Should we be open to everybody? or some combination of these? Attendees and other voting members obviously weren't decided on these yet, since none of the substantive by-laws changes received the 2/3 vote needed. Wording of the by-laws can affect our status as a "non-profit organization" or a trade or professional group. We've applied for non-profit; IRS is considering.

Where is the Alliance going? Getting professional (i.e., serious) in our approach to the music, the performers, the events, networking, trading information, advocating for the folk arts, especially in funding—and there's still time to get in there and steer. I'm the Secretary and will be attending the Board meeting in April. If you have input or would like membership information, get in touch with me.
