22nd Annual MiniFest

Saturday, January 29

Afternoon Events 12 - 6pm Concert / Dance 7:30 - 10:30pm

The end of January is the time for the Minifest, the FSGW annual fund raising event. The Minifest offers an opportunity to get out of your house and participate in a day of song, music, storytelling, crafts and dance. The Takoma Park Intermediate School, 7911 Piney Branch Rd., Takoma Park, MD. will once again be the location for the Minifest. Afternoon music and dance workshops, music swaps, jams, craft demonstrations and mini-concerts will start at noon and run until 6pm. An evening concert and dance will start (concurrently) at 7:30pm and end at 10:30pm.

Afternoon Events

The theme of the afternoon is **Participation by Everyone!**Sessions are conducted by selected members of the folk community with participation by all encouraged. Some sessions will be directed at beginners, others at the more experienced. Music sessions will be tutorials, swaps and jams. Tutorials will be structured with leaders teaching or demonstrating some particular facet of folklore. Swaps and jams will be guided and open to all to trade music and information. Dances will include demonstration and instruction; all dance sessions will have live music. There will be mini-concerts by local folk performers, including instrumental concerts, storytelling sessions and folk singers. A number of artisans will exhibit their handicrafts and demonstrate their skills.

Song tutorial and swap themes include harmony, ballads, parodies, bawdy songs, rounds, sacred harp and more! Instrumental jams include old-timey (with clogging space), jazz, blues, bluegrass and ragtime. Tutorials and swaps will be held for guitar, fiddle, hammered dulcimer, squeeze box, and more! Be sure to bring your harmonica and penny whistle (or buy them on the spot). Music of the world will be played from such far-flung places as Japan, Finland and Iran. You will be exposed to dances of many sorts, such as English Country, Cajun, Morris, Balkan and American Swing.

For Kids

Events tailored for families and children will be scheduled throughout the afternoon. A kids-make-it table will be supervised in the crafts area. Music, stories and mime will engage all who enter. Among those featured will be Cathy Fink, Marcy Marxer and Mark Jaster.

Evening Concert and Dance

These will be held concurrently, starting at 7:30pm - 10:30pm. Among the featured artists are Ed Trickett, Susan Garrison (storyteller), two acts TBA and a Surprise master of ceremonies.

Trails End Kitchen (run by Debbie McClatchy) will provide a delicious array of comestibles throughout the afternoon. Dinner will be available from 5 - 6pm or boxed with advance reservation.

Great Night for the Irish Friday, January 14, 8:30pm

FSGW welcomes the new year with its January program concert of driving Irish music by two traditional musicians from the New York area, Brian Conway and John Nolan, backed by Baltimore pianist, Donna Long. Regan Wick, national step-dancing champion, will kick off the evening.



Brian Conway won the All Ireland Senior Fiddle Championship in 1986 by playing in the Sligo style for which he is known. A technically brilliant player (trained since boyhood by such master teachers as Martin Mulvihill and Martin Wynne), Brian is never flamboyant or rushed. Instead, he communicates the rhythmic subtleties and innate lyricism of every tune he plays, enticing his listeners to join him as he blows along the melodic line. Each jig or reel is a micro-improvisation in itself, reveling new possibilities with every repetition. Brain rarely travels. His job as an assistant District Attorney in White Plains, NY, his marriage to fiddler and step-dancer Bernadette Fee, and his many appearances at community gatherings in the New York area keep him close to home. Nevertheless, his recordings and star-billing at major Irish Festivals have made him a legend among Celtic music enthusiasts.

John Nolan, virtuoso on the two- and three- row button accordion, is the first American ever to win an All Ireland Senior Championship in that category. Influenced by his accordion-playing father, as well as by Sean McGlynn and Billy McComiskey, John has become a acknowledged master at New York ceilis and national festivals. Over the last few years, he has been focusing on his work with Brian Conway, disbanding his successful show band, *The John Nolan Band*. John has a recent recording entitled *A Taste for the Traditional*.

Donna Long's elegant and innovative piano accompaniments need no introduction to Washington audiences. She appears regularly with Brendan Mulvihill--recently at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival, the National Folk Festival in Chattanooga, The Library of Congress's *Neptune Concert Series* and last spring's Irish Folk Festival at Wolf Trap. Trained in classical music as



a child, in Los Angeles, she has been working out her own approach to accompanying Irish music in collaboration with Brendan Mulvihill. Building on the precedents of Sean Ó Riáda and Micheál Ó Súilleabhain, she integrates classical and baroque elements into her arrangements. Much of her rhythmic and melodic qualities, however, come from an informed understanding of Cape Breton piano styles. Donna teaches piano accompaniment at workshops all over the country: at Augusta, at the Milwaukee Irish festival, and locally. She may be heard with Brendan Mulvihill on *Morning Dew* on Green Linnet. This concert will be held at the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th St. N.W., Washington, D.C.
