

James "Sparky" Rucker's Civil War Show An Evening of Historic Epic and Blues Friday, April 8, 8:30pm



On Fri. Apr. 8 at 8:30pm, the FSGW Program Series presents a special evening of folk music and theater. Featured will be James "Sparky" Rucker's Civil War Show: *The Blue & Gray in Black & White: A Civil War Folk Odyssey*. Sparky's banjo, guitar and rich repertoire of African American blues and ballads have long been familiar to folk music enthusiasts from the Washington area. This program will draw upon his skills as a historian and story-teller as he focuses on the American Civil War's impact on different regions of the country. The stories, some sad and some humorous, reflect personal insights from various war participants. They provide a poignant context for the songs he sings and invests them with new life and beauty. *The Blue & Gray in Black & White* comes to us with great acclaim wherever it has been performed. The Petersburg National Battlefield, The Chickamauga & Chattanooga National Military Park and the Augusta Heritage Festival are just a few of its recent venues.

Sparky, a former Chattanooga school teacher, was drawn into the civil rights movement in the early sixties when spirituals and slave songs provided living musical traditions from which to draw inspiration and a sense of historical continuity. He remains active with The Highlander Research and Education Center

which has long provided a safe haven for him to research and build his knowledge. Sharing his music with schools and grass roots organizations is, for Sparky, a way to empowering people and communities. "Folk history," he maintains, "is the best way for people to learn their heritage because it's written by the people that lived the experiences, and people have always been more real than the way they are portrayed in the history books."

As an added attraction, piedmont blues artist Archie Edwards will be opening the evening. Archie, a traditional finger-picking and slide guitarist, grew up in southwestern Virginia where he learned to integrate the diverse influences of black string-band traditions, blues, ragtime and his own lived experience with complex rhythms that have caught the attention of blues aficionados throughout Europe and America. Archie is also a song-writer whose material provides wry commentary on historical and personal events. He makes his home in Prince George's County which just celebrated "Archie Edwards Day" last fall. Increasingly, he has come to be regarded as a national treasure and was recently honored with a solo concert at the State Historical Society in Richmond, VA.

 and Craig will play piano and/or guitar.



Fifth Annual Potomac River Sacred Harp Singing Convention

Friday, April 15, 7:45 - 9:45 pm: Shape-Note Singing School

Plan to be part of a glorious weekend of harmony and fellowship with singers from near and far as we celebrate the 150th anniversary of *The Sacred Harp*, the most enduring of the shape-note tunebooks popular in 19th-century rural America. Beginners, experienced singers, and listeners are all welcome. *Sacred Harp* tunebooks (1991 Revision) will be available for loan and purchase.

The Sacred Harp contains singing-school music well-known to the forefathers of many of us but now unjustifiably forgotten, including late-18th century New England hymns, anthems, and fuging tunes, and early 19th-century Southern folk hymns and revival spirituals. Most of the texts are from the great religious poetry of 18th-century England, although a few texts are patriotic, and there is even one temperance song. This four-part unaccompanied and rugged music has elements of both folk and church music, with melodies in the tenor part, open harmonies, strong pulsing rhythms, and frequent minor, modal, and gaped scales. The music is written in shaped notes, which resemble standard round notes except that noteheads have four different shapes to indicate intervals from the key pitch. To aid in sight-reading, each tune is traditionally sung first by singing the syllables of the four shape notes (fa, sol, la, mi) before singing the words. Singers who sign up to lead democratically take turns conducting songs of their choice in the center of a hollow square, one voice part on each side.

The rural Southern Sacred Harp tradition has recently been attracting many Northern urbanites. The joyous and accepting atmosphere allows one to celebrate human life, face down its hardship, search for roots, and make friends irrespective of accomplishments, status, or religion. Furthermore, the music is accessible without formal musical training or a good voice, and the strong singing and rich harmony provide a fulfilling sonic, physical, and emotional thrill.

At the singing school, we welcome again two prominent masters who have been singing Sacred Harp nearly all of their lives in west Georgia. The colorful Hugh McGraw, head of the Sacred Harp Publishing Co. and also manager of a factory making men's pants (shown below leading), and Richard DeLong, an immensely musically talented high-school history teacher (at left with closed book), will teach the basics of shape-note singing, song leading, and the tradition. At the all-day singing sessions, the main events of the convention, we'll get down to serious singing, with 85-95 songs each day, "dinner on the grounds", (12:30-1:30 pm) and a Sunday memorial lesson for the deceased and sick-and-shut-in. Local singers planning to eat at the convention should bring a substantial meal to feed the many out-of-towners expected.

Over nearly 30 years, hundreds of Washingtonians have been introduced to shape-note singing through the FSGW.



Those who have moved on to other genres are particularly urged to "sing it again for the first time" with devoted Harpers at the all-day sessions to create a truly tremendous sound. 


