

It Won't Snow in May *DC Finest* Friday, May 10, 8:30 pm

FSGW's May membership program will be a re-scheduling of the snowed-out January program featuring Washington's great Doo-Wop group *DC's Finest*. The program will be held on Fri. May 10 at Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church in Bethesda, MD. The concert begins at 8:30 pm and is FREE to FSGW members and \$10.00 to non-members who may join the Society the night of the concert.

DC's Finest is a group of five current and former Washington, DC police officers who sing Doo-Wop, the exciting African-American vocal music which had its commercial heyday during the 1950's. Doo-Wop, a mix of quartet-style singing and secular songs, first burst on the popular scene in 1948 with a pair of spare, haunting hits by Baltimore's *Sonny Til and the Orioles*. *Its Too Soon to Know*, and *Crying in the Chapel* led to thousands of four and five person groups singing in harmony on street corners and making records. Groups such as the Drifters, the Platters, the Clovers and the Penguins made records and created an influence that survives in popular music today. While pure Doo-Wop declined in commercial popularity in the late 1950's, it has survived strongly in informal house parties and cabarets in black communities across the country, being passed down across generations within close knit communities.

The members of DC's Finest have been performing this music together for about ten years, having all met through their jobs with the DC Police Department. They have performed across the country in venues ranging from sewage treatment plants to schools to General Colin Powell's retirement party, although they particularly enjoy playing in schools; trying to bring some beauty and hope into the troubled communities they grew up in They are just now releasing their first album, **Arresting Sounds** on the Collectibles label. The members of the group are Jimi Bethel, Richard Collins, Ron Jones, Dean Largins and Remer Shedrick.

The Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church is located at 6601 Bradley Blvd. in Bethesda, MD. From the Beltway take the Wisconsin Ave. South exit and follow Wisconsin about 2¾ miles to Bradley Blvd. Turn right on Bradley and go about 3¾ miles to the church which will be on your right.



FSGW SUNDAY NIGHT DANCES

Glen Echo Park, Glen Echo, MD 7:30 pm - 10:30 pm

From mid-March through November the FSGW Sunday night dance is held in the historic Spanish Ballroom at the Glen Echo Park National Historic Site, off MacArthur Boulevard in Glen Echo, Maryland. Our dances feature a mix of traditional American contras and squares performed to wonderful live music. We welcome both experienced and new dancers, and you don't need to bring a partner. New dancers should come early, since dances become more challenging later in the evening, and may include medleys or omit walk throughs. Admission is \$6.00 for members of FSGW and affiliated groups (BFMS, CDSS, ATDS), \$8.00 for all others

- May 7 After warming up at Victoria's Revenge Tony Parkes and Childsplay descend on Glen Echo for an evening of fascinating dances and mind boggling music. Tony is well known as one of New England's most popular callers and dance composers, and has been featured at festivals and dance camps here and in England. Childsplay contains (barely) 20 of the finest dance fiddlers to be found anywhere who all play instruments crafted by Maine's Bob Childs. Every year or two they gather from all over the country to amaze and delight dancers in a different region. Outnumbered (but never outplayed) Peter Barnes will add inventive and amusing piano parts, while Ralph Gordon's bass provides a role model for the smaller strings.
- May 12 Baltimore's Robbin Schaffer journeys down I-95 to treat us to her usual carefully selected and delightfully called assortment of contras. Dance power will be provided by two of our favorite local musicians: Andrea Hoag's fiddle playing draws on her wide repertoire of tunes from Quebec, England (New and Old) and Scandinavia, while Charlie Pilzer collaboratively complements Andrea's melodic versatility, choosing between piano, accordion and bass.

- May 19 Ann Fallon's wide ranging repertoire and smooth calling style are sure to complement a warm D.C. Spring evening. *June Apple* will accompany Ann's usual fine selection of contras with spirited New England tunes: Jeff Steinberg's fiddle joins Alice Markham's Cape Breton flavored piano while Mike McGeary provides rhythm support on banjo and guitar. Bob Garber's clarinet adds a wind section to complete the mix.
- May 26 Beth Molaro's energy, clear calling and skilled dance selection have made her one of the mid-Atlantic's most popular (and widely traveled) callers. Tonight her migration brings her to Glen Echo for an evening of contras and squares with dance transportation provided by Martin's Flight:

 Sandy Mitchell's versatile and energetic fiddle teams up with Marc Glickman's piano and Ralph Gordon's bass to help you earn lots of frequent dancer points.

PRESIDENT

• Jamie Platt: I am honored to have been nominated to serve a second term as President. During the past year, I have enjoyed working with the Board. Board members have been hard working and eager to produce some really good music and dance programs. We have also initiated an outreach program which includes FREE concerts at Mason District Park in Annandale this summer, a community dance at Danni's Children's Festival on May 11th, and possible cooperative ventures with Border's Books. We are also planning some cooperative programs with the American History Museum and, possibly the Smithsonian Resident Associates. This should be an exciting year.

VICE PRESIDENT


