The Tradition Continues Saturday, February 2, 2002

It's bluegrass, ballads, and blues...classic and contemporary...traditional...it's rockin' women, and sea chanteys, and labor songs...it's more than 100 performers from the Washington metro area...it's music and dance and storytellers and food all day long in the middle of winter. What else could it be but the annual FSGW Mini-Fest! The 30th Annual FSGW Mini-Fest will take place on Saturday, February 2 (yes, Groundhog Day), from noon to 10:30 p.m. at the Takoma Park Middle School, 7611 Piney Branch Road in Silver Spring, Maryland.

The **FSGW Mini-Fest** is a family-friendly extravaganza of song, music, dance, stories, and crafts. Come celebrate singularity, celebrate diversity, celebrate your roots, including the ones you never knew you had! At this all-day, all-volunteer festival you'll enjoy some of Washington's finest folk performers. Listen and join your neighbors and the dozens of volunteers who donate their time to make the day a success. In fact, participatory music-making, dancing, showcases, and storytelling will delight you at nine (count 'em!) different venues. (Bring your instrument, if you play one.)

The Mini-Fest begins at noon with concerts by the Irish Breakfast Band and Scottish group MacTalla, a showcase

by singer Kathy Westra, Songs and Ballads of Family Life led by Carly Gewirz, and a collection of witty songs presented in the Writer's Room. Or play the blues in an open jam with members of Archie's Barbershop, led by Mike Baytop.

Participatory events continue with an Irish Music Session led by **Philippe Varlet**, *Shape Note Singing Workshop* led by **Miriam Kilmer and Tim Slattery**, *Family Drumming Workshop* by **Jacqi MacMillan**, an open session of *Camp Meeting/Gospel Songs* led by **Kathie Mack**, performance and workshop by the **DC Labor Chorus**, and an *American Roots Music* workshop led by **Pete Kraemer**.

Award-winning fiddler Julia Borland Freneborg and daughter Cecilia Freneborg present Swedish Family Songs. International music continues with performances by Slaveya and the Sudrabavots (Latvian folk music). Performances by Barrelhouse Brawl, Orange Line Special, Cabaret Sauvignon, The Alexandria Kleztet (alternative Klezmer), and Ship's Company (humorous sea songs) will keep audiences enthralled throughout the day. The Women of Whimsey mix things up with tavern and bawdy songs, Scottish and Irish tradi-

Red Mountain White Trash

Good Time Old-Time Stringband Music

Saturday, February 16 • 8 pm

FSGW's monthly FREE program will feature *The Red Mountain White Trash*, a high-energy old-time stringband from Alabama specializing in country dance music, old-time blues numbers, songs, and impromptu humor. "The Trash" play traditional fiddle tunes in a powerful, driving style that has made them highly popular with dancers across the Southeast (local contradancers will get their chance at the Glen Echo Friday Night Dance on February 15) and with concert and festival audiences.

The six members of *Red Mountain White Trash* started playing together in the mid-1980s when they all lived on Red Mountain in Birmingham — a historic neighborhood that was being gentrified by young professionals. Slow to renovate, the band members wondered if they were considered the "white trash" of the neighborhood, and savored the concept of BMW's up on blocks and obsolete espresso machines on the front porch. Thus came the band name. Although the name is facetious, however, they take their music seriously. Many of their tunes were collected from older fiddlers in Alabama and Tennessee, and they play in a style that reflects the region where they live.

The band features fiddler **Jim Cauthen**, guitar by **Joyce Cauthen**, mandolin by **Phil Foster**, harmonica and banjo uke by **Jamie Finley**, autoharp by **Bill Martin**, and bass by **Nancy Jackson**. Their two CDs, *Fire in the Dumpster* and *Chickens Don't Roost Too High* have received rave reviews. *The Old-Time Herald* compared their music to that of the much-loved *Highwoods String Band*, calling the group's tunes "irresistible" and the musicians "first-rate."

Don't miss this chance to hear a group that the *Victory Music Review* said "puts a grin on your face, even when you're not dancing." The concert begins at 8:00 p.m. at the **Washington Ethical Society auditorium**, **7750 16th Street**, **NW**, **just south of the DC-Maryland line** (directions page 16).

Admission is FREE for Folklore Society members, \$15 for nonmembers.



Mike Cross

Elemental Energy Saturday, February 9 • 8 pm

Take an expert Celtic and Appalachian fiddler who can breathe lilt and life into speedy rhythms. Take an expert fingerpicker who can coax tunes from a 6- or 12-string guitar like nobody's business. Take a songwriter known to spin humorously improbable tales but also capable of gentle insight. Stir gently, and let all three compete for the attention of a single brain and one pair of hands, and you

get someone with the manic energy and sheer talent of Mike Cross.



Born in Marysville, Tennessee, Mike Cross grew up in the Appalachian mountains, a region well known for storytellers and songwriters. "The ironic thing about this is," Mike says, "although I grew up around a bunch of talented musicians, my great addiction in life was golf. I was a hard-core golfer from the time I was about 10 years old until I went off to college." He gave up golf for a girlfriend, who then dumped him. He was ready for a new passion, and while trapped during a snowstorm in his junior year at a Southern college, he discovered the guitar. Somehow, things clicked, and he became a regular music-maker in the hotbed culture of Chapel Hill, NC.

A strong internal drive taught him to practice his way to unfailing musicianship, and his unflagging energy levels have allowed him the luxury of indulging his love for several genres (country, bluegrass, Appalachian, Celtic) as well as his skills as a singer-songwriter, and he has mastered them all. You probably have heard his songs before, with or without attribution (you almost certainly know the one about a certain Scotsman and what he [doesn't] wear beneath his kilt). Jill Rogoff British, Celtic and Ladino songs:

Sunday, February 10 • 7 pm

Jill Rogoff's clear soprano explores an uncommonly wide repertoire, from lyrical songs, ballads and chanteys to material drawn from the Celtic tradition (in the original languages), to classical and contemporary offerings. A native of New Zealand, she has become enamored of songs of the British Isles in English and

many Celtic languages, and has recently compiled a unique collection of Jacobite songs, incorporating 302 songs in English, Lallands, Scots Gaelic, Irish Gaelic, Manx Gaelic and Cornish, which awaits publication.

Now living in Jerusalem, she was a founding member of the Israel Folk Stuff Society (that country's FSGW equivalent). In recent years, her forays into traditional Sephardi music and medieval song have met with acclaim. She writes her own songs, and has set poems in several languages to music. Her professional music career includes recitals of Schubert lieder and other classical compositions, and she has studied medieval music at European workshops featuring well-known early music ensembles.

Jill has recorded three solo albums to date. Through An Open Door, released in 1990, features a range of traditional songs from England, Ireland and Scotland. The Celtic Cradle, released in 1995 in North America, is a rare and varied collection of traditional lullabies, most of which are sung in the original Celtic tongues (Gaelic, Scots Gaelic, Manx,

tionals, and original material. *The Chromatics* will bring us back to the 21st century. Singer/songwriter *Bill Baker* provides his own blend of original acoustic music, and local favorite *Sue Trainor* will delight listeners of all ages.

FSGW early member **Dick Rodgers** hosts a workshop on the 70's Folk Scene in Washington D.C., both a sing-along and discussion, complete with photographs and other memorabilia.

Ballad and traditional song lovers can enjoy: Songs and Ballads of Work (Mary LaMarca and George Stephens, leaders), Sea Songs for Rest and Pleasure (Lisa Null, leader), and Best of the Classic Ballads (Linda Rice-

Johnston, leader). Steve Key hosts an all-day Writers Room for contemporary singer/songwriters. Showcases will include: Witty Songs with John Seay, Paula Monks, and David A. Alberding; Rockin' Women with Michelle Swan, Gina DeSimone, Rachel Cross, and Lea; Americana with Franklin Taggert, Lori Kelley, and Randy Barrett; and Duos featuring Bill Parsons and Eric Weinberg, Luke and Daniel Brindley, Richard Dahl and Audrey Morris. Aspiring songwriters should bring their compositions to the Song Factory and receive constructive feedback from Michael Bowers, Steven Cutts, and Eliot Bronson. The Writer's Room will conclude with an Open Mic session with John Landau, John Mornini, Nikki Rouse, and other willing participants.

This year's storytelling lineup includes Cat Stories (Laura Bobrow), Humorous Stories (Bill Mayhew), Weaver and the Giant of White Hill (Ralph Chatham), Tales of a Russian Winter (Margaret Chatham) and the Samurai's Daughter (Laura Kundert).

Dances, including Telespringer Norwegian Couple, Swing, Western Swing, Cajun/Zydeco, Bulgarian, and English Country (bring your dancing shoes!) will be held throughout the day in both the gym and auxiliary gym.

Catering by Takoma Park's Caribbean Café ensures culinary delight, while a





35 Years Ago — February 1967

The February 10, 1967, FSGW program was *The Pennywhistlers* at Pierce Hall. A Sampler Concert was presented at the same location on February 17, featuring FSGW members Chuck & Nan Perdue; Sol, Helen & Riki Schneyer; Mike Rivers, Andy Wallace & Jonathan Eberhart; Joe Hickerson; Joe & Dawn Latham & Brad Kemp; Alice Foster & Hazel Dickens; John Jackson. An Open Sing was held the 25th at the Union Methodist Church. The 2-page February 1967 (Vol. 3, No. 5) FSGW newsletter announced these and future events, presented the president's column, and requested monetary contributions to support the newsletter. The February 21, 1967, minutes reported 179 memberships.

The following were also scheduled to perform in the area this month: Glen Yarbrough (Cellar Door); Sabicas (Lisner); Peter Paul & Mary (Constitution Hall); Bob Goff's Bluegrass Buddies (Candlelite Inn, Dom-Mar Restaurant); Spruce Mountain Boys (Buddy's Bar); The Virginians (GW Inn); Page Valley Boys (L&M Grill, Eldon St. Restaurant); Don Reno, Bill Harrell & The Tennessee Cutups (Hunter's Lodge). A benefit for Don Stover was scheduled at The Crossroads. Most of these events were announced in issues of Bluegrass Unlimited and

Washington Folk Strums. Two of these events were reviewed in the Washington Star by Joe Hickerson.

Meanwhile, the Library of Congress Archive of Folk Song registered the following researchers and visitors: Arnold Caplin (Historical Records); George Carey (University of Maryland); Daniel Rubin de la Barbolla (XIX Olympics Organizing Committee, Mexico); Toni de Maturana (Chilean composer/singer); Halim El-Dabh (Howard University); Philip Foner (Croton-on-Hudson, NY); Lena Gitter (American Montessori Society); Barbara Krader (Syracuse, NY); Khabi Mgoma (Johannesburg, South Africa); Howie Mitchell (DC); W. F. H. Nicolaisen (School of Scottish Studies); Princess Irene of Greece.

Joe Hickerson, head of the Archive of Folk Culture at the Library of Congress until his retirement in 1998, is available to sing and lecture about folk music. A founding member of FSGW, he has served as the Society's President, Program Chair, and Book Review Editor, and now contributes a monthly column describing FSGW and other area events 35 years ago. 
DIRECTIONS TO FREQUENT VENUES:

Washington Ethical Society (WES)

Auditorium. 7750 16th St., NW, just south of the intersection of Kalmia Rd. and 16th St., about four blocks inside the DC/MD line.

From the Beltway: Take the Georgia Avenue South exit. Stay in either right lane. Go 0.4 miles from the exit ramp, where the right lanes curve and put you on 16th St South. Follow 16th past East-West Hwy (Rte 410); cross the MD/DC line at Portal Dr. Kalmia Road is the first traffic signal south of the line, and WES is the second building on the right after you cross Kalmia. You may park on Kalmia Road by turning right at the light, or on either side of 16th St.

Spanish Ballroom, Glen Echo Park. 7300 MacArthur Blvd. at Goldsboro Rd, in Glen Echo, MD. The Ballroom is the large building (no exterior sign), located next to the playground and near the carousel.



From the Beltway:

MARYLAND SIDE: at 2-lane Exit 40 take the left fork for Cabin John Parkway. Where Cabin John merges with Clara Barton Pkwy, move into the left lane, under the overhang.

VIRGINIA SIDE: get into the far right hand lane at the top of the bridge. At the first fork, bear right.

Stay in the left lane; watch for Cabin John traffic merging from the right at the overhang.

MD/VA: Watch for signs to MacArthur Blvd. Make a very sharp hairpin turn and move immediately into the right lane. At the T intersection/stop sign, turn left onto MacArthur Blvd. Upper parking lot on the left. For lower parking lot, go around the small traffic circle and make the first left onto Oxford St.

By public transportation: Take the #29 bus from the Friendship Heights Metro Station. Ask the driver to let you know when to get off for Glen Echo Park. The bus stops running before the dance ends. Ask the dance coordinator to announce you need a ride. We've never left anybody at the park. Last bus leaves Friendship Heights Metro at 7:30 pm.

Glen Echo Town Hall 6106 Harvard St., Glen Echo, MD: From the Beltway:

MARYLAND SIDE: at 2-lane Exit 40 take the left fork for Cabin John Parkway. Where Cabin John merges with Clara Barton Pkwy, move into the left lane, under the overhang.

At the T intersection/stop sign, turn left onto MacArthur Blvd. Go around the small traffic circle. Third left is Harvard Ave.

PLEASE NOTE: Please park in the lot behind the hall, on University Drive, or on the east side of MacArthur, <u>NOT</u> on Harvard Street.




