

Hard Times & Hard Travelin' Stories and Songs of Woody Guthrie


Saturday, September 11 · 8 pm

The New Jersey native tells Woody's story and sings his songs with guitar, banjo and fiddle. He's performed his *Hard Times & Hard Travelin*' show across Europe and the U.S., presenting a "living documentary" that takes us back to the oil boom towns of the 1930s, to the Great Depression, the dust bowl and union halls. We'll hear about the roots of Woody's music, the movements in which he worked, and the injustices that riled him and made him set down the words that many still sing.



FSGW Board Meeting Hightlights · (August 3, 2010)

The budget for the 2010-2011 year was presented by treasurer, **Jerry Stein**, and approved by the board. Due to the additional monthly layout expense, and higher printing costs, a plan for bringing in revenue through newsletter advertising was approved. Mary Cliff and Marty Summerour updated the group on the programs, and publicity was discussed. A special dance event is being planned for May 22, with a proposal going to Glen Echo Park to reserve the space. Progress on the website is ongoing with work being done on the structure, terminology, and internal pages. A publicity committee is meeting August 15 to develop a plan of action for the year.

The Get-Away—Then and Now

The FSGW-sponsored **Folk Get-Away** (that's the original name and hyphenated spelling), originated in 1966 and played an important role in the American folk revival as well as the growth of this organization. **Andy Wallace**, a founding member, recalls it all started in '65 when the first Folklore Society President, Georgia native **Chuck Perdue**, invited some of his Washington friends (**Sol and Helen Schneyer**, **Mike Rivers**, **Jonathan Eberhart**, **Andy**, and a few others) to join some of his old buddies from the Atlanta Folk Music Club at a musical gathering in the mountains of North Georgia. "We all knew how to have a great time eating, singing, and carousing," Andy remembers. (He swears **Helen Schneyer** slipped that frog into his sleeping bag, though she always denied it!) The unforgettable **Barbara Carns** was there, and also **Ernie Marrs**, who wrote *Plastic Jesus*, **Bud Foote**, of *See Rock City* fame, and **Kay Cothran**, who wrote the powerful ballad, *Coal in the Stone*. A great time was had by one and all, so FSGW decided to hold a similar event the following year.

The Beginning Years-1966 and 1967: Nan Perdue spearheaded the effort and the Get-Away was sched-

uled for September 16-18, 1966, at Prince William Forest Park. Andy's memory and records reveal: "The retreat was attended by more than 100 folks, and featured campfire sings, a square dance, workshops, a puppet show and lots of good food prepared by local chefs. The cost was a whopping \$7.50 for adults and \$5.00 for children. Word must have gotten around that Number 1 was a smashing success, because #2 was oversubscribed by more than 100 people, and we had to initiate a day pass category. Mike and Alice Seeger were there as were Art Rosenbaum and **Artie Rose**, **Des** and **Juliette Rainey** from New Zealand, Ethel Raim, Josh Dunson, and Ernie Marrs. Gus Meade brought Wesley Smith and Speedy Tolliver to play for the dance, and John Jackson was there, as he was to be for many years to come. A USIA film crew showed up and shot footage for overseas viewing."

The Formative Years—1968-1973: Musicians came from as far away as California and the **Getaway** developed a national reputation. **Andy** took over organizing it, there were waiting lists every year, a financial surplus, and a stipend for invited guest performers. Andy says: "Guests included the **Beers Family**, the **Patons**, **Michael Cooney**, **Grant Rogers**, **Sara Grey**, **John Wilcox**, **Louis Killen**, **Norman Kennedy**, and **Utah Phillips**. FSGW regulars included **Bob Clayton**, who holds the record for most Getaways attended (only missed the first one), **Dick Rodgers**, the **Dildines**, the **Wests**, the **Hickersons**, **Golands**, and by 1973, the **Huttons**. The late night sings in the lodge by firelight were magical, and the walk-in cooler in the kitchen was a favorite place to rehearse! Perhaps the highlight of those years, for me, was in 1971 when international folk legend **Bessie Jones and the Sea Island Singers** joined us for the weekend."

Fancy Accommodations—Nancy King and Kathy Westra both remember the rustic, unheated cabins, and their first Getaways at Prince William. Nancy relates: "My first one was the infamous Spring Getaway in 1974. It was VERY cold that weekend, way below freezing at night, so my kids (then 2 and 5) had to crawl into our sleeping bags with their father and me. Not much sleep, but we managed to have a good time anyway, and I have been back to every subsequent Getaway. My kids—now grown—have come whenever they could. I wouldn't miss it for the world. Kathy

says: "At my first Getaway in October 1975, the temperatures at night were well below freezing. My cabin-mates and I solved the problem by putting all the mattresses on the floor and sleeping like a pile of puppies to keep warm!"

In the early 1980s, the Getaway moved to Camp Letts, on the Chesapeake Bay, and stayed there for the next 15 years or so. When that became too expensive, we went back to Prince William Forest Park for 1999, and then went to Camp Ramblewood, on the Susquehanna River, for a few years. In 2006, the Getaway moved to its current location at the West River Conference Center, on an inlet of the Chesapeake Bay—a beautiful location with heated buildings.





Food, Friendships and Fun—""At Prince William," says **Nancy King**, "we did our own cooking. **Debby McClatchy**, one of our invited guests for 2010, and the featured artist at **Lars and Becky Hanslins**' house concert this month (see page 5), was head chef for many years and provided splendid food for all. **Pete the Spy** and **Dave Laning** each took a few turns while we were at Camp Letts. In the early years everybody signed up for two hours of kitchen work during the weekend—it was a great way to get to know people!" **Kathy** adds that "since we no longer have the option of providing our own chefs, the menu is less interesting (although the meals are always served on time and 'KP' duty is no longer mandatory!)."

Romance—Nourished by the music and the camaraderie, more than one romance has blossomed at the Getaway. **Kathy** remembers: "While the sweetness of a Getaway-fueled romance in 1975 between my visiting friend **Laurel Burnstine** and FSGW founder **Jonathan Eberhart** did not ultimately survive the real-world constraints of time and distance, it lives on in '*Laurel*,' the song Jonathan wrote and recorded on his Folk-Legacy album, *Life's Trolley Ride*." **Andy and Sondra Wallace**, who have been married for many years, first found one another at a long-ago Getaway weekend, as did **Janine Smith** and **Matt Levine**, now married more than 15 years.

Wildlife and Wild Life—Each Getaway location has afforded glimpses of the natural world, from the shorebirds and ospreys at Camp Letts to deer and other mammals at Ramblewood, Prince William, and West River. **Kathy** recalls "the memorable visit by a flying squirrel who upstaged guest **Margaret MacArthur's** performance in the lodge at Prince William with his rafter-to-rafter aerobatics." And, no one who was there could forget the Wild Life flourishing in the infamous "B-Lodge Boogies" lasting until the wee hours at Prince William.



Tradition!—The Getaway experience is a tradition in itself, for so many. **Barry Schlesinger** writes: "My first Getaway was in 1977 and I have missed

only one since!" Barry fondly recalls a highlight of many Getaways: "Jonathan Eberhart used to have a workshop on folk songs you didn't know were folk songs—advertising jingles and parodies, school songs etc." Many a Saturday night Getaway concert featured The Yorkist Ballad Charade Society, who clev-



night Getaway concert featured The Yorkist Ballad Charade Society, who cleverly pantomimed ballads in silent drama. **Kathy** muses: "It all began at the 25th anniversary Getaway in 1989 when a discussion of a line in a ballad I had just sung led several friends—me, **Sue and Charlie West**, **Carly Gewirz** and **Mary LaMarca**—to suggest the idea of acting out ballads and having the audience guess what story was being presented. One of my personal favorites featured our late friend, **Mary**, in a memorable role as one of Lord Randall's poisoned dogs!" In recent years, **Jacqui Morse** has carried on the dramatic tradition, putting together a mummer's play for our evening concert, complete with heroes, villains, death and rebirth.

In the 1990s, as the internet enabled more and more people to hear about the Getaway, folks from every corner of the U.S., Canada and the U.K., plus Israel and Iceland, have joined us. While FSGW is no longer able to pay guest performers, many fine guest musicians have enhanced our gatherings. In recent years these have included **Gordon Bok, John Roberts**, **Saul Broudy**, **the Kossoy Sisters**, **Elizabeth LaPrelle**, **George Ward**, **Bob Zentz**, and many others.







By Metro: Red Line to Silver Spring Stop. Walk south on Rt. 29 Colesville Rd. to the traffic circle at 16th – go left down 16th four blocks to Kalmia Rd. and WES. An S-4 Metro Bus will deliver you to the corner of Kalmia Rd. and 16th.

Tents or RVs are OK, but no hookups available. Public gathering areas and some bedrooms are handicapped accessible. Special dietary needs may be accommodated if you let us know in advance. Limited kitchen facilities (fridge, freezer, microwave) available to us at all times. No smoking is permitted indoors, and as the facility is run by the Methodist Church. We are asked not to bring any alcohol.

What to bring: Along with voices, instruments, and your love of music, bring bedding, pillows, towels, flashlight, and a coffee mug to help save paper. No pets, please.





Rates and Registration: See *registration form page 23* and explanation below. Rates are for one, two, or three nights, and for day-trippers who bring their own food. To dine at the Getaway buffet you MUST register in advance. If you register for two nights, the fee covers three meals and a late-night snack both Saturday and Sunday. A three-night registration gives you an additional night's lodging and breakfast on Monday morning. A one-night registration gives you all meals and snacks on either Saturday or Sunday, and, if you wish, a bed on either adjacent night.
